The kid looked up at the digger, just for a little while,
And with a changed expression said, with a lovely smile

A LETTER TO MR. G. SHAW MLC FROM MR. IAN BRAID.

Dear Mr. Shaw, I refer to your letter of 10 December 1988 requesting consideration be given to the upgrading of the Elephant Pass section of the Tasman Highway following the accident of the school bus on the road section in November. Following the accident a thorough investigation was completed by the Department of Main Roads to ascertain the extent of work required to improve safety for motorists using this road. A report has been prepared on the basis of this investigation which involved liaison with the school bus driver. As a result of the report \$300,000 has been listed for safety fence upgrading works to be undertaken in the 1987/88 and 1988/ 89 financial years. Work has comenced in the area involving the Work has cominstallation of 250 metres of safety fence in the area of the bus accident and a further 750 metres south from the end of the existing new fence, 5 kilometres south of the accident site. Work is substantially completed on is substantially completed on this installation with the balance be undertaken when materials are available. Some minor road widening has also been completed to the north of the accident site which will allow adequate width to complete the installation of fencing on the Devils Elbow to the foot of Elephant Pass section, a total of 1,15 kilometres. It is anticipated these works shall be completed by August 1988. The erection of a further 1.8 km of safety fence on the section from Gray to Devils Elbow is programmed to be undertaken in the 1988/89 financial year. The works listed above had the highest priority in the Department's report and have been funded and programmed accordingly. It is considered that this upgrading will add to the safety of the road section and should prove adequate to accommodate forecasted traffic volumes. . Yours faithfully, Ian M Braid, MINISTER.

WET WEATHER DRIVING

Simply put, when driving on wet roads - slow down. Extra care should be taken, the distance to the car in front should be doubled and all manoeuvres should be indicated early and clearly, especially in poor visibility. Forward vision is usually impaired in inclement weather, so maintenance is essential. Deteriorated wiper rubbers and a fogged, smeared interior windscreen are not conductive to clear vision. Be very careful on wet roads after a dry spell. The build up of oil, grease, rubber and dust usually results in slippery surfaces. During heavy rain, flooding can often occur from overflowed gutters and rivulets. That's when aquaplaning can occur. A car aqua-planes when it builds up a cushion of water ahead of the rolling tyre. If the tread grooves cannot allow sufficient water to pass through, the tyre loses road contact and actually floats on a wedge of water. When that happens, brakes and steering are virtually ineffective. the remedy? Slow down until speed drops sufficiently for the tyre to make contact again. Generally, the deeper the tyre's tread depth, a faster speed is allowed before road contact is lost. Modern high performance radial tyres with special drainage channels can be driven at quite high speeds without loss of contact.

NEW PARLIAMENT HOUSE

On May 9, Her Majesty, The Queen, will officially open the new Parliament House.

Built to last centuries, it is a spectacular sight to behold and so it should be. It was built at an enormous cost and although the exact figure is yet to be established, it is estimated to be approximately \$1048 million. The original estimate was \$220 million.

The site has an appalling industrial relations record, riddled with rorts and plaqued by strikes. In fact, strikes alone have added a mammoth 19 million to the cost, and many more dollars have been wasted through industrial action.

Just to give you some indication of the construction involved, the building has:

300,000 cubic metres of concrete - enough to build 25 opera houses

750,000 sq.metres of plaster board - enough for 2,000 homes

4,500 rooms

33,000 sq. metres of grass will be planted, including an area the size of the MCG on the roof

40,000 light fittings

It's expected that one million visitors will tour the new Parliament House per year, and there are areas that will be permanently open to the public. Public Gallery seating caters for 1,000 visitors.

There are only 76 Senators and 148 Members of the House of Representatives, but 3,000 people will work in Parliament House as stenographers, security guards, cleaners, messengers, librarians, cooks, waitresses and researchers.

BICENTENNIAL SPENDING

Federal Spending of the bicentenary will total 202 million - compared to the 1.4 million spent on the International Year of Shelter and the Homeless.

FRONT WHEEL DRIVE

Drivers of front wheel drive cars should take special care. The design and handling characteristics of front drive cars has improved immensely, to the point where they require only slight adjustment to driving style - in the dry.

Wat weather can be a different story

A front drive car will often react very differently to steering, throttland brake application in wet condition. Short of a special explanatory article we advise the FWD OWNERS DRIVE SLOWLY, make slow precise movements of controls, particularly when cornering.

If you meed to brake suddenly, apply the brakes progressively, to avoid wheel lock-up. Sudenly slamming on the brakes especially in the wet - will usually result in locked wheels, followed by a sickening slide into the rear of the car in front.

REMEMBER: The basic key to safe wet weather motoring are - slow down, be alert and maintain a safe margin to the car in front.
