I support this application for \$31,273.00 with which to employ six people for fourteen weeks. The restoration of the railway station at St. Marys is an important project in many ways.

Since the Australian National Railways Commission took over the Tasmanian Government Railways there has been scant interest shown in preserv! on their 33rd Wedding Aniverseries ing the many buildings, that were not on Friday June 12th. only an integral part of the railways operations but also part of the State's colourful history.

Apart from local and state interest, railway buffs throughout the world visit countries to see the remnants of the steam age. Much film and video footage is used to record these historic buildings. The old signal box from the now defunct Devonport station commands a great deal of attention at its present site with the Don Railway Museum,

In 1983 I was advised that ANR planned to demolish the St. Marys Station, regardless of the fact that it carried a National Trust Classification. To save it from the fate of the Latrobe station, which was on the National Estate listing but was still destroyed by a Federal Government authority, I asked the Minister for Transport to halt the intended demolition of the St.Marys Station. Fortunately my request was accepted.

I am advised that the site is now to be restored to its original layout. The station is to be renovated and

scaped for use by the local community and the fourist a Local community groups will be encouraged to utilise the building and the adjacent area will house historic mining machinery.

It is felt that this will be a good draw card for tourists as St. Marys is seen as the centre of Tasmania's coal mining industry. With the new coastal road link through Four Mile Creek causing a deviation of tourist traffic from St. Marys I believe the regain some of the traffic loss. could be detailed on tourist package brochures.

#### WOL LABBULLING

Woolblendmark: This symbol guarantees the wool content is dominant in the article and is new wool. The percentage of new wool and the other fibre must be clearly marked next to the trademark. All products with the Woolblendmark must comply with the Australian Wool Corporation standards.

Celsius 30: This refers to a Woolblendmark fabric developed for men's wear. It is a lightweight fabric designed to keep you cool and comfortable in summer, and is used in suits, blacks, and blazers.

Washable Celsius: This label appears on men's lightweight slacks made from a Woolblendmark fabric thoroughlý tested for washing performance. The fabric can be machine washed without removing the original creases.

Superwash: This is a performance standard which gives the consumer a garment which resists shrinkage during machine washings, while still retaining natural wool properties. (Techniques such as filling in the gaps between the epidermis scales with resin or stripping the scales back to make wool machine washable).

Planmability: This symbol is used on wool products such as children's dressing gowns and blankets. Legis-Lation in most states controls the labelling and sale of children's night clothes in accordance with the fire hazard they represent, and since wool is the safest fibre, it carries labels stating "Wool, naturally flame resistant" and "Tow fire danger as 1249".

Carpet Labelling: The Australian Wool Corporation has a grading scheme for carpets. It comprises the Woolmark, the statement "Pure New Wool" and specified the type of carpet (light duty, medium duty, heavy duty, or decorative).

#### Wools to Watch out for:

#### Cashmere:

Each Cashmere goat, native to Turkestan and northern India, yields a tiny amount of soft, downy wool. Forty goats are needed for enough wool for a coat. The wool is patiently combed from the animal and varies from pure white to brownish grey. It makes light, warm knitted garments and shawls.

<u> Mohair:</u> This fine, lustrous wool from the angora goat of western Asia makes beautiful light rugs and is often

combined with other kinds of wool for garments Tto Pihr

40cm long, and strongly resist felting.

Jamel:

The hair of the Bactrian camel is mostly used in its natural fawn colours as it is difficult to bleach. It has 50 per cent more insulating power than any other fibre, and it is sometimes combined with sheep's wool for warm overcoats.

<u>Vicuna:</u>

This is the rarest textile fleece. Each animal gives only 100g of wool and about 40 animals are needed for a single overcoat. The vicuna is impossible to capture, so its herders must live with it in its home territory about 6000m up in the Andes in South America. Vicuna makes beautiful but expensive garments.

The fleece, varying from white through red, brown and black, is impossible to bleach (though will accept a darker dye), is water repellant and about 300 per cent stronge than sheep's wool, The long alpaca fleece is used in fine quality garms ents, often with sheep's wool.

Resilience:

The crimp of the fibre and the arrang. ment of its cells means wool resists crushing and quickly sheds wrinklesand this keeps it a number-one fashion material. The fibre can be stretched up to 30 per cent, yet immediately oprings back to its original length when tension is released, and it retains this springiness (synthetick frbres become permanently tired after several washings). Sheepskins make excellent underblankets to help prevent pressure sores in people confined to bed for a long time. The resilience also explains why woollen blankets don t become stiff or matted after long wear.
