PROTECTING THAT PARCEL

From time to time we have customers complain about the condition of a parcel they have received through the post and generally they enquire about compensation for damage.

Australia Post regulations do provide for compensation under certain circumstances. The maximum amount payable varies with the nature of the service used but in all cases the method of packing is of prime importance.

All mail is shifted from point to point in mail bags and, as you can guess, at times quite a lot are moved at one time. Perhaps you have seen a load on one of our vans or trucks or on a trolley at the airport. When bags are stacked quite a lot of weight is applied to the bottom ones and there is often movement during travel. In handling mail bags a certain amount of bumping also occurs so when packing your parcel think about this.

If you remember that your parcel will almost certainly be subjected to some pressure and bumps in its travels packing becomes practically just a matter of common sense. Glass or china bowls, vases etc. need packing inside the item as well as outside. Light, thin items need support to help prevent them bending. The article should fit snugly in the box so that it isn't damaged by moving about. The bunch of flowers in a light cardboard box will almost certainly be damaged despite being prominently marked as fragile. A photo or picture in a frame with glass also needs special care. The glass will shatter very easily and the movement of the broken fragments can cut the surface of the photo. Light brown paper and thin string often result in torn wrapping allowing contents to get dirty.

Things like aerosol spray cans, matches or flammable liquids cannot be sent by post because of the possibility of damage to other mail. For the same reason items with sharp edges or points must be packed in a special way and containers of liquid must be packed in enough absorbent material to soak up the liquid if the container is broken or the lid becomes loose.

Australia Post has a pamphlet designed to help with packing and our counter staff are always willing to advise you. Re-wrapping parcels and the special handling of damaged ones is time consuming and part of our operation we would like to be without.

Help us to help you. Pack your parcel so we can deliver it in the same condition as you sent it.

TIMER

As I am a descendant of a "First Fleeter" and as 1988 is our Bicentenary year perhaps readers may be interested in our story. Our research has taken many years, many visits to the Archives and Libraries in Adelaide, Sydney, Hobart, genealogical societies. Our task was made harder because there were two John Herbert's deported in 1788 and both sailed on the "Scarborough". John Herbert was convicted at Old Bailey in 1784 for stealing one silk handkerchief, the property of Mr Thomson its value 1/- before Mr Bevan Eyres. He was transported for 7 years. He sailed on the Scarborough to Sydney Town then he was sent to Norfolk Island where he was a baker and on expiry of his sentence he was made a Constable. He had two children James & Elizabeth, (Elizabeth was the daughter of Hannah Bolton) John later married Hannah Bolton. John & James (son) were granted land (50 acres) each at Norfolk Plains (Longford) in 1813 - then they with other evacuees came on the Minstrel from Norfolk Island. To be granted land James (son) would be over 16 years and off rations. James (son) married Ann Cox. John & James land is now known as Rocky Hill. The original homestead still stands and is now used to store hay. Painters often paint the Homestead. James & Ann had 5 children Ann, John, James, Charles & Susannah. The first two boys died young. Charles (my grandfather) married Catherine Lovett in March 1855. They had 8 sons & 3 daughters - my father Lewis was the youngest born 18 May 1876. My father married Amy Causley who was a daughter of H. Causby & Elizabeth Giles nee Cook. (Cooks are believed to be related to Captain Cook. Causbys were noted for being a Tanner at Longford. John Herbert was the 7th convict transported and if we can find where he has been buried a plaque will be erected by the Society of First Fleeters. We are now working on the years 1888 to 1988. It's a lot of work but interesting. One thing we've noticed is family names coming through, Ann James, Elizabeth, Susan, Iris, Ada, Eardley, Austin, Alexander, Walter.

ST. MARYS HIGH SCHOOL VISIT

This week, as part of a regular programme of school visits, Senator John Watson addressed two groups of St. Marys High School students.

Australia's political system, the history of its development and current issues of importance were discussed. Particular emphasis was given to Australia's transition from independent Colonial Governments to Federation in 1901, and the difficulties that this involved. The Founding Fathers had to contend with regional rivalries and the formidable task of separating the powers of government between the States and the new Federal Government before the Constitution could be framed.

Senator Watson explained to the students how Parliament operates and described to any aspiring politicians the tasks that a Senator must fulfil as a representative of their State.

"The interest shown by the St. Marys students in the operation of Australia's political system was most impressive," Senator Watson said.

"To understand how our Government operates is the first step toward making our voice heard in Parliament, as is the right of all Australians."
