TOURISM AND HOSPITALITY EDUCATION IN TASMANIA

Tourism is one of Tasmania's biggest industries, and is currently the state's largest growth area in terms of employment and income-earning potential.

This is hardly surprising, in view of the wealth of unique natural features, stunning scenery, historical interest and comfortable climate that Tasmania has to offer.

As tourism has grown, so has the need for high quality tourism education and training.

The Education Department of Tasmania has long recognised these needs, and it has an integrated strategy designed to equip students at all levels with the knowledge and skills that help to make Tasmania a tourist centre.

Foremost in the strategy is the Tasmanian College of Hospitality. A TAFE, centre, the College is based at Drysdale House in Hobart, and is an up-to-date training facility for personnel at all levels of the industry. It is highly regarded throughout Australia and overseas for the quality of its courses, and the skills and abilities of its graduates.

Drysdale House is well equipped with food preparation areas, bars, restaurants and guest accommodation facilities. Students develop and practice their skills in contact with paying guests and diners, in realistic settings, and so are trained from the start in real working conditions.

Responding to a growing awareness of the importance of the visitor industry to Tasmania, a number of schools are developing student enterprise projects in tourism. One such school is Oatlands District High School, a kindergarten to year 12 school situated in the picturesque midlands.

Year 8 and 11 students at the school have formed the 'Oatlands Tourist Student Enterprise' and are working to produce audio tapes of commentary on the historic town's many interesting features, as though narrated by a boy living in 1870, and based on aural histories collected by the students.

They are also producing a colourful map of the town with 'visitor trails' showing main points of interest.

Visitors will be able to buy or hire the map and tape, and use their car tape player, or hire one from the students, to follow the trail around the town. In this way, the students involved in the project are providing a visitor service, learning about their local area, and developing entrepreneurial skills.

Secondary colleges around Tasmania are also developing student enterprise projects: several of them deal with the tourism and hospitality industry.

One example is a catering project at Elizabeth College in Hobart. Students will be involved in a work-related course based on actual contract catering for group functions both within the college and out in the community. A student management committee with rotating membership will take orders and plan activities according to available resources.

Students will also undertake two work-experience placements in both small and large scale catering facilities, and spend part of their time preparing products like pates, breads and gateaux for sale.

The project is to be accredited for inclusion in the Higher School Certificate. Although it does not claim to produce qualified caterers, the course will be a valuable preparation for further training in this area, as well as developing enterprise and providing a direct service to the community.

With the printing of this issue, the Valley and East Coast Voice begins its 21st year in production. A grateful thanks to all those who help keep the paper rolling off the press, and thanks to all who support us by buying it. This includes the shops selling the paper and the delivery persons.

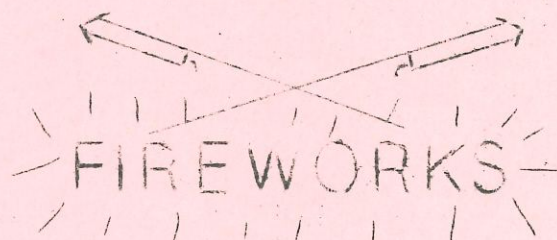

CURRENT ISSUES:

The most talked about issue at present is the AMBULANCE LEVY.

To appreciate the full implications of this matter it is important to know the history of how the Ambulance Service has been financed in the past.

Up until two years ago all councils made a collection from their rate-payers by way of the normal rate demand and paid this to the Government as a share of running the service. In response to a request from the Councils to be relieved of this obligation the Government agreed to take on the full responsibility for funding. However, the Government soon found itself stuck with a serious problem because the severe Federal Government cuts in tax reimbursements to Tasmania meant a choice between either curtailing some services or raising more money by way of state taxes.

Nobody wants the Ambulance Service curtailed.

The Government decided to raise about \$5 million of the \$9 million it takes to run the service each year by way of a levy on property, which is really only an extension of what the Councils had been doing previously. However, this has proved to be an unpopular move because most people maintain that the cost of the Ambulance service should be shared

equally by all families, not just property owners and that all should pay the same amount. The premier has said the Government will make different arrangements for next year and subsequent years, and work on developing a new system is already in hand.

- *safer storage.
- *7 day "cooling off" period.
- *no interstate sales.
