STIFFER PENALTIES, INCREASED CHECKS FOR UNREGISTERED VEHICLES.

According to the RACT., stiffer penalties and increased roadside checks are soon to be introduced in an effort to reduce the number of unregistered vehicles on Tasmanian roads.

The measures follow the publication of a survey in February Motor News, which concluded that up to 18,700 Tasmanian vehicles may be unregistered.

Changes to traffic regulations regarding unregistered vehicles providing wider powers for Transport Inspectors, and increased penalties for offences involving unregistered vehicles are expected to be gazetted in the next few months.

In the meantime, commencing last month, police are now able to delay motorists for slightly longer periods at random breath testing stations, enabling them to also check vehicles' roadworthiness and registration status.

And following successful trials last year, Transport Tasmania vehicle inspectors will assist police at RBT sites on a regular basis.

Motorists should be less inconvenienced having their motor vehicle checked while stopped at RBT sites, rather than possibly being pulled up a second time for just a vehicle check.

But, although Transport Inspectors will assist police at RBT sites, they will still continue to carry out their own random checks from time to time, particularly in the leadups to Christmas and Easter - traditionally times of heavy traffic activity.

According to Transport Tasmania, many owners let their vehicle's registration lapse because of cash flow problems. To help ease the financial burden of one-off payments of registration, Transport Tasmania hopes to introduce credit card facilities in the near future.

Transport Tasmania will continue to regularly publish notices in newspapers, reminding motorists that registration should be renewed

before, or the registration plates voluntarily surrendered, within 14 days of the registration expiry date.

But they are also currently writing to a sample of owners who did not renew their vehicle's registration on expiry. Depending on the results of the survey a demand for renewal, or even surrender of plates may be introduced.

PROVISIONAL TO

TAX CALCULATION TO INCREASE

Liberal Senator John Watson was today critical of the budget measure to increase from eleven to twelve percent the figure used in the calculation of Provisional Tax liability.

"Only last year the Tax Commissioner, Mr Boucher, was obliged to commit considerable time and resources to notifying taxpayers that they may have been overcharged on provisional tax charges," Senator Watson said.

Already the Treasurer has increased the rate even further.

The Tax office will now operate on the assumption that a taxpayers income for the next financial year will be 112% of the previous years liability for Provisional Tax Purposes.

"This decision will be of particular importance for people receiving fixed incomes or incomes that do not vary significantly from year to year," Senator Watson said.

"It is highly likely that many of these people will be overcharged on their Provisional Tax bill next year."

"The increase is totally inconsistent with the Treasurer's forecast that the Consumer Price Index will only increase by 4.5% over the next twelve months," Senator Watson said.

"Mr Keating should come clean on this issue without delay," Senator Watson said.

At least two busloads of East-Coast and Fingal Valley gardeners will head for Launceston this month for a very special garden show. Support for the Garden and Flower Spectacular in Launceston will fill the Albert Hall, two marquees and beyond. The event is to mark the Launceston Horticultural Society's 150th anniversary. It is being held on September 23, 24 and 25 and will be opened by the Governor, Sir Phillip Bennett. The event will be centred on the society's spring show which is based on spring bulbs, camellias and floral art, plus many other spring flowers. Sections of this will be bigger than ever, partly because of the 150th anniversary and partly because the Examiner has greatly bolstered the prize monies. The hall will be spectacular as it will contain the society's show plus floral stands by associated societies. These include groups specialising in rhododendrons, orchids, bonsai, Australian plants, garden history plus the Tasmanian Arboretum. There will also be a display of Western Australian wildflowers flown in for the occasion, a show by International Blooms Ltd. and a display by the Department of Parks and Recreation. The knot garden is being designed and displayed by the School of Horticulture at the TAFE College.

Peter Cundall and Les Hodge will be available to answer questions at set times and there will be displays of gardening techniques by qualified speakers. Two mannequin parades will be held on the Saturday in addition to a children's hat parade. And for those wanting a rest, there will be video shows on gardening and garden historical subjects at various times. The society first planned to have one marquee in the park grounds to accommodate 20 Tasmanian nurserymen and associated groups. This has now been extended to two Marquees. Food and drink stands will be located on the lawn area near the marquees and meals will be available at the restaurant in the Albert Hall. An international convention of bulb growers will be held in Hobart just before the Launceston event and some of the delegates to this are expected to be in Launceston to see the northern group's show. LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,
Australia is suffering from the dead hand of creeping socialism.

The Chifley Government tried to bring in socialism with a full frontal attack by the nationalising of banks. The Hawke Government has been much more subtle, but very much more effective.

Under socialism, individual people exist to serve the State, rather than the State serving the people. Socialism means that the Government acquires most of the national resources and distributes those resources according to Government planning. The Government has now acquired almost half of our national economy; it was 28% in 1972 under the McMahon Government.

If socialism is to work, human freedom and dignity must be relinquished to the Government. It must also limit the capacity of citizens to work on account of themselves and their families, and ensure that they work for the state.

The Hawke Government has proceeded on a tactic of convincing people that the Government can provide their every need. But to meet the growing commitment, taxes must be pushed higher and higher. This year Mr. Keating holds out the carrot of a tax cut, yet budgets for P.A.Y.E. tax to increase by 13.8%.

But what of freedom and dignity? The Government claims it must have more information about individual citizens in order to collect the tax it needs. Mr. Hawke pushed for the I.D. card, now the same information will be required under the expanded tax file numbering system. The Household Expenditure Survey requires people to answer about 1100 questions disclosing every conceivable private detail.

The latest push by Mr. Keating is through the Tax Office. Under the guise of clamping down on tax avoiders, the Tax Commissioner is assuming vast powers to pry into confidential matters. Consider Mr. Boucher's statements. "We can't take this soft approach forever. There will be no holds barred in bringing to account those who continue to snub their noses at the system."

Statements like these should alarm every Australian. It means that Governments and bureaucrats now want citizens to be subservient to the State. We are seeing the full implementation of Hawke style
