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VETERINARY SERVICES ON THE EAST COAST

Recent months have seen significant improvements in veterinary services available to farmers and townsfolk in the east coast municipalities of Portland, Fingal and Glamorgan. This applies particularly to clinical treatment of sick animals which hitherto has been handled by a limited government service and intermittent visits from private practitioners.

Now there are five permanently residing veterinary practitioners servicing the three municipalities in addition to the District Veterinary Officer from the Department of Agriculture, Dr. Tim McManus. Three of the practitioners reside at St. Helens. The husband and wife team of Drs. Jeff and Debbie Parsons have recently purchased the former East Coast Veterinary Clinic which they now operate full time, to treat all classes of animals both at their surgery and on farms in the Portland and Fingal municipalities.

Their address is 65 Quail Street and their 24 hour telephone number, 003 761577. Jeff and Debbie have two small children with whom they like to spend some time on Sunday afternoons, so they prefer to have that couple of hours off unless emergencies arise.

The other veterinary practitioner at St. Helens is Dr. Christopher Lee, an associate of Dr. Ron Harris at Scottsdale. Dr. Lee's premises are at Eaton Park, Medea Cove, telephone number 003 761007. This practice gives a 24 hour service and also provides on request a computerised dairy health programme and embryo transfer work.

In addition to St. Helens vets, Fingal Valley residents also have the services of Dr. Damien Reece who is based at Campbell Town. His address is 6 King Street and his telephone number is 003 811479. As well as general veterinary skills, Dr. Reece is also an experienced horse veterinarian.

For many years people living at Bicheno and nearby have been able

to take their sick animals to Dr. Peter Rees when he visits that town approximately every three weeks. This service will continue but Dr. Rees prefers his prospective clients to contact him beforehand at the Springfield Veterinary Centre, 31 Springfield Avenue, Moonah; the telephone number is 002 729090.

There is no telephone number for his Bicheno premises.

Additionally, pet owners in the Glamorgan municipality have the services of Dr. Glen Clarke who formerly ran a busy practice in Victoria. She now lives permanently in Swansea and can be contacted on 002 578186. Dr. Clarke is an experienced small animal surgeon; her main clinic day is Thursday and her surgery is located at the rear of the Glamorgan Council Chambers in Noyes Street.

What now is the role of the government Veterinary Officer in these changed circumstances? Clearly it would not be proper for there to be competition between the Department of Agriculture and private veterinarians, especially since so many are presently living in the district and relying on it as a source of income.

In future therefore, all companion animals will be the sole province of the private veterinary practitioners and cannot be treated by the Department of Agriculture in any of the three east coast municipalities. It is also important that the practitioners be given every opportunity of treating sick farm animals, except possibly where long distances from their surgeries make it uneconomical to do so. In such cases, in accordance with government policy, the Department of Agriculture Veterinary Officer will fill the gap.

All livestock disease investigation and control work will continue to be done by the D.V.O. as in the past, mostly free of charge. As time goes by it is likely that additional satellite clinics will be established on a periodic basis at St. Marys, Fingal, Bicheno and Avoca, to improve further veterinary services for east coast pet owners.

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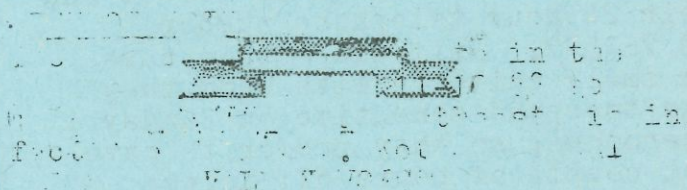

conclusion:-

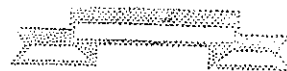
1. A FERTILE MIND
