When a plant appears dull and lustreless, with little growth over the active months, it is necessary to look more deeply into the problem.

Invariably the reason is one of two factors:-

- the growing plant has become "pot bound" -the root system having reached the stage of filling the container, leaving little room for soil.
- the roots of the plant have become affected by too constant wetting, insect infestation or disease.

Carefully remove the plant from its container without disturbing the soil any more than is necessary, and examine the root ball for any signs of the above problems. If the whole ball is heavily enmeshed with roots, leaving little space for soil, the restricted roots have not been capable of taking up sufficient water and food nutrients to sustain healthy growth, and it is time to re-plant in a larger container, adding new, balanced soil mixture, both under and around the existing root ball. Remove any matted or dead root sections and carefully loosen compact areas to encourage air circulation before re-potting.

As each houseplant grows it needs to feed on a balanced mixture of the major plant foods and trace elements present in the pot soil, to remain strong and healthy. Eventually these nutrients are exhausted, and it becomes necessary to replace them with some form of fertilisers.

There are many forms of fertilisers available to the indoor gardener -powdered or liquid mixtures to be diluted with water, coated fertilisers, spike fertilisers, slow release plant pills etc. They are commercially prepared in various balanced formulas to provide complete plant foods for general use or special mixtures suitable for particular types of plants.

In order to establish the best fertiliser for your particular needs, seek the advice of a reliable, experienced nurseryman and/or carefully read the literature and instructions on the various cans or packages available.

When feeding established houseplants with a balanced fertiliser the most important point is to follow the manufacturer's instructions implicitly.

Too strong a mixture can burn the leaves and/or roots of the more delicate plants in just the same way that a mixture which has been diluted with too much water will not provide sufficient plant nutrients to maintain healthy growth.

Over feeding plants can also cause problems - double applications of fertiliser will not produce twice the result, but could cause build up in the soil, which eventually becomes so concentrated as to cause damage to the plant roots.

When to feed plants is also important -the correct time being the commencement of and during the warmer months when they are actively growing. During the colder periods when the plant growth is dormant, extra foods are not required.

A constant warm temperature and a moderate humidity which is associated with comfortable, normal living for human beings is also applicable to most houseplants. An increase in temperature in natural, open atmospheres invariably causes an increase in the amount of moisture in the air. Enclosed areas can actually drop the humidity percentage considerably.

This not only causes humans to experience drying of the breathing passages, hair and skin, but also causes plants to lose their lustre, even causing drying and browning of the foliage leaf tips.

SENIOR CITIZENS FOREST TOUR

The Lions Club of St. Marys and the Forestry Commission joined forces with the Senior Citizens to conduct a tour of forestry operations on Wednesday November 9th.

Approximately 50 senior citizens from St. Marys, Cornwall and Fingal toured forestry operations in the Mt. Nicholas range and Evercreech areas.

District Forester Mr Bob Gordon showed the senior citizens forest logging operations in the Nicholas plantation area. These operations supply pulpwood for Australian Newsprint Mills pulp mill at Boyer, near Hobart. The paper produced is used in newspapers throughout Australia.

The pine harvesting operations involve large machines which cut the trees off at ground level, lift the tree up and place them on the ground in piles. Another machine then comes along, strips the branches from the tree and cuts them into log lengths.

The operations generate approximately \$1million in royalties and \$50million dollars worth of paper each year.

The group also inspected areas which the Forestry Commission has regenerated with native gum trees following logging operations.

The tour concluded with an inspection of the tallest flowering plant in the world, and a barbeque at the White Gum reserve.

Mr Jake Smythe of St. Marys Lions Club and Mr Bob Gordon of the Forestry Commission declared the tour a success and it may prove to be a regular event.

Mr Bob Gordon presented all those on the tour, with a native plant, on behalf of the Forestry Commission.

A spokesperson for the senior citizens, Mr Jack Miller, gave a vote of thanks to the coordinator Mr Jake Smythe, and the Lions members and the Lions ladies, also the Lions Club of St. Marys who, with the cooperation of the Forestry Commission, conducted a very pleasant and entertaining tour of the Fingal District Forest Reserve at Evercreech, where the tallest White Gum trees in the world grow.

If the vehicle was previously registered in Tasmania, check with the Motor Registry to see whether there is any hire purchase agreement or money owing on the vehicle.

The vehicle must be inspected before registration and you may drive the un-registered vehicle to a point of registration.

Registry charges will include stamp duty at the rate of \$3.60 in each \$100 of market value.
