### 'OMBUD' ?

The Prime Minister's Department, through the Office of the Status of Women, has given a \$3,600 grant to a Monash University linguist, Dr. Anne Pauwels, to produce a guide to "non-sexist" language for use in Government publications.

Some of the suggestions made are plainly ridiculous, others show an ignorance of the term language, and still others make a useful and common term into a stodgy and cumbersome phrase.

In the first category, ridiculous words, the Government suggests that manhole should be outlawed and replaced with access hole or utility hole. The battleground term, no man's land, should give way to neutral territory. "Mastery" has to go and be replaced by proficiency or competence. The brotherhood of man is also to be branded as illegal and replaced by "the bond of humanity".

"Fisherperson" is to be introduced in preference to fisherman, and, bewilderingly, "ombud" (which sounds like an insect) replaces ombudsman.

In the second category, ignorance of the language, words such as chairman and craftsman are eschewed in favour of chairperson or artisan. One would have thought that Dr Pauwels, as a linguist, should have known that the word "man" in each of these words originates from the Greek word for "hand". Thus, chairman merely means "one who handles the meeting" and craftsman means "one who fashions something by hand".

In the third category, the new non-sexist guide suggests awkward phrases to replace commonly used words merely because a gender bias is perceived. For example, "camera-man" must go, and cinematographer or camera operator be the replacements.

The guide additionally makes some fundamental errors in transferring words into non-sexist amalgams. Dr Pauwels suggests that women heading municipal governments should be called a "Mayor" instead of "Mayoress" and that the female head of an overseas mission is an Ambassador and not an Ambassadors.

Never has a woman Mayor been called a Mayoress. The latter term has always been applied to the hostess of a Mayor, whatever the Mayor's gender. The same principle applies to Ambassadors, which is used in some countries (Not Australia) as a social term for the wife of an Ambassador.

The guide shows ignorance in the reason for words. It suggests midwife is sexist and should be replaced with "maternity nurse", overlooking the fact that midwife is a statutory designation achieved after examination and maternity nurse is a lesser title.

It is time for the Government to stop wasting money on such trivial matters as this non-sexist guide which would be a joke if it was not taken so seriously by the A.L.P. The non-sexist guide to language is just another example of a Government which is increasingly out of touch with mainstream Australian opinion.

## LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

Recently my family and myself witnessed an act of cruelty on a sheep and lamb on a local farm that we will never forget. The flock of sheep were being moved from the shearing shed to a grazing paddock nearby; moved by 1 shepherd on a motor-bike and 5 dogs. One small lamb cut away from the flock and was set upon by the 5 dogs, which tore and mauled the lamb for at least 5 minutes while the shepherd rode around the action to watch the fun. Finally the lamb was pulled away from the dogs, up onto the motor-bike, taken to the flock and thrown onto the ground. Meanwhile the 5 dogs were tearing the meat from the lamb's mother which had dropped down in the grass from exhaustion. When the shepherd finally decided to go to the ewe's aid, it was pulled along by the leg alongside the motor-bike, with its head banging along the road to the near-by paddock. These scenes took place in front of my family crying, plus the shepherd's 2 little girls. On going to the sheep's aid his wife and I were abused and told to mind our own business. I realize that sometimes people are overworked and perhaps not feeling well, but nevertheless these animals did not deserve the cruelty that was dished out on them that day. Perhaps on reading this letter, people may say this sort of thing goes on all the time, but unfortunately for my family and myself, plus the 2 little girls, we had to witness this cruelty.
