WESLEY VALE PULP MILL

A commentary by

Unfortunately the debate over the Wesley Vale Mill has been clouded by hysterical rhetoric, fear tactics and misinformation. No responsible person wants to wilfully damage the environment by discharging copious quantities of chemicals into the air and water.

In particular, we do not want to repeat the disgraceful mess that has occurred at Burnie.

However, to suggest that the only way such a mistake can be avoided is not to build a mill is extremely misleading.

The Burnie mill was built in the 1930's. Since then there has been enormous advances in technology, our scientific knowledge is much more extensive and public opinion is much more alert to the problems.

That is not to say that there will not be some chemical discharge into the environment. Clearly there will be. The real question is, are the best achievable standards acceptable and what are the repercussions if we reject the mill?

Much has been said about dioxins being discharged. The environmental movement claims that no dioxins should be released into the sea or the atmosphere, and imply all sorts of nasty repercussions if any discharge occurs.

In fact, dioxins occur naturally in just about everything, including the human body. It is only when vast quantities upset the natural chemical balance that problems occur.

It is therefore possible to set acceptable standards for discharge that will not upset the natural environmental balance.

The State Government and the Company claim the standards agreed to are the best that known science and technology can achieve. I do not have enough scientific knowledge to argue with them, and I doubt that many other noisy so

called experts, do either.

If we reject the mill we reject the opportunity to process our own raw materials and we deny our children and grandchildren the economic opportunities that should be theirs.

We export over 4 million tonnes of woodchip each year to Japan. The Wesley Vale project proposes to process our raw materials in Tasmania, rather than in Japan. If we reject the mill it means we will continue to be a provider of raw materials to the Japanese, but all of the added benefits will go to Japanese workers and investors, rather than Tasmanians.

There is no doubt we need jobs right now, and we will continue to need jobs in the future. From the national point of view we also need to add value to our raw materials before they are exported, because of the impact it makes on the balance of payment deficit.

In deciding our attitude to the mill we need to think carefully of what is in the best interest of future generations, and not be caught up in emotive arguments or selfish responses.
