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MELANOMAS, BROWN SPOTS, MOLES AND

We should all be aware of any spots on our own body, and if you are at all worried about any particular lesion, consult your doctor.

After puberty a few people develop brown lesions which already show some of the worrying features, usually being larger in size than common moles and having irregular or Trauma should be avoided to preindistinct borders, speckled colours, vent lesions advancing. Take and often a "pebbly" surface. care that clothing, such as br

Obviously these need a closer watch so that any which go any stage further can be removed before the stage of malignant melanoma is reached.

Freckles and brown "age spots" are not difficult to recognise, and cause no cancers. Benign moles are evenly coloured: brown or black, and are roughly symmetrical: if the mole could be folded in half the two halves would superimpose.

Other brown patches or nodules such as seborrhoeic keratoses or nodular melanomas can readily be such spots are recognised and dealt with early enough the development of melanomas can be prevented.

The worrying brown lesions are nearly always larger than 8mm and grow from smaller ones, so there is time to identify them before they become dangerous.

Features to be looked for are a change in size, a change in colour, a change in shape, or a change in "feel".

Size: A spurt in growth, over a few weeks. Irregularities such as notches developing in the outline. Surface becoming

raised or uneven.

Colour: Spread of colour to previously normal skin. The development of darker areas, or red, blue or pale areas.

Feel:

Surface becoming scaly; crusting; weeping, or smoother because of the obliteration of normal skin lines. Itching or tenderness. A feeling of more "body" to the lesion. Bleeding.



Beat the yolk of 4 eggs and the shite of one until thick. Add the condensed milk and beat again. Add the lime juice and beat until thick. Beat the 3 remaining egg whites until dry and fold in the mixture. Tour into a baked pie shell Separate two eggs, beat the whites with two tablespoons of sugar until stiff and forms peaks, spread on top of pie and bake in oven until meringue is brown.

HOUSE HOLD HINTS

FURNISHINGS
Sponge stains on seagrass and honan squares with warm detergent suds; sponge first with clean damp cloths when with a cloth dipped in salty water.

Occasionally wipe all over with vinegar water: to cup vinegar in a bucket of cold water, avoid overwetting.

Bamboo and cane: Very dirty and neglected pieces can be scrubbed gently with warm soapy water. If possible work outside. hose can be used to rinse off the suds, provided the spray is fine. Dry out of direct sunlight and polish with silicone wax.

Carved furniture: Use a clean paintbrush or old shaving brush dipped in furniture oil of silicone wax to keep carved wood clean and polished.

STATES RIGHTS FURTHER THIERTED VILY

On the 3rd of September Australians must vote on a referendum question that, if passed, will further erode the dwindling rights and responsibilities of State government.

Under the umbralls of Rights and Freedoms the Federal Government is seeking to make changes to laws that concern the acquisition of property.

Overshadowed by the Trial by Jury and Freedom of Religion questions, with which it is to be grouped, the amendment concerning the caccuisition of property has received little public discussion.

The proposed amendment would extend to State Governments the same obligation that currently applies to the Commonwealth under section 51 of the Constitution. That is, to ensure that the acquisition of property from any person should be on 'just terms'.

But what is really meant by just terms? Is the amendment necessary, and will Australians benefit from a change to existing arrangements?

While the principle that underpins the notion of 'just terms' is concerned with fair dealing, it is an elusive and indistinct concept that has been the subject of protracted hearings before the High Court.

Exclanations of the legal meaning of the term run into pages and pages and even then fail to settle on a clear definition.

*The Federal Government is now seeking to extend this ambiguity into State Low.

T* seeks to do so despite the fact that the acquisition of land by State government and instrumentalities is clearly a State responsibility.

Furthermore, it aims to replace existing legislation, enacted by the States to govern property acquisition, with requirements that are in themselves unclear.

Even if it were suggested that State laws were in some respect inadequate in protecting the rights of individuals in those cases, it is not appropriate to over-ride existing legislation through amendments to the Constitution. Rether, amendments to the respective State acts would

constitute the proper course of oction.

If the belonce of power between the Commonwealth and the States is to be maintained, core must be taken not to undermine the States traditional areas of responsibility.

In recent years we have seen a significant shift in the balance of power in the favour of the Commonwealth. The expended interpretation of the Federal Government's External lifeairs power has seen to this.

By requiring States to comply with the ambiguous phrese proposed in the Referendum Bill, certainty will be replaced with confusion.

Those who are familiar with the Tasmanian Dams Case will be aware that compansation does not rest solely on the need to reach. 'just terms'. Satansive legal arguments as to what constitutes 'acquisition' and 'proparty' also are vital to the outcome.

The fact that 'just terms' must consider the interests of the community at large in addition to those directly, is another cause for concern.

The potential would exist for third parties to challenge greements for the acquisituon of property, between the State Government and property holders, on the basis that they conflict with the interests of the wider community.

The acid test of Constitutional amendments must surally be a tangible improvement in existing circumstances.

If clarity in arrangements for the acquisition of property, and the preservation of the rights of States to legislate in their traditional areas of responsibility are priorities, then this proposed Constitutional charge should be rejected.
