POSITION

World trade is very complex and for Australia to achieve a better share, we must all do better --- become more efficient, more competitive, more innovative, present our goods better, and be more considerate of our customers' particular requirements.

Australia is competing with the highly specialised countries of EEC, USA, and Japan on the one hand, and the low cost developing countries of the South East Asian area on the other.

Our position is very much governed by what happens in those countries and we must therefore maximise our position in the following ways.

1. Engage in conscious import substitution programmes.
2. On-process the goods we presently export in bulk - wool, minerals, wood, wheat etc.
3. Seek out "niche markets" for special goods in special places, maybe at special times of the year - soft fruits, out of season in the Northern Hemisphere.
4. Seek out firms whose products we already buy and with which we can develop joint ventures in Australia to produce all or part of those goods here.
5. Be Australian --- Buy Australian.

We cannot allow our overseas debt to continue to grow. Action must be taken and there are the avenues open to us to improve the raw figures.

BUT to sell more both at home and overseas every person must become more quality conscious until we can say "If it is Australian, it is good".

Our productivity must be better, in every kind of job we must do more, produce more, and waste less.

Our competitiveness on the world market must take account of our costs, benefits, and overheads.

No-one owes us a living, we must survive on our merits and it all starts with building on our trading position.

ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

FROM THE PARENT CO-ORDINATOR:

Hello! Let me introduce myself. My name is Marilyn Statham, and I am the Parent Co-ordinator. My husband and I have 2 children at St. Marys District High School and one at Rossarden Primary School. I work at the Rossarden Primary School as a part-time teachers aide.

Is there something that interests you or even worries you about the school? Let me know, and we'll organise - once this flu epidemic is over - a coffee morning where we can get together and discuss it all. Our children's education is very important, and we, as parents do have a role to play in it.

Visit to the Launceston College on 28th June 1988

Have you seen the Launceston College? I hadn't either until the 28th June. A group of children, parents and teachers were taken around the college to view the facilities and generally see what is available for our young people once they leave the High School.

It certainly was an eyeopener for my son, and for most of the young people and parents who went. The wide range of subjects available means that there is generally something for everyone. A couple of parents commented that they'd like to go there - I agree!! The facilities are going to be extensive by the time the Grade 7 children arrive there. It is expanding all the time and so are the number of courses.

Our children were given a chance to use the computers and many were surprised at their possible career options. The Electronics demonstration was quite "shocking" to some children whose hair "rose" to the occasion. The swim and sauna were enjoyed by most of the children. A tour of the college revealed the blend of old and new in it, and the extent of the building programme.

All-in-all, it was a very interesting day, and as my son said later; "It made me think about the future". And that, after all, is what it was all about.

Parent Action - from as early as possible, encourage your child to continue his/her education as far as possible. Start making financial plans for your child's tertiary education.
- 3) Most employment and education opportunities exist elsewhere.
Parent Action - start preparing yourself and your child for the day when your child must leave home to continue his/her education or seek employment.

FORTHCOMING REFERENDUM

The second of two articles by Jocelyn Newman
 Senator for Tasmania, dealing with each question
 separately.

QUESTION 2

Do you approve of an Act to alter
 the Constitution to provide for
 fair and democratic Parliamentary
 elections throughout Australia?

A recent episode of "Yes Minister"
 illustrated just how the wording
 of opinion polls can determine
 a positive or negative answer.
 The Government has worded question
 two so as to suggest that it
 would be almost unpatriotic to
 reject it.

The Head of the Morgan Gallup Poll
 Organisation commenting on the
 devious wording of the referendum
 proposals said "any public opin-
 ion polling company which asks
 questions as blatantly biased
 as the Government's referendum
 proposals would completely lose
 credibility".

If I were to ask you, as the
referendum will:

"Do you approve of an Act to
 alter the Constitution to provide
 fair and democratic parliamentary
 elections through Australia?"

Would your answer be the same as
 if I were to ask:

"Do you approve of an Act to
 alter the Constitution to give
 Canberra the power over State
 elections, and to force an
 electoral system on the States
 that cannot and would not apply
 to Federal Elections?"

You must say NO to the referendum
 question. To say yes to that,
 means that you are also saying
 yes to the second question, which
 any fairminded Australian would
 reject.

We all support fair and democra-
 tic elections, but the principle
 of one vote, one value ignores
 the fact that the Constitution
 already recognises that there
 are times when this does not
 always protect citizens interests.
 A prime example is the equality
 of State representation in the
 Senate and the minimum of five
 House of Representatives seats
 for Tasmania.

This proposal will do nothing to
 prevent gerrymanders. If elect-
 oral boundaries are drawn to
 include rural areas in suburban
 seats, or have all the same kind
 of suburbs in the one seat, the
 vote in that seat can be affected.

The rules and procedures applying
 to State elections are matters
 for the people of that State. If
 they are not happy with the system,
 then it is up to them to change it -
 not the Government in Canberra.
 That was the agreement which the
 States made in 1901 - without that
 agreement we would never have had
 a Federal Government at all.

QUESTION:4

Do you approve of an Act to alter
 the Constitution to extend the
 right of trial by jury, to extend
 the freedom of religion, and to
 insure fair terms for persons
 whose property is acquired by any
 Government?

This is not just one question -
 it is three questions, and if your
 answer to any of them is NO, then
 you must answer NO to all three.

Trial by jury and freedom of relig-
 ion are both rights already written
 into the Constitution. This question
 is not about enhancing human rights,
 but to sneak through the back
 door a mini Bill of Rights -
 a Bill which the Senate clearly
 defeated and which the people
 did not want.

The most disturbing danger of the
 religious proposal is that the
 High Court could interpret this
 new provision so that Government
 funding for church schools,
 church-run hospitals and nursing
 homes, etc. could be stopped.
 The list doesn't end there, there
 is just as much uncertainty about
 the broadcast of religious pro-
 grammes by the A.B.C., religious
 education in Government schools,
 prayers for Parliament, religious
 ceremonies at State and Federal
 occasions. In addition, extreme
 religious sects may be able to
 use the new wording to fight
 any Government attempt to stop
 unacceptable religious behaviour,
 such as female circumcision.

The real guarantee of liberty in
 Australia is to have strong,
 democratic institutions, a
 vigorous Parliamentary system,
 a free press and the common law.
 Our Constitution has provided
 Australia with a stable and
 democratic Government for the past
 87 years, and it should not be
 tampered with so lightly.
