World trade is very complex and for Australia to achieve a better share, we must all do better --- become more efficient, more competitive, more innovative, present our goods better, and be more considerate of our customers' particular requirements.

Australia is competing with the highly specialised countries of EEC, USA, and Japam on the one hand, and the low cost developing countries of the South East Asian area on the other,

Our position is very much governed by what happens in those countries and we must therefore maximise our position im the following ways.

- Engage in conscious import substitution programmes.
- On-process the goods we presently export in bulk wool, minerals, wood, wheat etc.
- Seek out "niche markets" for special goods in special places, maybe at special times of the yearsoft fruits, out of season in the Northern hemisphere.
- Seek out firms whose pro= ducts we already buy and with which we can develop joint ventures in Australia to produce all or part of those goods here.
- Be Australian ---Buy Australian.

We cannot allow our overseas debt to continue to grow. Action must be taken and there are the avenues open to us to improve the raw figures.

. BUT to sell more both at home and overseas every person must become more quality conscious until we can say "If it is Australiam, it is good".

Our productivity must be better, in every kind of job we must do more, produce more, and waste less.

Our competitiveness on the world market must take account of our costs, benefits, and overheads.

QUESTION 2

Do you approve of an Act to alter the Constitution to provide for fair and democratic Parliamentary clections throughout Australia?

illustrated just how the wording of opinion polls can datermina positive or negative answer. The Government has worded question Federal Government at all. two so as to suggest that it would be almost unpatriotic to reject it.

Organisation commenting on the devious wording of the referendum proposals said "any public opinion polling company which asks duestions as blatantly biased is the Government's referendum proposals would complately losa erodibility".

If I were to ask you, as the referendum will:

"Do you approve of an alter the Constitution to providfair and democratic parliamentary plactions through Australia?.

Yould your answer be the same as if I ware to ask:

"Do you approve of an Act to alter the Constitution to give Canbarra the power over State plactions, and to force an electoral system on the States that cannot and would not apply to Tederal Elections?.

You must say WO to the referendum question. To say yes to that, means that you are also saying yas to the second question, which any fairminded australian would

We all support fair and democratic elections, but the principle of one vote, one velue ignores the fact that the Constitution already recognises that there are times when this does not A prime example is the equality of State representation in the Sanate and the minimum of five House of Representatives seats for Tasmania.

This proposal will do nothing to provent gerrymanders. If electoral boundaries are drawn to include rural areas in suburban seats, or have all the same kind of suburbs in the one seat, the vote in that seat can be affected.

The rules and procedures applying to State elections are matters for the people of that State. If ections throughout Australia? they are not happy with the system, then it is up to them to change it -That was the agreement which the States made in 1901 - without that ogreement we would never have had

JUESTION: 4

Do you approve of an Act to alter The Head of the Morgan Gallup Foll the Constitution to extend the right of trial by jury, to extend the freedom of religion, and to nauro fair terms for persons whose property is acquired by any Government?

> This is not just one question it is three questions, and if your mawer to any of them is NO, then you must enswer NO to all three.

Trial by jury and freedom of religa ion are both rights already written into the Constitution. This question is not about anhancing human rights, but to sneak through the back door a mini Bill of Rights n Bill which the Senate clearly defeated and which the people did not wont.

The most disturbing danger of the roligios proposal is that the High Court could interpret this new provision so that Government funding for church schools, church-run hospitals and nursing homes, etc. could be stopped. The list doesn't end there, there is just as much uncertainty about the broadcast of religious programmes by the A.B.C., religious education in Government schools, prayers for Parliament, religious ceremonies at State and Federal occasions. In addition, extreme religious sects may be able to use the new wording to fight any Government attempt to stop always protect citizens interests. unacceptable religious behaviour, such as female circumcision.

> The real guarantee of liberty in Australia is to have strong, democratic institutions, a vigorous Parliamentary system, a free press and the comman law. Our Constitution has provided Australia with a stable and democratic Government for the past 87 years, and it should not be tampered with so lightly.
