GEORGE SHAW, M.L.C. today said---

I have studied the 4 proposals and am convinced that electors would be well advised to vote NO to all questions.

Mr. Shaw emphasised that although he held office of President he was speaking only as the Independent Member for Macquarie.

QUESTION 1. A proposed law. alter the Constitution to provide for four-year maximum terms for members of both Houses of the Commonwealth Parliament.

This proposal does not ensure fewer elections even though that is

its prime purpose.
We are told that four-year terms would enable proper planning and policy implementation, in short, better government.

However, the Prime Minister could call an election at any time providing the Governor-General agreed. Remember, the Governor-General is nominated by the Prime Minister. One must ask: Why did the Government fail to include a minimum three-year term as proposed by the Constitutional Commission?

This proposal is a cunning beguilement. The words chosen are an inaccurate summation of the proposed alterations to the constitu-

The purpose of the amendments is to impose the principle of Mone vote one value" on parliamentary elect-

ions throughout Australia. "One vote one value" means that every member of a House of Parliament should represent (within 10%) the same number of electors.

This cannot apply Throughout Australia and should not.

"Consumers concerned with the availability of preservative-free food products can look forward to a clarification of labelling regulations later this year."

Due to an oversight in the Foods Standards Code the food additive, sodium nitrito, currently escapes the requirement to be listed as a preservative on product labels. This is so despite the fact that it acts as a preservative in many processed foods.

"Consumers have a right to know exactly what additives are contained in the food they buy and I applicate the decision to resolve it.

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

It has been said - The proposed alterations are small steps of constitutional change. However, if approved 707 words will be deleted and 2005 words inserted.

Small? The changes so wrought would represent a giant leap

away from the principle of a Federation of States, each with significant sovereign autonomy under a Commonwealth Government with a limited and specifically defined charter;

towards a centralised Government and bureaucracy in Canberra ruling over some form of regional govern-

If this is the new direction it should not happen by subtle design under a charade of 'democratic' referenda.

Remember, words approved can only be changed by further refer-

Or is there another way? Since the High Court Dams case in 1983 when 7 High Court Judges (by 4 votes to 3) changed the external affairs principle (S51) it is patently clear that the vote of one Judge did, and can still do, what it was always intended only the people of Australia can do, namely, change the Constitution by referendum.







FIRST AID BURNS AND SCALDS

Treat by helding the area under cold running water. Large burns (say larger than the palm of a hand) or deep burns cause serious medical emergencies and require immediate treatment - do not apply greasy or pily substances. Treat for shock and apply a clean, dry dressing. Small burns may be treated, after cooling the burnt tissue in water, with an antiseptic burn cream on a gauze dressing. Do not puncture blisters.

Treat sunburn as above according to severity of burn. Prevention is best by using a protective cream suitable for your particular skin.
