NEW MARKETS by Max Burr, Federal Member for Lyons.

There are many new market opportunities opening up for Tasmanian agricultural products. The countries of South East Asia offer vast potential for expanding trade, particularly in our horticultural and dairy products. There are also innovative opportunities for such things as berries, cut flowers and a range of other products.

One thing is certain, if we are to expand our industries we must gear our production to the requirements of the export market. It is a simple fact that we can grow far more produce in Tasmania than our local population can consume.

If we are to take advantage of the new opportunities, there needs to be far more emphasis given to the marketing of Tasmanian Agricultural products. We cannot expect buyers to come to us - we must take our products to them.

However, markets need to be thoroughly researched. We must accept at the outset that the Asian people will not accept any old product that we care to send them, nor they should.

Eating habits in many Asian countries are rapidly changing from eastern to western foods. In most Asian countries education is compulsory and the standard of living is rising dramatically, along with rapidly growing economies. However, in each country the religion, culture, habits, likes and dislikes are different from each other and different from ours.

We cannot assume that a product suited to Japanese tastes will satisfy the Chinese, the Indians, the Indonesians, or other Asian people. Each may also have different packaging and labelling specifications and their delivery requirements will almost certainly be different.

What we must do is assess the needs of each country and then supply products that will satisfy the market in those individual countries. Austrade can be of great assistance but the initiative must be made by Tasmanian growers and exporters.

Japan is often hailed as the prime Asian market, but I feel other countries hold more potential

than Japan. Japan has a population of 130 million and they enjoy a very high standard of living. China has 1000 million people, India 800 million, Indonesia 170 million, Thailand 50 Million, Malaysia 18 million, Philippines 50 million and South Korea 38 million. Each has a rapidly growing economy and offer great potential for expanding trade.

Farmers must be market conscious. That does not mean that they should do their own marketing, but they should be conscious of the needs of consumers in each country. The product grown on Tasmanian farms, processed in factories, packaged, labelled, transported and delivered, must all be designed to meet the needs of consumers whose culture is very different from ours.

Transport to those markets is also extremely important and I urge the T.F.G.A. to be vigorous in their efforts to ensure we have better transport services available. Much of South East Asia could, and should, be supplied by direct air freighting. Air freight allows us to put our product on the market in the best possible condition and therefore command the best possible prices.

However, Australia does not have a specialised air freighting service. All international air service arrangements are controlled directly or indirectly by Qantas, and Qantas does not have enough capital to provide more aircraft for more services.

For that reason it is essential that the capital base of Qantas be expanded quickly. There should also be a change in Government policy to allow other carriers to provide either charter or scheduled services that Qantas are not able to provide. If these things do not happen, the lack of transport services will severely restrict the capacity of Australian producers to take advantage of the new Asian markets, and it is our agricultural products that will be most affected.
