## JET

The new JET program. Jobs, Education and Training for sole Parents.

It's not easy to get a job when you're bringing up a child on your own. That's why the Commonwealth Government has started JET, a new job program just for sole parents.

Apart from helping sole parents get back into the workforce so they're more financially independent, JET can also provide special assistance with child care.

Sole parents will often need to brush up on old skills or learn new ones. But, whatever they have to do to improve their job prospects, they won't have to stop being a good parent.

In fact, by increasing their income, they'll be able to provide a better lifestyle for their children. As parents, they'll be doing a better job than ever.

**HOW JET WORKS** JET is a major Commonwealth Government program. It combines the resources of three departments: the Department of Social Security (DSS) the Department of Employment, Education and Training (DEET) and the Department of Community Services and Health (DCS&H).

However, JET is totally voluntary. It's up to sole parents to take the first step. Once they've decided to try to go back to work and participate in JET, they will meet a JET Adviser at their local DSS who will assess their personal situation and recommend a plan of action.

The JET Adviser will refer sole parents to a JET Contact Officer at the Commonwealth Employment Service (CES). Depending on their readiness to enter the workforce, the JET Contact Officer will either start looking for suitable job opportunities or arrange for them to attend training courses.

DCS&H and the JET Adviser will help arrange child care for sole parents while they're attending courses and for 12 weeks after they find a job.

### THE COMMUNITIES' ROLE IN SPREADING THE WORD

Apart from all the services offered by the Commonwealth Government, the JET Adviser will often refer sole parents to services available in the local community. That's where you come in. If your agency can provide counselling and advice on housing, transport, financial or legal matters, child care or anything else, you have an important role to play in helping sole parents get back into the workforce.

JET will be strongly promoted through local press, outdoor advertising and personal letters.

However, you are in a unique position to help the news spread by word of mouth. If you know any sole parents in your local area who are not aware of the new JET program, please make sure you let them know about it and put them in touch with a JET Adviser at the DSS.

Ultimately, the success of JET depends on how well it is received and supported by community agencies. Therefore, it's important for us to know what you think of JET, its weaknesses and its strengths.

If you have any suggestions on how it can be improved or how you can be of assistance, please do not hesitate to contact us.

The best person to speak to is the JET Adviser at your local DSS. Alternatively, you can express your views to DSS Social Workers, Area Outreach Officers, Aboriginal or Migrant Liaison Officers in the DSS, DSS Regional Office Managers or your local CES Manager.

The more you know about JET, the more chance it will have of succeeding. If you'd like to learn more about JET, you can arrange for your local JET Adviser to give a talk or hold a seminar.

With your support and encouragement, they'll have a better chance of finding employment, improving their standard of living and being more productive within the community.

# 1989 ANNUAL REPORT FOR THE OLD TASMANIAN HOTEL CIVIC CENTRE INC.

Considerable progress has been made this year on restoration of the building and regular use has been made of such completed facilities available.

Mr. Tennick was employed for a full year and other contractors. This was financed by the Public Bodies Assistance Loan, but work has now ceased. Toilets and kitchen have yet to be completed in the building and the youth room in the west wing. The kitchen is of importance for persons wanting to use the facility for functions and catering.

Use of the recreation room has been let for service fee only to the Senior Citizens Indoor Bowls every Monday afternoon. The gallery room is now carpeted and heated and used as the Curiosity Shoppe and Tea Room. The office has been carpeted and an electric typewriter purchased. (The addition of a copier would be a great benefit to the complex and the general public.) We are grateful to the Council, Forestry and School for the use of their facilities during the year.

TOURISM is of increasing importance in the Fingal Valley and this

office has become the centre of enquiry of hundreds of tourists during the year. A 'Tourist Information' sign and brochure stand have been installed and also a display board has been erected for tourist info., which attracts much interest.

NEIGHBOURHOOD HOUSE rooms have been completed and their committee operate an Op Shop, Toy Library, Playcentre, Drop-in Centre, classes, and morning and afternoon teas.

Two rooms are currently leased. The front paving has been undertaken. Furniture for the building was purchased - 20 chairs and 3 tables but we need more chairs for functions. The Curiosity Shoppe continues to turn over a small amount of goods and local handcrafts and is an interest point for visitors. Special thanks to a very supportive committee and to Mr. Jack Miller for his role as Office Manager.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR.

Dear Sir,  
 Little media attention has focused on the Hawke Government's Legislation to establish a Vocational Register for General Practitioners, which was passed in the Senate last week after the Democrats voted with the Government. This register effectively creates two classes of doctors, and in particular discriminates against women practitioners.

When this proposal was first raised in the Parliament, the Coalition opposed it on the grounds that it placed too much power in the hands of the Royal Australian College of General Practitioners (RACGP), is discriminatory, and that not enough was known about the details which would govern its implementation. Our decision to refer this proposal to a Senate Select Committee was vindicated by the Committee who found a number of serious defects in the Legislation.

Under the Legislation, doctors who are going into semi-retirement and choose to do only one session a week so as to continue to care for some of their "special" patients, and doctors who have been working full or part time in special interest areas such as sexual assault centres, sports medicine, family planning, or breast cancer screening, will not qualify as being "predominantly" in general practice and will be paid as second class doctors.

Although these doctors can still practice, they will receive a lower rate of pay than those on the register, no matter how great their experience or expertise. They could be excellent G.P.'s but because they choose to work in another area they will have their income and status reduced.

Many female graduates will be discriminated against because they often marry soon after graduation. These women will find it extremely difficult to have children and remain active in medical practice at the level required to meet the demands of the RACGP. They will also find it difficult to join a practice as their ability to generate a high level of revenue will be greatly reduced.

Women want better access to a variety of general and specialist services and for more women to be trained to deliver these services. This Vocational Register will do just the opposite.

The AGM held at Four Mile Creek, had approximately 70% representation of home owners in the area. Matters discussed included:

1. The Fingal Planning Scheme
2. The New East Coast Ward
3. Closure of the Four Mile Creek Bridge
4. Boat Launching Access
5. Sealing of the bypass, and general maintenance
6. Sealing of the road into the township
7. Planning and development of the Public Open Space
8. Access and Camping at McIntyres Beach
9. 4WD vehicles on Four Mile Creek Beaches
10. Election of Officer Bearers

1. THE FINGAL PLANNING SCHEME. It was resolved that the Association would support and pursue with interest, the proposed Planning Scheme and to be involved with any development plans for the area.

2. THE NEW EAST COAST WARD. Hopefully Four Mile Creek will get better representation from the new ward.

3. THE CLOSURE OF THE BRIDGE TO VEHICULAR TRAFFIC. The situation was explained and accepted and there was no further discussion.

4. BOAT LAUNCHING ACCESS. A sub-committee was formed to set up a small ramp into the northern side of the creek, adjacent and east of the bridge. The Council and the DMR will be approached for assistance.

5. SEALING OF THE BYPASS. Many people were concerned that the sealing of the bypass of Four Mile Creek had not been undertaken and correspondence will be sent to the DMR.

6. SEALING OF THE ROAD INTO THE TOWNSHIP. This subject seemed to raise the most interest. Many ratepayers complained that they had not seen anything from Council for their rates over the last 10-15 years. The Association has approached Council on many occasions, with no positive result, but hopefully this will change. Other problems have occurred with gutter and pipe drainage, that needs to be rectified by Council. The general road maintenance by the Fingal Council was thought generally to be abysmal.

7. PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT OF PUBLIC OPEN SPACE. The Council has been asked by the ratepayers association to have the Dept of Sports and Recreation do a feasibility study of the area, but as yet we have had no response to our letters. In the meantime, a working bee will be held on Sunday November 6, (long weekend) to clean up the area. We have approached Council every year, to reduce the fire hazard on the open space by slashing, but this has not occurred in 10 years of request. Bruce Hogarth volunteered his tractor to slash the area this year, together with the cleanup.

8. CAMPING. Approaches have been made to the Dept of Lands to establish a Reserve and camping area at McIntyres Beach. The previous Liberal Government agreed in writing, to establish a Reserve in this area, but the new Government "Accord" have been very tardy in their response to our correspondence. The general feeling of the meeting was to move camping from public open space and make it a day use area only.

9. RESERVE MANAGEMENT. Many were concerned about 4WD vehicles on the beach, and general poor management of the Beach Reserves by the Dept of Lands.

The Country Areas program caters for all students from Avoca, Rossarden, Mathinna, Fingal, Bicheno, St Marys and St Helens Schools.

The Country Areas Program is funded by the Commonwealth Government through the Department of Employment, Education and Training. The Program has been operating for the past ten years, supporting programs in both government and non government schools throughout Australia.

The Country Areas Program is designed to assist children in the Primary, Secondary and Senior Secondary age categories. The program aims to improve the educational participation and achievement of students disadvantaged by restricted access to social, cultural and educational activities and services as a result of geographical isolation. The program also provides a framework whereby schools and isolated communities can work co-operatively to improve the educational opportunities available to country children. The Country Areas Program encourages a high community participation and attempts to capitalise on the strengths of country communities.

The basic objectives of the Program are to find ways of overcoming isolation through sharing resources, broadening students' understanding of occupational horizons, building students' self esteem, making imaginative use of the expertise of local people, providing children with access to a range of cultural activities and providing opportunities for teachers to interact with parents and their community.

Projects funded by the program generally fall into five categories. These include the employment of specialist staff, the funding of school trips and excursions, the purchase of a wide range of materials and equipment, the support of minor works programs and the provision of in-service and staff development programs for teachers or community members involved in the Program.
