FIRE AWARENESS

This week in November is FIRE AWARENESS WEEK, and with the summer season almost here, now is the time to attend to any fire hazards you may have around your home and property. An ounce of prevention now, may avert a major disaster this summer. If a fire does start, DON'T PANIC AND DON'T WASTE TIME. CALL THE FIRE BRIGADE. DIAL 000, ASK FOR THE FIRE BRIGADE AND GIVE THE ADDRESS OF THE FIRE.

HOME FIRE SAFETY
Outside the home, remove long grass, dry leaves, etc. from your property, also combustibles from around and under your house. Clean out guttering and downpipes regularly, and keep fire breaks clear.

If you light a fire, be cautious

and comply with the regulations for burning. Don't burn when windy. Listen to fire weather reports and

be guided by them.

As for flammable liquids, don't use petrol or kerosene, or any other flammable liquid to light or revive a fire. Keep flammable liquids properly labelled and sealed containers, preferably outside the home in a garage or shed. Make sure they are out of the reach of children. This

portable heaters should be placed

on electrical faults. Never run extension cords under rugs or over hooked nails, and remember not to overload electrical circuits. Don't leave tea towels over stoves or cook tops to dry. See that sauce-pan handles do not face outwards into the room or are overa lighted hot plate or burner. If a sauce-pan does catch alight, switch off the heat and smother the saucepan with a lid, damp cloth or appropron a fat fire. Do not pick up and carry a burning container.

Have electrical appliances checked regularly, particularly electric blankets. See that frayed and damaged flexes and cords are repaired or better still, Use only the correct replaced. size fuse in each socket. Never use substitutes.

Repairs and alterations should only be carried out by a qualified

electrician.

Don't allow anyone in your family to smoke in bed. Make a bedtime check of upholstered furniture for smoldering cigarette

butts, particularly after a party.
Approximately 50% of all fire
deaths occur at night while people sleep. You can't rely on your own senses to detect a fire.
Investing in a smoke detector may be a wise decision, giving you added protection only a smoke detector can provide. You can contact your local fire brigade for information.

Remember even barbecues and back yard incinerators may not be lit on high fire danger days or total fire ban days. Take extra lit a garage or shed. A GUIDE TO DOOR TO DOOR SALES.

The Poor to Poor Trading Act 1986 gives consumers certain rights when buying goods and services outside retail premises.

Basically, the Act is meant to give you time to think, after the salesperson has left, so that you an decide whether the offered goods or services are really needed.

Most consumers purchase goods or services every day. However only a small number of these purchases are covered by the Door to Door Trading Act. Usually they will be sales to you in your home or at work.

WHAT IS COVERED.

It is important to check to see if the Act Applies or will apply to your purchase.

The transaction IS covered if: : The salesperson calls uninvited

- : The salesperson rings you up and arranges a visit,
- : You respond to advertising Material that is addressed to you.

: The goods or services offered cost \$50 or more.

The requirements of the Act gannot

be avoided by splitting the transaction into two or more contracts of under \$50 each - where these contracts relate substantially to the same transaction, they will be treated as one contract.

The transaction is not covered if:

:You personally invite the sales-

person to call.

:You visit the salesperson's

premises unimvited.

:You telephone the salosperson after reading advertising material and ask the salesperson to visit/Goods or services listed on the back of this pamphlet are not covered by the Door to Door Trading Act 1986.

The Salesperson.

A Salesperson must immediately provide identification, advise the reason for calling, andmust leave when asked to do so. A Salesperson may not harass or coerce a consumer or prevent a consumer from exercising a right under the Act.

RIGHTS.

A Salesperson cannot exclude, retrict or modify any rights given to the consumer under the Act. Additionally, the consumer cannot agree to waive any right.





