ETIQUETTE IN OUR NATIONAL PARKS.

Etiquette and common sense should be observed as a matter of course in Tasmania's National Parks. The hints below, are prepared to assist all Tasmanians and visitors alike with the expected behaviour.

First of all, domestic pets are NOT ALLOWED in any of our National Parks and State Reserves. No exceptions to this rule are permitted, and any violation of this regulation may result in a heavy fine.

Check with the Ranger whether fires are permitted as, on a day of high fire risk, possibly no fire should be lit in the open air. Fires must not be left unattended.

Wild-life should not be offered food, as they may become a nuisance to other people. Where no rubbish bins are provided, burn all food scraps. Do not bury them, as devils or possums may dig them up. Burn paper, but not plastic, glass, foil or cans as these are nearly indestructible and remain an eyesore. The motto is "IF YOU CAN CARRY IT IN, YOU CAN CARRY IT OUT".

Parties entering wilderness areas should consult the ranger for current information, and leave him with a proposed itinerary of their trip; remembering also to advise the ranger upon their safe return.

Directional signs have been erected to help. Do not tamper with signs. Hikers who follow you may become lost, resulting in a costly search and rescue effort-OR TRAGEDY.

First possession of a hut does not mean that you own it. Every person has a right to shelter. Late-comers should be welcomed and, if necessary, you should squeeze up to make room.

Do not waste tank water. It is very precious.

It is more than a courtesy to replenish established wood supplies. In the case of those who have been exposed to cold and wet conditions, it is an essential safety factor.

All flora and fauna in your parks are strictly protected. This means that you should not take home "souvenirs" of your visit or deface anything in the Parks. Names and initials which you have carved or painted on trees, rocks, park buildings etc. are monuments not to your fame, but your shame.

Adults in charge of large groups of children should keep them under supervision, and endeavour to educate them in good park behaviour.

Visitors often move in areas not regularly inspected by the ranger.

It is appreciated if any situation requiring attention is reported.

HANDY HOME HINTS:
