TAKING A TRIP BACK IN TIME

EXTRACTS FROM WEEKLY COURIERS

AVOCA NOTES: MAY 19, 1906..

A ball was given on Friday evening in Foster's Hall, by a committee of gentlemen from the Togo Tin Mine. The hall was prettily decorated with greenery and Chinese lanterns. There was a large attendance. An excellent supper was served and dancing was kept up until 2.30am.

Mr. James McCarthy supplied the music and Mr Ernest Malkin was an efficient M.C.

JUNE 16, 1906.. AN ACCIDENT.. A young man in the employ of Messrs. Fitzgerald Bros. Brookstead, had the misfortune to break his leg while out riding on Monday. The sufferer was at once conveyed to hospital.

AUGUST 3, 1901.. 'ROCK HOUSE' on the St. Pauls Road; which was burnt down some time ago, is now being rebuilt.

DECEMBER 21, 1901.. FIRE AT AVOCA..

Mr. C.M. Foster's stables, consisting of 16 stalls, coachhouse, and woodshed was totally consumed by fire on the night of the 13th inst. The outbreak was discovered at about 10.30pm and in a brief space all the inhabitants were on the spot. The horses, 13 in number, were got out, and then the vehicles. There being a quantity of hay in the large loft it was impossible to save the building, but the structure was insured, but not to its value, besides which Mr. Foster lost about 50 pounds worth of harness, a chaffcutter, a quantity of hay and a large stack of wood.

MAY 20, 1909.. PLENTY OF MOISTURE..

Yesterday was the first day since Wednesday that we saw the sun. We have been favoured with a great down-pour of rain and the rivers have risen considerably. The crops around the district are looking very well, especially those at 'Henbury'. The new resident, Mr. Hamlet Fletcher sustained a loss last week through the death of a valuable mare. The animal collided with a gate post, and fell and broke its neck. The cart was unharmed.

GENERAL INFORMATION.. AVOCA..

The area was known as St. Paul's Plains until the name Avoca came into general use in 1834. In 1839

the town was officially gazetted as Avoca, although records at the Fingal Council show that the township was not gazetted until 1866.

1838: A petition was sent to the Governor re the building of a church.

1840: When the church was being erected the population was given as 251, bound and free.

1841: The Postmaster was appointed.

1842: The Rectory was commenced but not finished for several years due to lack of funds.

1842: The Union Hotel was built about this time.

1850: The Parish Hall was built by Robert Foster.

1851: The Church bell was sold for 4 pounds and 4 shillings, and a new one bought weighing 224lbs.

1852: A Coach started running to Avoca.

1855: The Avoca Grammar School was built in Blenheim St.

1880: Finances were so bad that the Avoca Parish voted to unite with Fingal.

1885: Consecration of the Avoca Anglican Church.

1886: The Railway was opened between Conara and St. Marys.

1907: The opening of the Avoca Public Hall.

1973: The closing of the 'Stanhope' Coalmine, Avoca.

PRESS STATEMENT BY MAX BURR,

M.H.R. MEMBER FOR LYONS.

The forthcoming election is extremely important because it will set the trend for Australia to move into the next century.

Without doubt changes are needed.

Our cultural and ethical standards have unfortunately deteriorated to the point where many people believe that the country owes them a living, regardless of their own personal contribution. Changes are also needed to our economy because in the recent past our standard of living has been supported with borrowed money rather than our own productive efforts. We should be careful not to be side-tracked by irrelevant side-show issues that the media constantly raise. Our consideration should centre on the major policies that are being presented by the main parties. It is those policies that will govern our fate for the next three years.

Raising the ethical standards in our public administration should also be a feature in the public mind during the election campaign. Those standards have sadly deteriorated due to the number of backroom deals that have conveyed some privilege on a chosen few by using the power of Government. The Fitzgerald enquiry only touched the tip of the iceberg. If we want higher standards in the community we must demand higher standards from our leaders.

No doubt interest rates and other hip pocket issues will be high on the agenda. The present policies are unsustainable because many private citizens are losing their savings, while an increasing number of businesses are going to the wall. Please don't be deceived by proposals that look attractive but can't be sustained. We must build a

sound base of security for the future.

Environmental issues will no doubt feature. While such issues are important we must not allow ourselves to be misled by fanatical conservationists. Tasmania desperately needs balanced and common sense projects that will develop and add value to our natural resources. We have an obligation to build a sound structure for future generations and that can be done by protecting and improving our environment, while at the same time developing new industries.

The policies we accept during this campaign must be designed for security and higher standards for the rest of the decade and into the next century. Our children have a right to demand no less of us.

PLAY AND SAFETY

The surfacing around playground
equipments is of the greatest impor-
tance. Sand, gravel, granulated pine
bark and rubber matting are materials
which if provided in a sufficiently
thick layer, have a relatively
satisfactory shock absorbing ability.
They should, however, not be used
indiscriminately, but selectively
achieve optimum effect.

Should children fall off play-
ground equipment - which they unavoid-
ably will from time to time - they
have a reasonable chance of making
a soft landing if the surface is
right.

They will learn that it hurts
when they fall, but they will hope-
fully avoid a trip to the outpatients
department of a hospital, or worse.

The Franklin Institute Research
Laboratories, U.S.A. have made a
comparative test concerning the
relationship between surface material
under playground equipment.

An increasingly comprehensive
statistical material based on tens
of thousands of accidents shows that
children between 2 - 8 years of age
are most at risk on the playground.

The most common causes of accidents
are falls from playground equip-
ment, bad surfacing, incorrect
scaling and methods of construction,
plus lack of maintenance.

UNSECURED DOGS ARE LAW BREAKERS
Many owners of domestic dogs,
particularly tradesmen, are regularly
breaking the law- most without
knowing it. The Dog Control of
1987 prevents dogs from being
carried outside the cabin of the
vehicle (i.e.- on the back of a
utility or truck) without being
properly secured.

If charged and convicted, off-
enders can be fined up to \$100.
Section 83(1) of the Dog Control
Act states that "A person shall
not drive a vehicle on a public
street with a dog on or in the
vehicle if the dog is outside the
cabin of the vehicle."

It is also illegal to have
under your charge or control while
riding a bicycle or motorcycle.
There are exceptions however.
The act provides the exemption if,
in the case of a vehicle, the dog
is secured in a safe manner or if
the dog is a working dog (e.g.-
farm dog). The same applies to
motorcycles: if it's a working dog
it's exempt; also, if the dog is
enclosed in a safe manner in the
pillion area.
So, those who drive about with
their domestic dog roaming freely
in the back of their ute or truck,
beware. You are not only com-
promising the dog's safety,
you are breaking the law.
