I would like to advise the community that an 8 seater bus is now at the service of the elderly and disabled throughout our region-including Mathinna, Mangana, Fingal, Cornwall, Falmouth, Scamander and St. Marys.

The vehicle has been provided by H.A.C.C. (Home and Community Care) and the ongoing costs are being handled by Red Cross Hobart Office.

We hope to be able to give an efficient service providing transport for our elderly and disabled to physiotherapy, day care and diversional therapy at SMDH, Drs visits, optometrists visits at SMDH, and social outings - allowing interaction throughout our community.

I will be co-ordinating the service with the help of Patsy Burgess, RN, Gail Miller, RN, and Cheryl Summerfield. If you feel you are entitled to use this service, or know of someone who is, please phone 722153.

We are running the bus on a 5 day voluntary driver basis, and presently have a workable roster, but more volunteer drivers are still urgently needed - again phone 722153 if you can help.

A transport service is long overdue in our community and hopefully, our ultimate aim, of enabling the elderly or disabled to remain in their own homes, and helping to preserve their independence, can be achieved by this service.

PETS AND YOUR CHILDREN

Pets help children to learn from an early age to care for the many creatures that share the world with them.

In caring for a pet, a child learns to understand patience, tolerance, self-sacrifice and love of other living creatures.

For the sake of the pet and its owner, a pet should be trained to obey. Pets should be treated with kindness and affection; but they should also be firmly and consistently taught what behaviour is acceptable.

Parents, for their part, should be aware that there are diseases, minor and serious, which pets can pass on to humans.

The risk of catching any of these diseases is very small IF a little care and commonsense is applied to caring for and controlling pets, and to teaching children about 'pet hygiene'.

Always wash your hands thoroughly-and make sure your children do the same- after handling pets, especially before touching food for human consumption.

Food for humans should be protected from pets at all times, and pets should be kept off tables and kitchen benches.

'Offal', which is the internal organs of livestock (livers, lungs, hearts, etc.) cannot legally be used as dog food in Tasmania because of the risk of hydatids.

Pets should have their own dishes, which should be washed separately from household dishes and allowed to drain without wiping.

Pets should be trained as far as possible not to excrete on areas where children play. Children's sandpits should be kept covered when not in use. All droppings of cats and dogs should be removed from lawns and play areas each day.

The Register will provide Ministers, departments and authorities with a guide to those women who are interested in such government appointments.

WHY DO WE NEED IT?

The Government would like to see more women appointed to public bodies.

In the past even suitably qualified women have had few of the avenues open to men to be nominated to serve on Government boards and instrumentalities. Traditionally, women lack the networks set up through professional, political or business patronage available to men.

The Register will ensure that the names of women are put forward when possible appointees are being considered.

HOW WILL IT WORK?

Any interested woman may place her name on the Register, simply by completing a registration form, and returning it to the Department of the Premier and Cabinet in Hobart. The Register will be maintained and regularly updated by the Department on a computer system, which allows nominees to be selected on a range of criteria.
