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WINTER

Spending some time preparing the car for winter can help save the frustration and inconvenience of being broken down on the side of the road on a wet, wintry night.

Cold and wet weather will show up any weaknesses your car may have.

Simply put, when driving on wet roads --- slow down.

Extra care should be taken, the distance to the car in front should be doubled and all manoeuvres should be clearly and early indicated, especially in poor visibility.

Be very careful on wet roads after a dry spell. The build up of oil, grease, rubber and dust usually results in slippery surfaces. During heavy rain, flooding can often occur from overflowed gutters and rivulets. A car aquaplanes when it builds up a cushion of water ahead of the rolling tyre. If the tread grooves cannot allow sufficient water to pass through, the tyre loses road contact and actually floats on a wedge of water.

When that happens, brakes and steering are virtually ineffective. The remedy? Slow down until speed drops sufficiently for the tyres to make road contact again.

Driving in fog can be one of the most frustrating and dangerous conditions facing motorists. In dense fog, it is easy to become confused. It is wise to travel slowly and to use the road edge markings for guidance. The desire to stay close to the centre lines on single lane highways should be avoided as this could result in a head-on collision with another vehicle. Lights should be dipped.

A common practice of drivers under foggy conditions is to closely follow the tail lights of the vehicle ahead. This is extremely dangerous and can lead to multi-vehicle collisions.

Remember: The basic keys to safe wet weather motoring are - slow down, be alert and maintain a safe margin to the car in front.

MOTORING

Here is a list of things to check on your car to ensure you have a much safer winter this year.

BATTERY: Check the battery's water level and, if necessary, top it up with distilled water. Check that the battery posts, terminals and main earth terminals are clean and tight. Clean the posts and terminals with a thin smear of petroleum jelly.

LIGHTS: Check that all lights are functioning correctly and have the realignment checked. You could also consider having a high-mounted brake light fitted, a proven safety aid, particularly in poor visibility.

WIRING: Check all wires and connections for fraying, looseness or corrosion. Renew any wires on which the insulation material is perished, cracked or worn.

BELTS AND HOSES: Ensure the fan belt is in good condition and is tight enough so that it does not slip. Make sure there are no leaks in the hoses, no loose hose clips and that the metal parts are not chafing the hoses.

BRAKES AND TYRES: Test the brakes. They need attention if they are not effective in an emergency stop, if the car pulls to one side, or if the pedal sinks to the floor. The handbrake should stop the car rolling backwards on a steep hill. Make sure the tyres, including the spare, have plenty of tread and are properly inflated. Check the jack and wheelbrace.

WIPERS AND WASHERS: Check that the windscreen wipers work properly and that the blades are in good condition. Check the windscreen washer and top up the washer bottle.

ST MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

NATIONAL GOALS FOR SCHOOLING IN AUSTRALIA.

At the April, 1989 meeting of the Australian Education Council, the following goals for schooling in Australia were endorsed.

1. To provide excellent education for all young people, being one which develops their talents and capacities to full potential, and is relevant to the social, cultural and economic needs of the nation.
2. To enable all students to achieve high standards of learning and to develop self-confidence, optimism, high self-esteem, respect for others, and achievement of personal excellence.
3. To promote equality of educational opportunities, and to provide for groups with special learning requirements.
4. To respond to the current and emerging economic and social needs of the nation, and to provide those skills which will allow students maximum flexibility and adaptability in their future employment and other aspects of life.
5. To provide a foundation for further education and training, in terms of knowledge and skills, respect for learning and positive attitudes for life-long education.
6. To develop in students:
 - (a) the skills of English literacy including skills in listening, speaking, reading and writing;
 - (b) skills of numeracy, and other mathematical skills;
 - (c) skills of analysis and problem solving;
 - (d) skills of information processing and computing;
 - (e) an understanding of the role of science and technology in society, together with scientific and technological skills;
 - (f) a knowledge and appreciation of Australia's historical and geographic context;
 - (g) a knowledge of languages other than English;
 - (h) an appreciation and understanding of, and confidence to participate in, the creative arts;
 - (i) an understanding of and concern for balanced development and the global environment; and
 - (j) a capacity to exercise judgement in matters of morality, ethics and social justice.
7. To develop knowledge, skills attitudes and values which will enable students to participate as active and informed citizens in our democratic Australian society within an international context.
8. To provide students with an understanding and respect for our cultural heritage including the particular cultural background of Aboriginal and ethnic groups.
9. To provide for the physical development and personal health and fitness of students, and for the creative use of leisure time.
10. To provide appropriate career education and knowledge of the world of work, including an understanding of the nature and place of work in our society.

PRESS RELEASE

The recent State Election is cause for concern for the members of both major political parties. 18% of people voted for independent candidates. The result follows a similar trend in N.S.W. and W.A. State elections.

It is too simplistic to claim that every vote for independent candidates was based on the single issue of conservation or the Wesley Vale Mill.

Clearly there is considerable disillusionment with the major political parties. Many Australians have either arrogant contempt, cynical disbelief or apathetic indifference for the statements and actions of politicians. The public responses are unfortunate because the actions of Governments affect the daily lives of all citizens.

The unfortunate fact that philosophy has been replaced by expediency by all political parties is beyond question.

It may suit the ambition of politicians to scrap their philosophic beliefs because they are desperate to win power at all costs. However, the community is desperate for a Government based on principles and integrity.

Rather than scorning the trend adopted by voters, the major parties should desperately seek the reasons why they are not fulfilling the needs and expectations of the community. It is not good enough for political parties to simply claim the others are worse and expect that to be sufficient reason for public support.

The community needs hope for the future and the confidence that public figures will be motivated by honesty and integrity. It is obligatory on the major political parties to apply their best endeavours to ensure that the community demands are met.

If the major parties do not improve the standard of integrity they display there will continue to be a drift in public support toward fringe groups. The end result could easily be an alarming destabilisation of the entire political system.
