On August 24, 1989 the Hydro-Electric Commission's reconstructed Customer Service Area at St. Marys was opened by the General Manager, Mr Don Williams.

In opening the building Mr Williams said that St. Marys would now be able to provide Hydro Customers with much improved service and surroundings.

"The Commission must move with the times and take advantage of technological advances," he said.

"Linked as it is to the State-wide computer based Customer Information System, this Depot is now able to provide customers with up-to-date and instant information," said Mr Williams.

The reconstructed Depot was designed by the Commission's Architectural Section. During the construction period, Commission personnel were housed in transportable office modules. Contractors for the construction were L.D. Crack and Sons of Braxholm and the contract price was about \$211,000.

The catering for the opening was a buffet luncheon, provided by the St. Marys Swimming Pool Committee.

A SHORT HISTORY OF THE H.E.C. IN THIS DISTRICT.

The H.E.C. came to the Fingal Municipality around 1930. At that time Mr Dick Franks, District Foreman was the only employee in the district. His only transportation was a utility. The districts included Avoca, Fingal and St. Marys. Mr Franks lived in the home now owned by Mr Harold Quinn in Storey St, opposite the Police Station.

Four years later, Mr W. Hodgkinson was appointed District Foreman and he resided at the same address,

for about 2 years. He then moved to the present address of the H.E.C. He too, carried out H.E.C. work alone, employing day labour as required. These workers later became the permanent staff.

H.E.C. power was connected to Rossarden in 1936, Storey's Creek and Mangana in 1937. At this time there was still only 1 utility in use.

Power supply to Swansea covering 42 miles from Avoca was started in September 1938 and was finished by Christmas that year.

In 1939, power by feeder line of 22,000 volts was connected to St. Helens from St. Marys.

In the years from 1930 to 1989 there has only been 4 District Foreman, namely: Dick Franks, Bill Hodgkinson, Vern Royle, Kevan Hayes.

Around 1957 the Avoca Sub-Station was commissioned, to pick up the increased load in this area, and in 1985, the St. Marys Sub-Station was commissioned, which now has given this area a central feed point.

In June, 1989 we completed a 3 phase High voltage line between St. Marys and Bicheno to give an alternate feed to the lower East Coast.

The reliability of supply has increased dramatically over the last 10 years, as we have reconnected with heavy conductors from Pyen-gana to St. Helens, Fingal to St. Marys and St. Marys to Bicheno.

We have approx. 5000 customers and we service 10,000 poles and 600 transformers.

At present, we have 21 employees and 12 vehicles. From 1945 onwards there has only been 82 employees so the turn-over of labour is very small.

The existing building was built in 1936 and it was altered and added to, in the late fifties.

BUILDING AND PLANNING

The regulations governing development in the Municipality are due to change considerably during the forthcoming year with the proposed introduction of the Fingal Planning Scheme and adoption of the Building Code of Australia in place of the Tas. Building Regulations. COUNCIL NOTES:

DOG LICENCES - Dog Licences were due to be paid by 1 July 1989. If you have not yet registered your dog, an application form is enclosed. The fee to register your dog to 30 June 1990 is \$3.00 for each dog (no charge for guide dogs). Because of the large number of dogs not being registered, Council will be taking immediate action to ensure all dogs are registered. So if you have not registered your dog, please do so now.

STRAY DOGS - Following the introduction of the Dog Control in 1988, harsh penalties are provided where owners allow their dogs to stray. Due to the increasing number of complaints Council is receiving about stray dogs, offending owners may find themselves facing heavy fines.

BARKING DOGS - Council is also receiving an increasing number of complaints about barking dogs. Please ensure that your dog is not an offender. If Council receives a complaint about barking dogs, it is obliged to take action.

RUBBISH BINS - In recognition of the large size of our Municipality and the wide spread of residential areas, Council currently operates 11 tips which is more than any other Council in Tasmania. The cost of operating these tips is very high but you can help by ensuring that you place your rubbish in the trench and not beside the trench on the road access this will reduce operating costs which ultimately affects your rates. And please remember, tips must not be set fire to - it causes pollution and it is an offence punishable by a fine.
