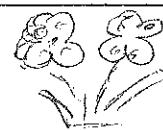

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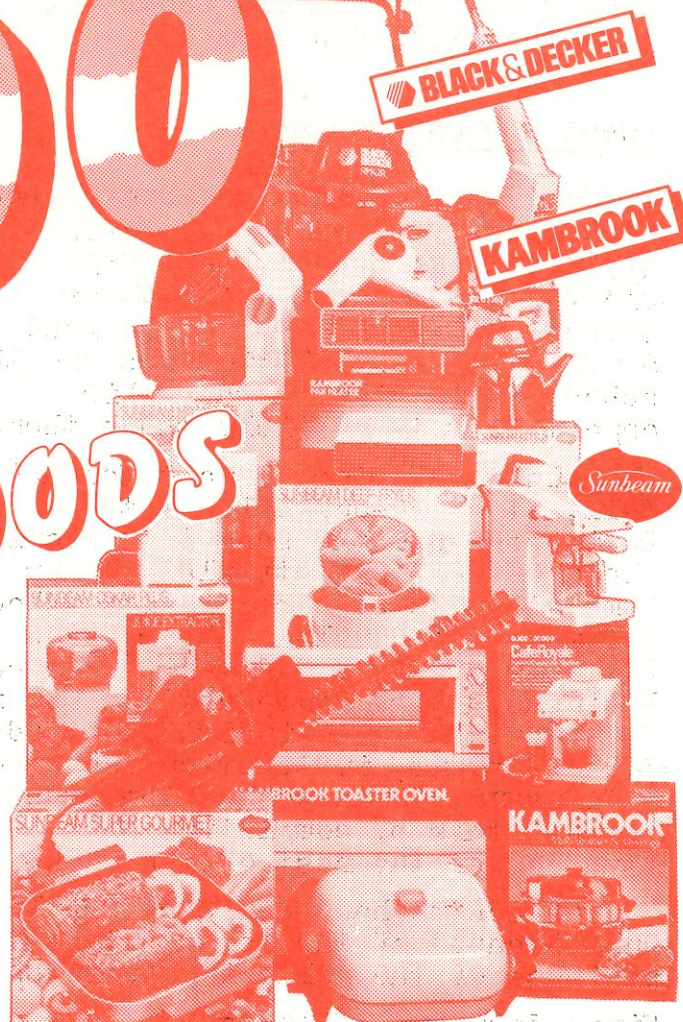

LEARNING TO READ AND WRITE:

Recent research has shown that children learn to read and write in the same way as they learn to talk.

- 1) When they learned to talk, they had a reason to do so.
So we show them a purpose for learning to read and write.
- 2) When they learned to talk, they were surrounded by people talking.
So we surround children with printed language and let them see us reading and writing.
- 3) When they learned to talk, we talked with them and responded to their message.
So we need to read and write with children, and we respond to their early efforts in reading and writing.
- 4) When they learned to talk we praised their efforts.
So when they are learning to read and write we praise their attempts.
- 5) When they learned to talk we didn't expect them to use adult speech immediately.
So when children are learning to read and write, we don't expect them to use adult forms at first.

Some Things That Happen at School

- From the child's first day at school, teachers encourage children to talk, because spoken language is the basis for learning to read and write.
- Teachers encourage children to spend time with books, and spend time sharing books with children.
- Teachers encourage children to draw and record messages about their work.
- Teachers surround children with print - names, labels, signs, books, songs, etc.
- Teachers read to and with children (talking about parts of a book) and demonstrating the reading process.
- Teachers write for and with children, demonstrating the process of transferring thoughts to written symbols.
- Teachers share, support, rejoice, encourage and praise children as they take the first step towards becoming a reader and writer.

ST.MARYS - ST.HELENS COUNTRY AREAS PROGRAM

1991 SUBMISSIONS

The St.Marys - St.Helens Country Education Committee invites submissions from any interested individuals or organisations for Country Areas Program funding in 1991.

The Country Areas Program caters for all students from Avoca, Rossarden, Mathinna, Fingal, Bicheno, St.Marys and St.Helens Schools.

The Country Areas Program is funded by the Commonwealth Government through the Department of Employment, Education and Training. The Program has been operating for the past eleven years, supporting programs in both government and non government schools throughout Australia.

The Country Areas Program is designed to assist children in the Primary, Secondary and Senior Secondary age categories. The program aims to improve the educational participation and achievement of students disadvantaged by restricted access to social, cultural and educational activities and services as a result of geographical isolation. The program also provides a framework whereby schools and isolated communities can work co-operatively to improve the educational opportunities available to country children. The Country Areas Program encourages a high community participation and attempts to capitalise on the strengths of country communities.

The basic objectives of the Program are to find ways of overcoming isolation through sharing resources, broadening students' understanding of occupational horizons, building students' self esteem, making imaginative use of the expertise of local people, providing children with access to a range of cultural activities and providing opportunities for teachers to interact with parents and their community.

Projects funded by the program generally fall into five categories. These include the employment of specialist staff, the funding of school trips and excursions, the purchase of a wide range of materials and equipment, the support of minor works programs and the provision of in - service and staff development programs for teachers or community members involved in the Program.

Dear Sir,

I ask, when is hazardous service, not hazardous service?

Has the Government reneged on a commitment to look after our Australian servicemen from the time they left our Australian shores?

The Government announced that hazardous service "will be deemed to have commenced from the date of Servicemen leaving their Australian bases, and until they reach the Operational Area".

When announcing the conditions of service for these personnel, the Government stated that they are commensurate with the serious nature of the deployment.

It was made clear that two allowances would be paid, - and I quote \$45 per day when serving in the Operational Area, and \$30 per day when temporarily outside the area, but still away from Australia".

However, the Government now claims that our servicemen, journalists, and in fact the majority of the Australian public have got it all wrong, in that our servicemen will not receive the \$30 per day allowance until they have actually been into and come out of, the Operational Area.

The Minister for Defence Science & Personal claims the matter is "crystal clear". The only thing that is "crystal clear" is the way in which the Government has bungled the matter just as they did in the case of our Namibian Peacekeeping Forces

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and our Iran/Iraq MultiNational Force.

Our service personnel deserve better!

Dear Editor,

There is no doubt Government cut-backs are now starting to hurt. But despite the howls of disapproval in the immediate future, the State Government has no option. The plain fact is that Tasmania is not generating enough revenue to support all the services we have become used to.

The Field Government should not be criticised for cutting its budget in the short term, because economic reality leaves no other option. However, the real criticism should be aimed at the lack of any initiative that will lift the State's economy, and generate more wealth.

We are now living with the full reality of the decision to stop the Wesley Vale project. Commonwealth grants have been on the decline for some years. However the drop in Government funding could have been tolerated if it had been replaced by an increase in private capital inflow.

To have Commonwealth funding cuts, and then reject private capital inflow, means that the standard of living for all Tasmanians must drop.

The situation can be reversed if we do all we can to encourage

private development of our resources. By doing so, wealth will be generated and everyone will benefit. On the other hand, if we continue to reject resource development it can only result in a further decline in the standard of living for the entire community.

YEAR NINE ARE ANIMALS

"Arthur's pissed his pants, sir!" And by this time, many of the audience were laughing so much that they felt like doing the same!

A brilliant performance by the young St. Marys District High School cast of "YEAR NINE ARE ANIMALS" marked the return of live theatre to St. Marys after a gap of too many years.

Despite the gales of laughter caused by the superb performance of Tadhgh Riley as the earnest, but slightly crepuscular, Grade 9 Student, Arthur Moran, the play in fact explored a serious theme, raising questions about what constitutes good teaching and the relationships between staff and students in a High School.

Some of the audience at the opening night on Wednesday, 22nd August, at the High School were not too sure what to expect as the lights dimmed- the prospect of an hour long performance by students about students and their relationships with teachers hardly seemed to be the stuff of "Hamlet", "Cats" or even "Waiting for Godot", probably just a re-run of what we hear about at home everyday.

All doubts were quickly dispelled, and at the end of an hour, which passed only too quickly, the audience gave the cast well deserved applause for a professional and totally believable performance, on a play which never lost their attention for a minute.

The cast and crew worked faultlessly as a team, and the action never faltered, with the scenes flowing one to the one without

any break, achieved by the ingenious arrangement of the set, and the calm, professional scene changes effected by the Stage hands, Craig Armstrong, Damien George and Gregory Hyde- Who were as much a part of the performance as the cast. Gail Friswell laid the foundation for the success of her production of "Animals" in her selection of the cast. Chris Ovenden, Jenny Bacani, Emma Clement, and Kura Blair as the teachers, and Karina Garret, Tanya Reid and Tadhgh Riley as the 9F English Class were each perfectly cast.

Chris Ovenden played the lead role of Alan Howman, beginning his first year of teaching in a High School. Finding his 9F English Class difficult to handle in a 'normal' classroom environment, he organises some 'different' lessons, which leads to conflicts with other members of staff and with the students themselves. Chris was on stage almost continuously, which itself requires concentration and stamina. He gave

a strong, confident performance as the uncertain new teacher, and, while his role was so central to the whole play, his performance was pitched at just the right level as not to dominate the other characters. Jenny Bacani played Marie Forbes, who has taught at the School for 4 years, and is pretty 'streetwise' by this time- no idealism left in her and a realist as to how the 'system' works, but still a warm human being. Jenny has a dramatic physical stage presence, and her sense of timing and command of body language fitted her perfectly for the role.

Kura Blair's role as Sylvia Harrison, the Principal, was a cameo, she wandered in from time to time looking brisk and efficient, uttered her vague and meaningless platitudes with crisp but inept authority and evaporated from the scene without having affected the situation whatever. Kura played it perfectly. Emma Clement played a difficult role with maturity and poise. Lisa Willis, a professional teacher of the old school, who believes in discipline, routine, hard work and respect, who, on her own admission, was on the wrong side of 40, was a challenging part for a 15 year old, and could have come across as a stereotype.

Yet Emma drew out the complexities of the character, and made Lisa a pivotal role in the play- a professional performance from a promising young actress.

Karina Garret and Tanya Reid were perfect in their roles as the 'animals' of Year 9.

Karina Portrayed Kelly, the joker, the sly troublemaker, the wide eyed innocent, "Who, me, Sir?" The disruptive element in the class to perfection. Yet she was always able to suggest the wasted potential and despair of the character: her delivery of "Dunno Sir", when she was being questioned about what she wants to do after her school years are over was enough to make the whole audience question the point of compulsory secondary education in its present form. Similarly, the closing line of the play, from the 'animal' Kelly to the uncertain new teacher, Alan, "Yer a good bloke, Sir", could have been an anti-climax, but Karina brought out the instinctive understanding and compassion that the part required- a sensitive performance from Karina.

Tanya Reid sailed through her part as Theresa, the perfect trouble-makers apprentice. Her dead-pan delivery of her throwaway lines made her a perfect foil to the more complex character of Kelly.

Then there was Tadhgh Riley- a faultless and memorable performance as Arthur Moran, the class butt. Certainly Tadhgh's role was the 'plum' part, the one designed to get the laughs, but he played it superbly-his timing was exquisite, his delivery of his lines in that flat, emotionless voice was superb, the absolute stillness of his body reinforced the impact of every word: at the same time, he was able to display the flashes of irritation and anger at his tormentors, and also arouse the sympathy of the audience for the boy who never went on outings. Tadhgh made us laugh mightily as the toilet paper wrapped Pharoah, and reduced us to hysterics during the course of a dictation class which concentrated too much on allusions of dampness and running water for his fragile bladder: however he portrayed not just a class clown, but a conscientious

and polite young man who really needed help to overcome the problem not of his making, which were

otherwise going to condemn him to being dim Arthur for the rest of his life-problems which Arthur himself didn't even properly realize existed. Congratulations Tadhgh- a powerful performance.

The cast were well supported by the sound and lighting crew of Nick Wardlaw, Michelle Binns and Craig Searle, while Rachel Dawson and Elissa Guy were a welcoming Box Office.

Unadorned congratulations must go to Gail Friswell, not only for the technical excellence of her direction of 'Animals', but for the time she gave to the cast and crew in preparing and rehearsing the

play. The experience for them in being part of such an endeavour is something they will long remember. Sorry, Gail, More Please! Neither should it be forgotten that name of 'Animals' could have been possible without Richard Tulloch- What did he do? He wrote it!!

June 1989 - July 1990

A busy and varied programme has been undertaken by the Neighbourhood House during the past year. Central to our programme are the classes and guest speakers who visit the Neighbourhood House. A survey conducted in November 1989 produced fifteen responses with suggestions for classes, speakers, services and activities. Some have already been followed up, and others will be arranged as soon as tutors can be found. Classes held during the past year have included Craft 'n' Coffee mornings, aerobics, Japanese flower arranging, gardening, Christmas gifts, Christmas decorations, stretch sewing, facial massage, microwave cooking and leatherwork. Guest speakers have included Mary Murray (Multiple Sclerosis), Joan Marshall (Health/stress relief), Pam Davis (Asthma), Vicki Cowan (Family Resource Centre), Terry Cook (Household budgetting), Evelyn Weir (Palliative care), Greg Stevens (Aids/HIV) and Health Dept (Prevention of skin cancer). We were pleased to be able to hold some classes at Avoca and Rossarden, where they were received enthusiastically. For the first time the Neighbourhood House has received a Non Government Adult Education grant, which helps cover tutor costs for certain classes.
