WORLD ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS
The long awaited World Rowing
Championships are just a few weeks
away and they are the biggest
undertaking for any sport in
Tasmania's history.

The World Rowing Championships are attracting a record 46 countries, 1200 competitors and officials and will inject a minimum 8 million dollars into the Tasmanian economy.

The 46 countries entered to compete at the Championships is a record in the 98 year history of FISA. Australia is poised to deliver one of the best world championship regattas to the international rowing community.

An International Congress of FISA on October 27th will precede the Championships. It is expected that each of the 67 countries affiliated with FISA will send delegates. The Congress will be held at the Launceston International Hotel.

-However, prior to and after the Championships, Lake Barrington will remain a gem in the array of venues in Tasmania of natural and enduring charm. As visitation rates of the general public to Lake Barrington for sporting and passive recreation reasons climb each year (now above 80,000 in 1989) the popularity of the lake and its future as a facility for all Tasmanians is assured.


East Coast residents can and should feel proud of David Schier, OAM, the long serving Chairman of the Organizing Committee, who comes from Falmouth.

David is the second eldest of six children born to Jean and Gilbert Schier of Falmouth. He was educated at the St. Marys High School and worked at the St. Marys Bakery, before joining the Air Force in 1966.

He served in Vietnam in 1968-69 and left the RAAF in 1972 to study law at the University of Tasmania. He graduated in 1977 and has practised as a barrister and solicitor in Burnie for the last 9 years.

Between 1973 and 1981 he was an

Petween 1973 and 1981 he was an active oarsman with the Tasmanian University Boat Club and the Franklin Rowing Club. David has won State Championships in senior eights, senior coxless pairs and junior sculls. He was a State representative in the

Presidents Cup in 1978.

David, who is single and aged 'just over 40' has served on the Tasmanian Rowing Council as a delegate, and in 1983 was elected as President. At that time, at the age of 33, he was the youngest President of the TRC and was the first northern resident for 72 years.

He has been Chairman of the Organizing Committee for the Australian Rowing Championships and Kings Cup Regatta when held in Tasmania in 1984,1987 and 1990.

It is a commonly held view that the organization of those Australian Championships has raised the standard of regatta organization in Australia.

David has been a member of the Australian Rowing Council from 1984 and is now the senior state delegate in the National Forum.

He participated in the preparation of the feasibility study which recognised Lake Barrington as Tasmania's best venue for a rowing course, and became the singularly most identifiable public advocate for the development of Lake Barrington from June 1981. He became Chairman of the Lake Barrington Rowing Committee in May 1982.

As a result of an intense lobbying campaign in public, government
and sporting circles, the Gray
Government announced in October 1982
that it would fund the development
of Lake Barrington as an international standard rowing and
canoeing facility. .... 5

ROWING CHAMPIONSHIPS (Cont'd from cover story)

David wrote and presented the application to FISA, the inter-national controlling body of rowing, in January 1985 for the allocation of the 1990 World Rowing Championships to Lake Barrington, Tasmania, Australia. FISA granted the applicatiom at its Congress in Rome on January 13, 1985.

David Schier, OAM, has been an Australian delegate to the Congress of FISA in Rome 1985, Nottingham 1986, Copenhagen 1987, Seoul 1988 and in 1989 attended two conferences, one in Bled, Yugoslavia, and an extraordinary Congress of FISA in Athens.

In the context of the development of Lake Barrington and promotion of the World Rowing Championships, he has visited rowing courses in New Zealand, South Korea, Switzerland, Italy, France, West Germany, Austria, England, Scotland, Denmark, Holland, Yugoslavia and Belgium.

David has been the Chairman of the Organizing Committee for the 1990 World Rowing Championships from February 1985 until this day. He is a Director and Deputy Chairman of the

Company, 1990 WRC LTD.

To his credit he has been awarded the Vietnam Medal, Active Service Medallion, Republic of Vietnam Campaign Medal (RAAF 1966-1972), the Medal of the Order of Australia -1986- for service to the community and to rowing, and in particular the creation of the international standard rowing facility at Lake Barrington, Tasmania.

The World Rowing Championships commence on October 29th and end with two final days on November 3rd and 4th. Ticket purchases for this once in a lifetime experience are recommended -contact 008-005-626.

#### THE NUMBERS GAME

At a dull and uninspired meeting of the Fingal Council on Monday, watched by a capacity crowd of two ratepayers, the final outcome was a draw - RATEPAYERS 1.0 COUNCIL 1.0

Early proceedings were almost completely incomprehensible to spectators, as the Clerk did not provide them with a programme of the event or the rules of the game. However, Councillors were obviously emotionally involved, judging by the continuous cries of "so moved" uttered by or other or all of them.

Nevertheless, one exciting period of play revealed what Local Government is all about. some initial discussion, during which one Councillor advised that he had received a phone call from a ratepayer who was <u>not</u> a ratbag, Council caved into sustained pressure from Scamander ratepayers and instructed the Works Supervisor to modify the kerbing profile being laid along the main drag of the town, to allow the outraged residents to get into their drive-"We made a mistake giving access to the service station, there's no way we can refuse to do the same for them - we need to stop the flack now" - RATE-PAYERS 1.0

But in a devastating counter-move, Council immediately re-established its authority, and showed that it was not going to make a habit of giving into the rabble; without a word being spoken, it stayed collectively silent, an unnerving experience for spectators, and mutely endorsed Council Clerk's crisp refusal to discuss a request that access and facilities should be provided in the Public Toilets at St Marys for disabled people: "there has been only one complaint", said the Clerk - COUNCIL 1.0

Council later showed its experience and tactical skill by "going into Committee" without telling anybody when it would come out again, a move which ruined the meeting as a spectacle. It is gamesmanship and professional fouls such as this which are keeping the crowds away from Council Meetings. ONLOOKER

#### EDUCATION CUTS

What are some of the implications of the proposed education cuts for this shoool?

- \*Loss of Integrated Services (Pre-Kindergarten) aide time.
- \*Reduced Kindergarten aide time.
- \*Prep-Grade 6 classes to increase by up to 5 students.
- \*Reduced time for library duties.
- \*Fewer and larger teaching groups in the secondary area.
- \*Reduced options at Grade 9.
- \*Reduced capacity to cater for the individual needs of students, particularly those with special learning problems.
- \*Work Experience, Careers Education and Outdoor Education under threat.
- \*School farm under threat of sale.
- \*Reduced administrative time for increased responsibilities.
- \*Increased assessment, marking and report writing loads for teachers.
- \*Less time for professional development of teachers.
- \*Reduced money for school building maintenance.
- \*Higher "user-pays" rates for use of school facilities.
- \*School building re-development further away than ever.
- \*Tasmanian Certificate of Education for Grades 9 and 10 under threat. The abolition of a centrally-issued certificate has severe implications for the students of smaller country schools.
- \*Loss of experienced teachers.
- \*Loss of high quality young teachers.
- \*Questionable capacity of the "system" to provide required specialist staff.

#### WORK-TO-RULES CAMPAIGN

The State Budget has severe implications for the quality of education in Tasmania. It will have two major effects:

- 1. To disadvantage Tasmanian students.
- 2. To put further unreasonable stress on teachers.

In order that classroom standards can be maintained, the Tasmanian Teachers Federation has instructed all members to strictly adhere to regulations and not to work beyond the hours of half an hour before and up to one hour after school with at least 30 minutes for lunch.

This will mean that, for the indefinite future, all teaching duties including preparation, assessment, marking and report writing, all normal administrative duties, parent interviews, student supervision, curriculum development and syllabus revision will have to take place between 8.15am and 4.15pm.

Camps and excursions will not take place and while our school athletic sports will be held, it is expected that the Inter-High Athletics Carnival scheduled for 20th November will be cancelled.

#### HOME SCHOOL LIAISON OFFICER

Katherine Ball has been recently appointed to this position. Her role is extremely varied with duties including:

- \*developing the support and confidence of parents of students at this and associated schools
- \*developing closer liaison with the associated schools so that the Grade 6/7 transition can be as smooth as possible for students and encouraging participation by the new parents in school activities.
- \*supporting and assisting the students and parents with year 10/11 transition
- \*to work with staff to encourage the closer involvement of parents in their children's education, both in the High School and in further education
- \*supporting and assisting staff, if needed, with direct parent contact where communication problems exist
- \*developing an on-going liaison programme with students at HSC annex and individual homes

\*assisting parents with communication with the school.



Athletes from 22 schools took part in the Northern All Schools Athletics Championships at St.Leonards last weekend. The black and gold stripe of St. Marys District High School was prominent, with Giles Clement winning the 800m and 1500m titles to achieve a fine double. Giles ran a classic 800m race to win the Boys Under 13 title, holding fourth place through the first 400m before moving easily into third position at the bell, then accelerating past the leaders through an inside opening on the bend to stride out along the back straight, coming out of the last bend with a lead of 30meters to win in 2min 34. Three hours later he left the opposition behind from the start in the 1500m, with a fast 57secs over the initial 300m, then settled down to run a clockwork 90secs, 91secs and 89 secs over the 3 x 400m laps to win comfortably in 5.29.40.
