WATER

Summer holidays are the time when we 'get wet again'. Swimming pools beaches, rivers and lakes are crowded with families enjoying Australia's wonderful weather and beautiful waterways.

But it's also a time when risks increase. Activities in, on or near the water can be great fun, especially when we remember our Aquacode.

Aquacode is a simple code of rules developed by The Royal Life Saving Society -Australia, with the support of Esso Australia Ltd and the Commonwealth Government, to help protect young children.

As your child grows and explores new things in, on, or around the water there are four parental responsibilities to remember:

Supervision: your child expects and respects this.

Water Safety: your child should understand the precautions and behaviour required when on, in, or near water.

Swimming skills: your child needs to have developed efficient stroke techniques for sport and recreation.

Survival skills: your child should understand how to act in an emergency.

Resuscitation: Tragically, Australia has one of the highest drowning tolls in the world. As a mobile, affluent society with a great choice of recreational activities it seems sensible that all adults should be able to help in the case of an emergency.

Ambulance and police officers, paramedics and medical staff all agree that if a person at the site of an accident or possible drowning could perform simple expired air resuscitation (EAR) techniques, 50% of deaths could be prevented.

It is important that children are taught to swim by a trained instructor, but parents can assist by checking if their child can do the following:

Enter the water properly: slide in; step in; jump; dive.

SAFETY

Get out of the water correctly: using steps; by themselves; with a friend.

Survival scull and tread water. Surface dive -head first; feet first. Breaststroke; sidestroke; survival backstroke.

Tell and show you how they would respond if they accidentally fell in to deep water.

Tell and show you how they would help someone in trouble in the water: reach; throw; wade; run (to get help).

Aquacode rule number 1:

You should always go swimming together.

If you get into trouble then the other person may be able to help or go for help.

Aquacode rule number 2:

Float and wave.

If you get into trouble while swimming, always roll onto your back and float and wave your hand.

Aquacode rule number 3:

Reach to rescue.

If you see someone in difficulty, send someone for help then try to reach that person by not leaving the bank. A branch or article of clothing may help.

If you are on a river bank you should always check if the water is deep enough and free from submerged obstacles before you dive in.

If you are going out in a boat you should always learn the required skills and make sure you are wearing the correct safety equipment, such as a lifejacket or Personal Flotation device.

Around the home pool you should never run around the edge, chasing friends. The pool should be fenced and the gate securely locked at all times. Always be considerate of others and safety aware for yourself. Never push another in the water.

Make this a safe and happy summer for your family. A few simple rules and lessons could save a life.

FOUR MILE CREEK LANDCARE:

A Community Planning to Protect its Natural Resources.

For those that don't know Four Mile Creek it's a small settlement on the east coast between Scamander and Bicheno (just south of Falmouth).

Earlier this year a landcare group was formed to rehabilitate and protect our small (about 5,000 ha) but developing catchment.

We have problems. The immediate one is erosion which continues to fill Four Mile Creek with sediment (the creek itself, not the town!). Already the lower extent of the creek is attempting to spread laterally to compensate for the decreased depth. Stream banks are undercutting and require stabilization. Water holes are filled, which indicates that natural fish and stream life is suffering not to mention the swimming facilities.

The reasons lie in past developments, particularly past forest harvesting, where the emphasis on land conservation was not as great as we would like it today.

CHRISTMAS FRUIT CAKE

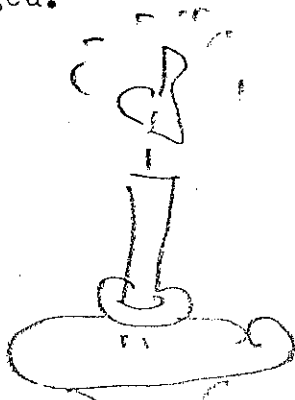
(The best ever)

INGREDIENTS:

1 Cup Butter, 1 Cup Sugar,
4 large eggs, 1 Cup fruit,
1 tsp baking powder, lemon
juice, 1 Cup Brown Sugar,
1 tsp baking soda, 1 or 2
quarts whisky and some nuts.

METHOD:

Before you start, sample the
whisky to check the quality.
Good isn't it? Now go ahead.
Select a large mixing bowl,
measuring cup etc. Check the
whisky again as it must be just
right. To be sure the whisky
is of the highest quality pour
1 large glass and drink it as
fast as you can. Repeat. With
an electric mexer, beat 1 cup
of butter in a large fluffy
bowl. Add 1 tsp of thugar and
beat again. Meanwhile make
sure the whisky is still of
the highest quality by crying
another tup. Repeat. Open
second quart if necessary.
Add 2 large leggs, 2 cups fried
druit and beat till high.
If druit gets stuck to the
beaters, just lry it poose
with a drewdriver. Sample
the whisky again, checking
for tonscisticity. Next
sift 3 cups of salt or anything.
it doesn't really matter.
Sample the shiky. Sift 1/2
pints lemon juice. Fold in
chopped butter and stained
nuts. Add 1 babblespoon of
brown sugar, or whatever colour
you can find and wix mel.
Grease oven and turn cake pan
to 120 degrees. Now pour
everthing into the coven and
be to ged.

"PERFORMANCE" APPRAISAL

A certain management consultancy review team was visiting a Departmental Agency to examine the efficiency and effectiveness of the workings of the superintendents in charge. The visit coincided with one of the concerts of the Tasmanian Symphony Orchestra to which the superintendent was in the habit of going. On this occasion, however, he was unable to attend and with his usual generosity gave his ticket to the leader of the review team who had never been to a symphony concert before. It was a Schubert concert and the main work that night was Schubert's Unfinished Symphony. When he asked his visitor the following morning how he had enjoyed the concert, the superintendent was surprised to be handed a type-written report:

1. For considerable periods the oboe players had nothing to do. The number should be reduced and their work should be more conveniently spread over the whole concert, thus eliminating peaks of activity.
2. All the 12 violins were playing identical notes. This seems unnecessary duplication. The staff of this section should be drastically cut, and if a large volume of sound is really required this could be obtained by means of an electronic amplifier.
3. Much effort was absorbed in the playing of demi-semiquavers. This seems to us excessive refinement and it is recommended that all notes be rounded up to the nearest semiquaver. If this were done it should be possible to use trainees and lower grade operators.
4. There seems to be too much repetition of some musical passages. No useful purpose is served by repeating with horns the passage that has already been handled by the strings. If all such redundant passages were eliminated, the whole concert time of two hours would have been reduced to 20 minutes and there would have been no need for an interval. If the composer had attended to these matters he would probably have been able to finish his symphony.

USEFULL HINTS

MOTHS

Moths tend to lay eggs in
cotton, woollen and fur
materials which will provide
food for the larvae when they
hatch. To avoid this, make sure
all clothes, linen and fabrics
are clean before you store
them. Clean out cupboards and
wardrobes occasionally and
check for signs of moths.

*Wipe out clothes drawers
with a solution of one part
ammonia to five parts water.

*Store quilts, curtains and
clothes in sealed polythene
bags in airtight containers.

*Dried wormwood, tansy,
lavender, whole cloves or
cedar wood shavings among
clothes deters moths. Place

them in gauze sachets and scatter
through clothes.

*Moth-proof blankets by melting
a block of camphor in the final
wash before storing.

*Scatter dried orange peel through
clothing.

*Make up muslin bags containing 50g
of black pepper, cinnamon, ground
cloves and orrisroot (available
from chemists and health food shops
and place them throughout drawers.

PLANT PESTS

Control house plant pests by
spraying plants with a solution
of warm water containing hot
pepper. Wash plants with soap and
water, rinse thoroughly afterwards.

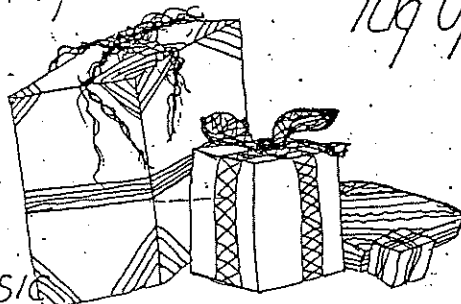

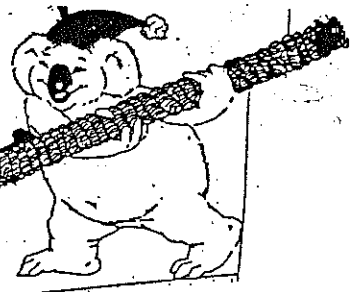
