1990. A YEAR OF SPORT IN OUR VALLEY.

The year's sporting activities are fast drawing to a close, with only one month to go.

There have been some great performances both individually and team-wise, over the past twelve months.

First up, the St. Marys Pacing Club again had a very successful New Year's Day meeting, resulting in a record gate and great racing. The Committee and helpers have been again actively engaged in erecting new fences and have cleaned up the eyesore along Harefield Road. The Club again race on Jan 1st next year, and are hoping for your attendance, to make it another successful day's racing.

Campbelltown weightlifter Ron Laycock did himself and Tasmania proud, with his performances in the Commonwealth Games in New Zealand.

Fingal golfer Tammy Hall has also done exceptionally well representing Tasmania in the ladies team Golf Championships.

David Schier, an ex Falmouth resident, must be congratulated on the great effort he put in to getting the World Rowing Championships to Lake Barrington. I understand it took many long hours to achieve this aim, and he should feel very proud, as should Tasmanians.

In the racing arena, local owners scored a few wins. A few more would have been quite welcome. Some winners were trained or owned by Don Woods, Eric Bean, the local hotel syndicate. Peter Woods horse, Freda Lea met with great success winning a classic race, and Robert Woods and Son Scott with their great horse Alan Grant, who at the time of writing, was an emergency for the Miracle Mile race in Sydney, and perhaps unlucky not to be in the field.

The Association Football Grand Final, resulted in the two local teams, St. Marys and Fingal playing off, with the former, through greater fitness and pace coming out winners. Noone likes to lose, but unfortunately there can only be one winner.

There seems to be a great lack of sportsmanship creeping into our great game. Once, after the game was over a few beers were shared, but not now. Therefore it was pleasing to see Tim Medwin, who was Fingal's best player, run over to the St. Marys players and congratulate them and wish them well and also to have a great night. A bit more of this by all teams would not go astray, after all it is only a game.

Another incident at Swansea. A Swansea reserves player helping an opponent up after a pretty heavy physical clash. On the down side an opposition runner tipping the contents of his water bottle over a St. Marys reserves player. Another player being forced out of bounds with the ball, and being tripped over by the opposition bench members. These are very poor acts of sportsmanship and have no place in our great game.

All the best in all sporting activities for 1991, and perhaps a little more goodwill.

Finally, although a little out of our valley, the football season had the greatest climax for 32 years, when our favourite team Collingwood, finally buried the 'Colliewobble disease' and silenced the critics with a truly magnificent victory. A mighty effort.

BANKING OMBUDSMAN

People who are experiencing difficulties with the banking industry now have a Banking Ombudsman who can independently investigate complaints.

Mr Graham McDonald has been appointed to this position which should enable everyone to have access to a quick, free and effective means of resolving disputes with banks.

Mr McDonald was selected by a council comprising three banking industry representatives, three consumer representatives and chaired by former Governor-General, Sir Ninian Stephen. He will provide an independent, free and accessible mechanism for resolving claims up to \$100,000.

Bank clients should endeavour to settle any dispute with the bank concerned, however, if this fails then the consumer will have access to the Ombudsman who will investigate the problem and adjudicate. It should be noted that only claims since 10th May 1989 which have NOT been subject of court action by the bank can be pursued.

The Ombudsman's decision will be binding on banks, but consumers who are dis-satisfied with the decision will be able to take legal action.

The four major banks and most members of the Australian Bankers' Association have agreed to be covered by the Banking Ombudsman Scheme. However, State Banks covered by the State Ombudsman are not at present participating.

TASMANIAN CERTIFICATE OF EDUCATION

The TCE is designed to meet the needs of Tasmanians into the nineties and beyond.

It encourages students to be well prepared for work, further education and adult life.

The TCE allows for flexibility and breadth by providing a wide range of subject choices.

A wide range of experienced teachers have assisted the Schools Board with the development of the TCE.

The TCE will show a student's achievements, from Year 9 until they leave school, on a single certificate.

The TCE program covers Year 9 to Year 12.

Students will be encouraged to reach high standards by setting realistic and challenging goals.

The assessment for some subjects designed for Years 11 and 12 includes examinations for all students studying the subject. These are set and marked by an independent examining body.

Assessment for the TCE will provide a broader picture of a student's achievements.

Students will be assessed by measuring how well they have reached certain standards or criteria, rather than by comparing them to each other.

The criteria for assessment will be stated in the syllabuses for each subject so that students can know beforehand what they have to do to get an award.

OLDE FASHIONED CHRISTMAS PUDDING

1lb each butter, sugar, raisins, sultanas, and fresh breadcrumbs.
1lb each dates, plain flour, mixed peel and almonds.
1/2 teaspoon each nutmeg and cinnamon,
the grated rind and juice of 1 orange,
1 small teaspoon of carb soda, pinch of salt and 8 eggs.

Cream butter and sugar, add beaten eggs gradually with the sifted dry ingredients. Add breadcrumbs and the rest of ingredients. Boil in a prepared cloth for 7 hours. Mixture can be divided into 3 or 4 smaller puddings and boiling time adjusted accordingly.

JELLY SLICE

Base 1/2 lb biscuits crushed
6 oz butter
Melt butter - add biscuits

Filling 1 can condensed milk
add 1/2 cup lemon juice and
2 heaped teaspoons gelatine dissolved in three quarters cup hot water.

Topping 1 packet rasp. jelly plus
1 teaspoon gelatine dissolved in 1 cup hot water then add 1 cup cold water.

Make biscuit base. Press into a slice tin. Then spread on the filling evenly. Leave about 5 minutes and then add partly set jelly. Spread evenly and leave to set. When set, cut into squares.

HELPFUL HINTS

ALUMINIUM (pots and pans)
Burnt-on food: Fill pan with water. Boil. Scrape with wooden spoon. Wash.
General stains: Soak in solution 1 tablespoon/15ml borax to 1 pint/500ml hot water. Wash as usual.
Stubborn stains: Simmer strong solution of cream of tartar or vinegar for 20 minutes. Wash.
Teapots: General stains: Fill with water and 2 teaspoons/10ml borax. Leave 2 hours. Wash.
NEVER put coloured aluminium in dish-washer. Never treat non-stick or mirror-finishes with abrasive cleaners or sharp implements. Never use washing soda. Never store food in aluminium.
ALWAYS clean with soap-filled pad rubbing in one direction only. Always rinse thoroughly.

FEDERAL GOVERNMENT'S NEW TRAINING TAX

As from the 1st July, 1990 a 1% Training Guarantee Levy will be payable on payrolls exceeding \$200000 unless the levy can be offset with eligible training expenditure. The eligible training expenditure will require formal accreditation. Any levy payable is due by the 30th September, 1991 and will not be deductible for income tax purposes.

The justness of the imposition of a further financial burden on business is irrelevant as the Training Tax has now been legislated and is to be administered by the Taxation Department. Any business with group wages in excess of \$200000 must now plan to introduce into their business operations training which will be eligible to offset the levy. Whereas the levy is not deductible for income tax purposes, the cost of training undertaken by the business will be tax deductible. The training expenditure need not relate directly to the business employees but so long as it relates to training, for example donation to an education building fund, the cost will be eligible.

Areas of training expenditure which could be considered as eligible (subject to formal accreditation) are as follows:

1. Spending on eligible training programs.
2. Deemed expenditure:
 - * on apprentices and ATS trainees; and
 - * on trainees under other approved entry-level training arrangements.
3. Payments to enable others to provide eligible training or the activities directly related to eligible training.

Spending is related to eligible training if it involves:-

- * determining the need for eligible training;
- * preparing and reviewing training plans;
- * developing and evaluating, as well as providing and administering, eligible training; and
- * accounting and information systems for eligible training.

More specifically it can include:-

- * wages of the person during training;
- * expenditure on meals, accommodation and childcare while the person is being trained;
- * payments for travel to let the person participate;
- * the payment of fees and contributions for HECS;
- * the cost of consumables and materials used for training;
- * building expenses for the whole or part of a building used for training activities;
- * capital expenditure for training;
- * rent for training facilities; and
- * hiring or leasing of equipment for training.

Providing sufficient monies have been spent on training there is no requirement to lodge a Training Guarantee Statement to the Taxation Office. However, adequate records must be kept by the business as proof. These records include:-

- * your annual national payroll amount;
- * your net eligible training expenditure;
- * your liability (if any) of the training shortfall; and
- * records of your training programs.

Funds collected under the levy are to be used to establish a trust fund for the purpose of increasing training in the Australian workforce. It is envisaged that the level of training will be lifted to 1.5% in 1992/93 financial year. Now is the time to plan not after the 30th June when the year has passed.

PENSIONER INTEREST RATE UNDER
REVIEW.

Senator John Watson (Lib., Tas) today welcomed the announcement by the Federal Government that they would review the budget decision to assess interest on pensioners' investments at 10 per cent.

The review, to be completed by early February, will recommend whether the so-called "deeming" of interest should be cut from 10 percent. A decrease in the rate is supported by Senator Watson who said that, "many pensioners have been confused by this matter since its announcement." "Given that the official interest rate has been cut by 1% already since the budget and are rumoured to be cut again before Christmas earning 10% on investments is no longer easily achieved."

"The so-called "deeming" provisions are due to take effect from March 1."

"Under the Budget measure, pensioners' savings above \$2000 would be assessed as earning interest of 10 percent."

"All pensioners who were receiving a Pensioner Health Card on August 21, 1990 will continue to receive the Health Card benefit even though the reinvestment of their monies causes extra income."
