THE STORY BEHIND GIVING CHRYSANTHEMUMS FOR MOTHER'S DAY

The giving of chrysanthemums on Mother's Day has become a tradition in those countries which celebrate this day.

Weeks before the event, bunches of chrysanthemums are on sale in florists, and pots of multi-coloured flowers are being offered through nurseries and supermarkets.

The culture and love of chrysanthemums goes well back into history long before Mother's Day was envisaged. A native of China, the first written record of this flower dates back to the time of Confucius, around 500BC when the yellow-flowered variety was so highly prized by the Chinese that they maintained strict laws forbidding its exportation.

For 800 years they managed to keep it to themselves, but gradually the plant trickled into Korea and then into Japan where it arrived around the 4th century AD.

The Japanese loved the chrysanthemum from the beginning, and valued it so much that initially only members of the Royal Family were allowed to cultivate it. Possession by ordinary people was punishable by death.

The flower was to appear on silk screens and beautifully embroidered kimonos, and later became the Japanese national emblem.

It is interesting to know that the "rising sun" which used to adorn the Japanese flag in fact represented a stylised chrysanthemum flower with 16 petals around a central disk, and not the sun at all.

Chrysanthemums had a less auspicious start when introduced into Europe in the 17th century, and it took another 100 years before they were accepted as plants worth cultivating.

Today one only has to look around to realise how far this acceptance has come. Chrysanthemums of all shapes and colours are a common and much-loved feature of many gardens,

especially at this time of the year.

Not all chrysanthemums are valued for their flowers alone. Several species are of considerable importance in a number of areas. A silvery form, the pyrethrum, is the primary source of a very important natural pesticide, which many gardeners throughout the world use as an environmentally safe contact killer for garden pests.

The effective constituent, called pyrethrin, is extracted from the daisy-like flowers of the pyrethrum plant. It has been known and used as an insecticide for several centuries in the Middle East and is now grown commercially in several countries around the world, including Tasmania.

Another chrysanthemum which has a long history of usage is called "Feverfew". It's a common garden plant often called the "pyrethrum daisy", which tends to spread rapidly throughout the garden.

It was known to have been used medicinally by the ancient Greeks. Traditionally it was prescribed for the treatment of fevers, hysteria, irregular menstruation, worms, aches and pains, and headaches and migraines.

Today scientific research and clinical trials have shown that the single-petalled form has indeed been effective in reducing the frequency and severity of migraine attacks in a large number of sufferers, while reducing the side effects of such attacks, such as vomiting and nausea.

This simple folk remedy is showing every sign of making the transition from folklore to mainstream medicine in the not too distant future.



ST. MARYS DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

WHERE HAVE ALL THE STUDENTS GONE?

Have you ever wondered what happened to students once they left the District High School in Grade 10? I did, so I did a survey of 1988 and 1989 Grade 10 students to see what they were doing with their lives. What I found out was quite interesting.

1988

There were 45 students, 17 are taking a Year 12 course at different education centres: some at the Launceston College; 1 at TAFE; 2 in Hobart, and 2 at the East Coast Centre here in St. Marys. 24 are working, most of them locally. 3 students are not working regularly, and are not studying.

1989

2. A former student now at the Tasmanian University, Annette Bushing, in her 4th Year, has won every accounting prize for every accounting subject she has completed. In her first year she even won the Sir Geoffrey Foot Award, which is a scholarship for promising Accounting students.
3. Simon Eoswick is in his second year of study for a Science degree (Computer Science) at the University. He is also completing Grade 8 AMEB Music (piano).
4. Grant Young is also at the University doing second year of his Engineering Degree.
5. Geoffrey Lewis, another former student, is now at Latrobe Uni. He topped the whole University with his maths results - 100%!!
6. Jason (Skinny) Costain is at the TSIT taking a Bachelor of Applied Science Course.
7. There are a number of young women taking nursing courses. Jodie Bennett, Sally Cooke and Jenifer Rubenach, who recently qualified as a nursing sister - she passed her

exams as one of the top 7 in her year.

8. Sharmaine Rubenach is completing a "Travel and Tourism" course at Drysdale House.

9. Drew Berwick is a trainee Ambulance Officer with the Tasmanian Ambulance Service.

10. Mark Hendley won a TAFE award for the most outstanding Pre-Voc. Fitting and Machining student for 1989. He now works for Glasgow Engineering.

11. Michael Aulich is another student who completed an Electrical Mechanics Course. He has won a number of awards. He topped his 2nd Year, and 2 subjects in the 3rd Year of his apprenticeship. He also received an award from the Apprentices Commission - a Bronze medallion. He was one of the top apprentices in the State. He completed an Industrial Electrical Course and topped Alanvale College. He entered the "Workskills Australia" contest, and after coming 2nd in Tasmania, he then came 7th Nationally in W.A. He now works for the Cornwall Coal Company.

Not all of these students are brilliant academically, most of them are simply hardworking and have done their utmost to achieve their goals.
