BEWARE OF

"CREEPY-CRAWLIES"
BY

THIS AUTUMN

Mentiom "creepy-crawlies" and the hazards they present, and people automatically think of spiders and scorpions. But unpleasant as these arachnids are, they're not nearly as potentially dangerous to human health as several much smaller invertebrates.

Indeed it might surprise you to learn that there have been no recorded human deaths in Tasmania from spider or scorpion bites.

Confusion arises because some local species have similar names to their more toxic mainland counterparts, e.g. the funnel web spider. This does not mean that Tasmanian spiders and scorpions are harmless; that they are not, so don't take liberties with them as they become more prevalent during the next few weeks.

A much more dangerous beastie is the common jack-jumper (Promyrecia pilosula) to which some people can become allergic, with serious or even fatal consequences when next they are bitten.

There have been several unfortunate deaths of east coast residents from jack-jumper bites, and also from the common inchman or bullant (Myrmecia forficata). Both these ants are found in local gardens, notably around Scamander.

European wasps are on the increase and can also inflict painful stings to humans and animals. They are not difficult to eradicate if one takes the trouble to locate their nests. This is done by observing the line of return flight, especially at dusk, then walking along that line until the entrance is discovered.

European wasps frequently build extensive nests underground. Once sure of their location, contact one of the district Department of Primary Industry officers and we will advise you how to eliminate the wasps without risk to yourself.

By far the most frequent cause of sickness from insect bites this year has been mosquitoes; not all mosquitoes, only those carrying the Ross River virus. Ross River fever, as it is called, is a zoonosis, that is, an animal disease transmissible to humans.

The reservoir hosts are native fauna, mainly wallabies, which harbour and multiply the virus. So areas common to mosquitoes and macropods are the places where humans are at greatest risk.

The outcome, about 10 days after being badly bitten, is a red rash on the body followed by a painful arthritis of the wrists, knuckles, knees and ankles. Occasionally, after symptoms disappear, a Chronic Fatigue Syndrome occurs, characterised by lassitude and an uncontrollable desire to sleep.

The good news is that eventual recovery is assured, although it may take up to 6 months, and the disease usually occurs only once in a lifetime.

Other "creepy-crawlies" responsible for disease similar to Ross River fever are the common fern ticks. There are two infections transmitted by their bites. One is a rickettsial spotted fever, first reported on Flinders Island and now known to exist in coastal regions of Tasmania.....Cont'd



The other is called Lyme Disease, about which very little is presently known in its Tasmanian context. Suffice it to say that any tick bite resulting in a site reaction, rash or fever should be examined by a doctor and a blood sample collected for diagnostic serology.

The same applies to reactions to attacks by mosquitoes in marshland localities such as Beaumaris, Scamander and Stieglitz, where there have already been several cases of

Ross River Fever this year.

But of course, as always, pre-vention is better than cure, so if you live near or frequent hazardous areas, cover yourself up, especially on dull humid days or at dusk.
