Many back injuries, particularly those occasioned during motoring

exploits, can be avoided simply by following a few basic procedures.

At holiday times, like Easter and Christmas, motorists regularly discover the amazing amount of luggage that even the smallest modern car will accommodate in its boot, on the back seat, the cabin floor and even on the roof.

While most of us heed advice on how to stow the gear and spread the load to avoid problems like poor road handling, uneven tyre wear and damage to our car's suspension, few of us stop and think about care of our own "suspension" and "chassis"the back.

If we don't use the correct techniques when loading and unloading our cars, we could be placing our backs at risk.

Physiotherapists find themselves treating many people whose enjoy-ment of their holidays has been

It's not only the heavy items like kayaks and suitcases that can cause problems, smaller objects can be just as hazardous for the back

if they are in awkward places or lifted hastily or incorrectly.

Leaning and twisting from the front seat to reach that jacket or street directory in the back is another common but completely avoidable and of back and neck injury cause of back and neck injury

When you are loading or unloading a car it's really just a matter of

remembering the basic rules that apply to any sort of lifting.

Firstly, don't overdo it. Get someone to belp you with really large or heavy items, like suitcases

on the roof rack.

Secondly, if you are lifting something moderately heavy, plant your feet firmly, keep the load close to your body, and BEND YOUR KNEES to move up and down, NOT your back.

This sort of care is especially important when lifting objects out of deep boots. Slide objects as near as possible to the rear of the boot before lifting, and then resting them on the edge at the half-way stage if necessary.

KNEES!

Plan ahead and put a blanket over the edge of the boot and even on the bonnet to rest things on while you organise where to put them. No matter how proud you are of your car's finish, protecting your back will always be more important than protecting your paintwork.

Most of the dangerous manoeuvres

which physiotherapists warn us about are really just common sense. For example, we should avoid getting in and out of the car with packages in our arms, or holding onto heavy items with only one hand while we fumble

for car keys.

We should always be properly pre-pared to pack and unpack. Do a few

stretches to loosen up your muscles, especially after a long drive.

Back problems are so common in the community that all of us need to develop new habits and ways of thinking about how we use our backs.

Lifting, bending and twisting are things we all tend to do without threatened by an untimely back injury.a great deal of thought....and then wish like mad we hadn't, when back pain strikes!

STUDY AFTER YE'R 10?

If your child wants to take up further study after Year 10, then the related costs could make you think twice. Don't despair, there are a number of Allowances that are designed to help both you and your child. AUSTUDY are available for each 16 year old. ISOLATED CHILDREN'S ALLOVANCE too, is available for students wishing to study in Launceston who are still 15 years old, or whose parents income prevents them from being eligible for Austudy. Austudy is flexible enough to be paid at the beginning of terms, and some students use this to assist in paying hostel boarding costs. There is a Boarding Allowance which assists with boarding costs. A CONVEYANCE ALLOWANCE is also available to parents and students to help with travelling costs.

The East Coast Education Centre is an option too, for further education — it is available for all Grade 10 leavers AND any adults who would like to continue their education. The subjects offered vary from year to year, according to staffing and student numbers/needs.

During the second term at the High School, we hope to hold a Careers afternoon for Grade 9 and 10 students, and any interested parents. A wide range of career options will be represented, from University through hospitality courses, to the Armed Forces.

WARD BOUNDARIES IN THE FINGAL MUNICIPALITY.

A number of years ago, Council recognised that he number of Electors in each Ward was not in proportion to the number of Councillors each Ward was able to elect. Due to the petition of North Scamander to leave the Portland Municipality and come into the Fingal Municipality, Council was unable to fully consider the matter of Ward Boundaries until the petition's outcome was resoved.

As soon as North Scamander became part of the Fingal Municipality Council immediately undertook a complete review of the Ward Boundaries.

While the question of Ward Boundaries seem simple, it should be noted that the Fingal Munici; ality is the 8th largest Municipality in area in Tasmania - it is also very diversewe cover from the Snowfields in Ben Lomond in the West, to a large coastal area in the East. Between that, we have to include Farming, Coal Mining, Forestry, Small Businesses and a variety of other industries and businesses..

In addition to these aspects, we must also take into account the large number of townships and hamlets in our Municipality: Royal George Avoca, Rossarden, Mathinna, Mangana Fingal, Cornwall, St. Marys, Gray, Falmouth, Fourmile Creek, Seymour,

South Scamander and North Scamander. Council took all the foregoing aspects into account, including the strong desire of coastal gitizens to be represented by a single ward covering from North Scamander right down to Seymour. Council therefore submitted a comprehensive 45 page report to the Local Government Advisory Board, which is the responsible Authority for making a decision on Ward Boundaries and converting this decision into a recommendation to the Minister for Local Government on any changes to Ward Boundaries.

Due to the large area of our Municipality, Council put forward a case of retaing our four wards, which included a Coastal Ward from North Scamander down to Seymour. Council's submission was not accepted by the Local Government Advisory Board as the proposed Coastal Ward would have an Elector population of 37% but would have only 25% of the Councillors representing this ward.

The Board suggested that if a ward had 37% of the total Municipal area voting population, then it should, at least, have one third of

the total number of Councillors. This could not be achieved under a four Ward system - this was recognised by both Council and the Board. The Board then Suggested that Council should consider a Municipality with no Wards.

Council was concerned tht under a no Ward system, large areas of the Municipality could be disadvantaged. It was therfore greed between Council and the Local Government Advisory Board that we should await the 1990 April Elections of Councils in Tasmania to see the results of Municipalities which had abolished the Ward System to enable the Board and Council to assess whether the people of our Municipal ly would be disadvantaged by abolishing wards or whether a 3 ward system would be preferable.

Council i now waiting for comments from the Local Government Advisory Board following the April 1990 Elections.

You are assured that Council is making every endeavour to finalise the matter of Ward Boundaries but it is also endeavouring to ensure that the interests of the people of our whole Municipality are taken into account..

NURSING - ST. MARYS DISTRICT HOSPITAL

A letter from Mr. John White, Minister for Health to Mr. George Shaw, M.L.C.

Dear Mr. Shaw,
Thank you for your letter of 3rd
May 1990 concerning the position
of Director of Nursing at St.
Marys District Hospital.
The position of Director of Nursing
at St. Marys had been unfilled for
about seven months. The staff situation at St. Marys Hospital was
suffering because of lack of stability in the direction of the nursing services. Despite repeated
advertising and interview only one
suitable applicant was selected
for the position. However, before
final appointment she withdrew her
application.

The decision was made in consultation with the Department of Health and the unions to appoint Mrs. Allison Smith, the Director of Nursing at St. Helens, to be responsible for both St. Helens and St. Marys Hospitals. Suitable arrangements were made to provide additional staff between the two hospitals to ensure there was no drop in nursing staff members.

The appointment was made for a period of six months and will be reviewed at the end of this time and a decision will be made to continue or to revert back to the original situation.

I am pleased to report that the transition to one Director of Nursing has been smooth and I am advised that the morale of the staff at St. Marys Hospital has started to improve.

The Government is committed to the provision of high quality health services for all Tasmanians. The residents of St. Marys and the surrounding area will continue to be provided with good health services and every effort will be made to ensure they are improved

made to ensure they are improved and appropriate to the needs of the area.

GRAY SCHOOL

The following information relating to Gray School was obtained from Walch's Almanacks held in the Archives section of the State Library and from Annual Reports held in this office.

Gray School opened in 1887 and during its first year of operation was open for a period of 91 days. The average enrolment for this year was 22. According to the Annual Reports for the years 1900 and 1901 the sum of £560.2.0. was spent in relation to the erection of a school and residence.

A further £126.0.0. was spent on the

further £126.0.0. was spent on the school in 1909. Enrolments gradually declined and the school was closed in 1929. The average enrolment for the final year was 13.

A. Year End Tax Planning

Given Australia's current economic climate and the possibility of high interest rates continuing, the minimisation of any income tax liability can be achieved through efficient year end tax planning for all tax-

The majority of year end tax planning involves either the deferral of assessable income or the acceleration of deductible expenditure. Income deferral can take two forms:

deferring the collection of fees; or deferring the earning of income. a)

b)

Deferring the collection of fees is only possible if you are assessed on a receipts basis; it can be achieved simply by suggesting to debtors that payment be postponed or by not sending out accounts for fees/work owing until after 1 July.

<u>Deferring the earning of income</u> can include not selling livestock or wool until after 1 July instead of May/June.

Examples of accelerating deductible expenditure include bringing forward maintenance programmes, making deductible gifts to charities, prepayment of up to 13 months equivalent of liabilities such as interest, before 30 June. The extent of which each individual can utilise these methods will depend on several factors such as:

cash flow position

holding costs of stock e.g. storage and interest costs, pasture a) b) damage

seasonal variations in prices.

Conversely, there may be occasions whereby it may be beneficial to increase taxable income for the current financial year to utilise tax free thresholds (presently \$5100). Each option depends on the individual status of each taxpayer.

Changes In Legislation

There have been several changes in tax legislation since 1 July 1989 which may effect taxpayers and their decisions over the next few months Listed below are several important changes worth noting. and beyond.

- Contributions up to \$3000 are fully deductible by self employed persons. Effective from 1 July 1990 an extra deduction of 75% of amounts in excess of \$3000 will be introduced. Superannuation
- ii) <u>Tax File Numbers</u>
 Those taxpayers who do not submit their tax file number to their employer/contractor are automatically required to have tax deducted at the highest marginal rate - 48.25%.
- Company Taxpayers now have a new system of paying tax replacing the previous quarterly instalments. Elections requesting deferral of liabilities due on 28 July 1990 must be lodged with the Taxation Company Tax Department by 28 July 1990.
- iv) Non Primary Production Losses
 The seven year limit on the carry forward of such losses has been july 1989.
- v) Loans to Pay Income Tax A business that incurs interest on money borrowed to pay its income tax will generally now be deductible.
- vi) Management of Tax Affairs
 All taxpayers can now claim a deduction for expenses relating to the management of their taxation affairs, not just the preparation of return
