COMMUNITY 1990 IS THE START OF A DECADE OF LANDCARE

Landcare is a community program involving landholders and other people working in groups to tackle land degradation problems of concern in their local area.

The program encourages good land management and aims to ensure sustainable productivity and amenity value throughout Tasmania.

Landcare groups identify, plan, implement and maintain their own Landcare projects. They have access to technical and financial assistance through Government, such as the National Soil Conservation Program (NSCP) and the Billion Trees Program.

LANDCARE ON ALL LANDS

Landcare projects occur on both private and public lands. On farm land it makes sense that landholders and other members of the local On farm erosion, salinity, rabbits and weeds under the Community Landcare

On public lands a similar approach can be taken - projects may include protection of temnant vegetation and wildlife habitat and erosion control; or participation in the preparation of land use

### Proposed School Bus Charges

I thank your office and you for your phone call on the above subject which I am sure you will agree has become a major issue. Even though I feel you have heard my opinion I now submit it in writing.

Under the Education Act 1932 children aged 6 to 16 are compelled to enrol and attend school. It also provides that the Minister establish such schools as are necessary for the purposes of the Act and that no fees shall be charged for instruction in State Schools.

The principle is clear the State must provide education for all and it is to be "free" (which means the taxpayer pays.) In line with this fundamental provision is equality of access for all children wherever they live.

children wherever they live.

That is why years ago schools were built in every village settle-

ment to enable access.

As roads and transport improved, the Government closed schools and centralised always with the undertaking that for country children there would be a free bus, provided the child lived further than 3.2 kilometres from the school and numbers were within certain limits.

The situation for city children is quite different. Few live further than 3.2 kilometers from the school and other transport

options are available.

To impose a charge on country children in the name of equity (because city children already pay) is a complete misunderstanding and misrepresentation of the situation.

While I acknowledge there are anomalies and inequities within the school transport system which ought to be removed, I cannot accept the proposal to impose a charge on all students served by the country bus system. This impost would deny equality of access and in effect reverse the principles of "free" education established under the Act.

There are many other good arguments that can be advanced to oppose this proposal but I am sure you are aware of them. In summary I believe the proposal is unwarraned, unwanted and unworkable.

### CRIME FREVENTION

Equipment Security

Adopt the concept of removal of risk by introducing the following theft reduction techniques; (1) The theft of batteries, tools and accessories from tractors or farm implements may be prevented by locating the equipment in a locked building or in proximity to an accupied residence;

- (2) Property near a roadway is more susceptible to theft or damage. Remove the opportunity by removing the item to a more secure location;
- (3) Chain implements to a permanent item of a substantial nature;
- (4) Identify equipment and tools by engraving, welding or stamping your drivers licence number on the item;
- (5) Retain literature incorporating photographs of your equipment or photograph the unit;
- (6) Record any serial numbers or modifications;
- (7) Remove keys from vehicles when not in use, consider isolation switch for the ignition;
- (8) Lock fuel pumps and storage tank access, consider isolation of power supply;
- (9) Many smaller farm implements are easily transportable rotary hoses, ride on mowers, pumps etc,. identify them as yours and lock them away;
- (10) Lock away oxy-acetylene cutting equipment, hacksaws, crow-bars and other similar equipment which may be used by offenders;
- (11) Secure your vehicle and contents, remove property and documentation from the glovebox and lock valuables in the boot, make use of a lockable garage if possible;
- (12) If thefts from shearing sheds are occurring in your area, consider leaving a dog chained at the shed. A barking dog may deter an offender and alert you.

Dear Sir, WHEELY BINS HAVE SALES TAX ADVANTAGE

Tasmanian councils should con-sider the use of "wheely bins" for the collection of household rubbish following a recent Federal Court ruling. The Federal Court decision has exempted from sales tax the "wheely bins" used to collect rubbish in the Knox municipality in Melbourne even though the collections are completed by private contractors. Brambles, the contractor has leased the bins to the council who are responsible for their care and any damage that might follow from their misuse. If the precedent set by this case is applied widely by government bodies seeking to contract services it/may make "contracting out" a far more viable proposition. Councils should look at renegotiating their rubbish disposal contracts to ensure that equipment is leased from contractors and controlled by councils. The new ruling could also be applicable to other functions which are/can be contracted out such as computer services and




