NEIGHBOURHOOD

Continuing the series of LOCK IT, OR LOSE IT! CRIME PREVENTION.
HOME SECURITY

Frequently, burglaries are committed by the offender gaining access to the residence via an unlocked door or window. To minimise the opportunity for burglary, it is suggested you consider the following:

- * Lock your home and outbuildings when absent
- * Ensure all locks are adequate and operating correctly
- * Remove keys which may be left available for others' use
- * Provide adequate lighting for identification of callers and around your yard and outbuildings
- * Fit a security door to the front and rear of your residence
- * Record serial numbers of items of value in the home
- * Mark all property of value in the home with your driver's licence number. Photograph all items which cannot be marked.
- * Where possible, fit an intruder alarm system which can be heard by neighbours

WHAT AND WHEN TO REPORT TO POLICE

You should know who lives in your area. If you don't, make an effort to find out who your neighbours are and what vehicles they drive. You may feel that you are being 'nosey', but it will assist you in recognising suspicious vehicles or people in your area. Tell your neighbours what vehicles you drive, so that they can also be aware. It works both ways.

If you see people or vehicles loitering near houses, sheds, equipment or livestock - check it out e.g. this may mean telephoning your neighbour to ask him if he knows about a vehicle parked at his shearing shed. It may check out OK, but in doing so you may also prevent a theft from occurring. If you are suspicious, call the police.

If you are going to approach

vehicles or people who are where they shouldn't be, do so with extreme caution. If possible try to have another person with you...

Pay attention to vehicles carrying livestock or other heavy loads in your area. They may be on legitimate business, but they may also be carrying stolen stock or property. If you aren't sure, jot down the registration number and any other details you may notice. If you see anything of an urgent nature, call the police immediately.

If you need to contact police about suspicious persons or vehicles be prepared to supply the best description possible. It would be preferable to note descriptions of suspects and vehicles at the time you see them.

It is surprising how quickly major details of descriptions can be forgotten. Vehicle registration numbers are particularly important if police are to quickly check out suspicious activity.

Be observant. Most residents regularly use the roads in their area; e.g. taking the children to school, going into town for supplies, checking stock etc. Be aware, not only of your property and your neighbour's property, but also who else is using the roads in your area.

Property near a roadway is more susceptible to theft or damage. Remove the opportunity by removing the item to a more secure location.

Remove keys from vehicles when not in use, consider an isolation switch for the ignition.

Secure your vehicle and contents, remove property and documentation from the glovebox and lock valuables in the boot, make use of a lockable garage if possible. It is essential that police are notified as soon as possible after any theft. This increases both the chance of recovery and the apprehension of the offenders.

LEARNING TO READ AND WRITE THE BEGINNING

READING is the process of getting meaning from print. Learning to read is more than knowing alphabet sounds or recognising words. It is all about getting a message from print.

WRITING is the process of recording ideas or messages using written symbols so that the thoughts of the writer are communicated to the reader.

Teachers do many things to help children learn to read and write. BUT the most important early experiences with reading and writing happen at home. By spending time reading and writing with your child, you demonstrate how important these skills are, and help your child take the first step towards literacy.

FAMILIES CAN HELP BY:

- letting children know they value the skills of reading and writing.
- valuing the child's early attempts to read and write.
- sharing books and stories; reading to children every day.
- encouraging children to record ideas and messages using their own "writing".
- encouraging children to "read" stories to you.
- writing with your child, e.g. a shopping list, a letter to Nan etc.
- making children aware of print in their world, and the way we use print every day.

ST.MARYS - ST.HELENS COUNTRY AREAS PROGRAM

1991 SUBMISSIONS

The St.Marys - St.Helens Country Education Committee invites submissions from any interested individuals or organisations for Country Areas Program funding in 1991.

The Country Areas Program caters for all students from Avoca, Rossarden, Mathinna, Fingal, Bicheno, St.Marys and St.Helens Schools.

The Country Areas Program is funded by the Commonwealth Government through the Department of Employment, Education and Training. The Program has been operating for the past eleven years, supporting programs in both government and non government schools throughout Australia.

The Country Areas Program is designed to assist children in the Primary, Secondary and Senior Secondary age categories. The program aims to improve the educational participation and achievement of students disadvantaged by restricted access to social, cultural and educational activities and services as a result of geographical isolation. The program also provides a framework whereby schools and isolated communities can work co-operatively to improve the educational opportunities available to country children. The Country Areas Program encourages a high community participation and attempts to capitalise on the strengths of country communities.

The basic objectives of the Program are to find ways of overcoming isolation through sharing resources, broadening students' understanding of occupational horizons, building students' self esteem, making imaginative use of the expertise of local people, providing children with access to a range of cultural activities and providing opportunities for teachers to interact with parents and their community.

Projects funded by the program generally fall into five categories. These include the employment of specialist staff, the funding of school trips and excursions, the purchase of a wide range of materials and equipment, the support of minor works programs and the provision of in-service and staff development programs for teachers or community members involved in the Program.

These degraded areas have occurred as a result of logging prior to the implementation of the current Forest Practices Code which ensuring such damage is not created nowadays. The damage includes old log landings still with no vegetation, and snags tracks which are deeply eroding. The proposed Catchment Management Plan would highlight which of these areas require attention first. Also requiring attention is the river mouth which, due to filling with sediment, is widening and eroding it's banks.

Last weekend Mr. Garry McKenzie explained the LANDCARE scheme. Mr. McKenzie is the southern area LANDCARE co-ordinator who is also covering the northern part of the state until another person is appointed. Mr. McKenzie explained how LANDCARE is designed to assist concerned locals in repairing land and stream system damage in their area. He said that for many years poor land management practices have not been discouraged. He said that with the LANDCARE scheme the problems created can now start to be overcome.

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LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

PENSIONERS URGED TO MAXIMISE DEPOSIT INCOME IMMEDIATELY

Pensioners who have deposits in low interest bearing accounts should change to higher interest bearing accounts immediately to maximise their income.

This will compensate the drop in pension income that could occur from 1 March 1991 when the Dept. of Social Security will assess money deposited by pensioners with financial institutions as earning 10%.

Financial institutions normally pay interest on investment accounts after a period of three, six or twelve months, depending on the account requirements. By changing their accounts NOW pensioners will receive their first interest payments before 1 March.

Thus, a single pensioner on full pension who has \$30,000 in an account earning 10% and receives \$3,000 interest a year will have his pension reduced by \$8.85 a week. However, if he changes his account now he will receive a lump sum interest payment before 1 March which makes him better off, after tax by \$24.25 a week.

A pensioner with this amount in a 10% interest earning account will be \$1200 a year better off with no loss of fringe benefits.

Pensioners should remember that the higher the interest rate on investments, the higher the risk and should check the deposits' security.

The Department of Social Security has a financial investment service which provides free advice to pensioners who require financial assistance. This advice is available on 008 030779.

FOOTBALL TIP FROM "POLLY FARMER"

The secret of success - in football and in life - involves five essentials: Burning ambition, acting on it, practising fundamentals until expert, overcoming fear, and "reading the game"

Many top-line footballers lack skill in fundamentals, especially kicking, and never achieve the heights they could achieve; they've lacked the drive to practise until expert. Stranger still, many of the most ambitious and practised experts never reach the top - they can't perform under match conditions with the efficiency they demonstrate in training.

Why? Fear of getting hurt, which fogs the mind and constricts skilful body habits built up in training. Or inability to read the game - a matter of concentration and judgment, being in the right position at the right time, interpreting the play automatically.

Overall, there's the matter of perspective. The individual is part of a whole, the player part of a team; the team that controls the ball controls the game. Whatever your position, you're both an attacking and defending player. Consider the possible conclusion of every play - as habit. Keep hand - passing, backing up, concentrating - for the full game.
