WHAT IS HEADWAY?

HEADWAY TASMANIA was formed at the end of 1986, to offer support to the brain injured and their loved ones.

Brain injury - through accident, aneurysm, stroke etc - can happen to anyone at any time. It is not something people can prepare for. It affects not only the victim but his or her relatives and friends too. Many loved ones find themselves unable to cope with the situation and necessary care and responsibility often fall back onto one person (generally wife or mother).

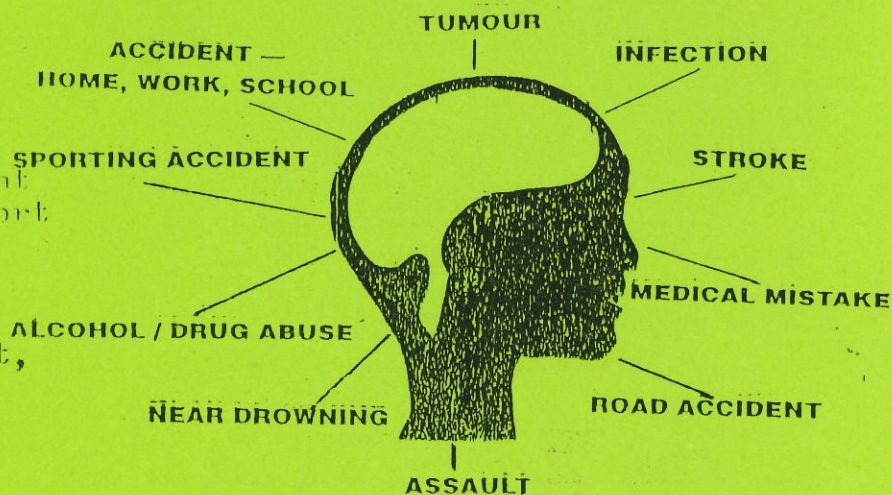
HEADWAY aims to:

1. Support and provide information to brain injured people, their relatives and friends.
2. Stimulate public and government awareness of the problems faced by brain injured people.
3. Offer activities and therapy through a group of relatives, volunteers and professionals.
4. Share information through regular meetings and newsletters.

HOW CAN VOLUNTEERS HELP?

People who have been seriously head injured are often left with a range of disabilities.

The most commonly found problems are:



1. Loss of the use of one side of the body.
2. Loss of co-ordination and the ability to respond quickly.
3. Loss of short term memory.
4. Lack of motivation and the ability to concentrate.
5. Double vision, or the loss of vision to one side.
6. Loss of speech, or difficulty in sorting language out properly.

As a result most brain injured people need assistance with day-to-day tasks and recreational activities. For those living at home this becomes a daunting task for the carer. For those living in nursing homes the lack of stimulation often leads to a loss of interest in life.

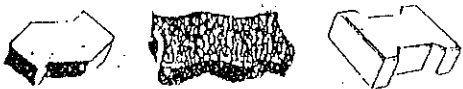

TAX CAN NOW BE PAID AT THE POST OFFICE

Senator John Watson (Lib, Tas) to day welcomed the move by the Australian Tax Office to allow group tax payments to be made at any Australia Post Office or post office agency.

"The service, known as ATO BillPay is similar to the way gas, electricity and telephone bills can be currently paid."

"Group employers can now simply present their payments with the new group tax remittance form. The form, which is blue in colour and carries an ATO code.

"This code allows access to Australia Post's electronic counter service, which is a huge computer network linking post offices around Australia with the ATO.

"Tasmania and Victoria are the forerunners of this new system which has been introduced to encourage employers off the old tax stamp system method of tax payments.

"The BillPay service is free and receipts will be issued on the spot," Senator Watson concluded.

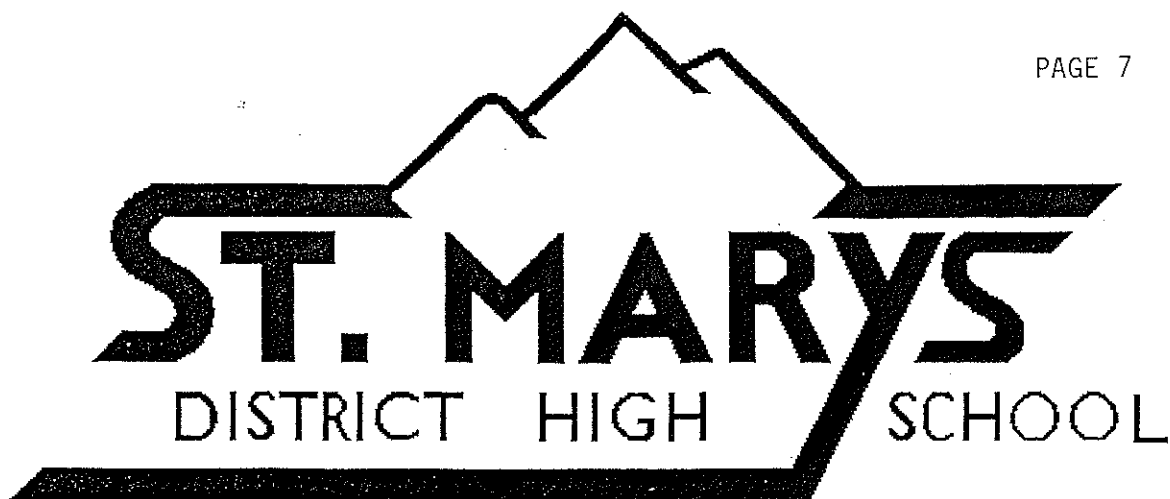

CRESSY SPORTS EXCHANGE

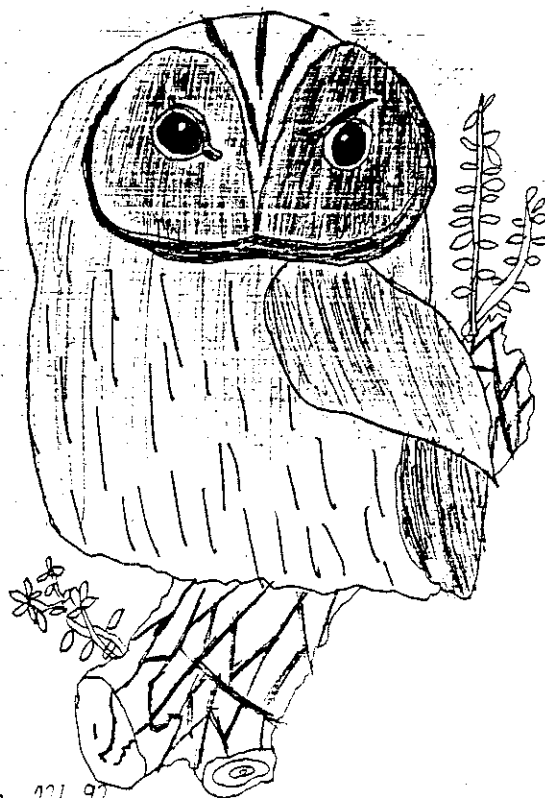

EXTRACT FROM WALSH'S ALMANAC

FINGAL VALLEY

1864
(Part 5)

On the right "Mount Nicholas" in front, "St. Patrick's Head, and the "Elephant", a mount so named from the striking resemblance its outline bears to the head and back of that animal.

Soon appears in view to the right the imposing mansion of Killymoon, with its plantations and gardens, the residence of Thos. Ransom, J.P., shortly after passing which you see to the left, under Mount Nicholas, the pretty cottage of Millbrook, standing near the water mill worked by the stream, from which the estate derives its name; this is also the property of Mr. Ransom.

Passing the farms of Messrs McIntee and others, part of the Killymoon Estate, you reach Storth, in the occupation of Mr. R.C. Kirkham, and to the right, at a short distance from the road, can be seen occasionally through the trees, Cullenswood House, the residence of Henry Cowell.

Near the road stands a neat wooden building, the Roman Catholic Church, where service is given monthly by the Rev. Mr. Callaghan from Campbell Town. Some short distance further on, the village of Cullenswood is opened to the view, the church and its parsonage, the residence of the Rev. J. Chambers, and contiguous are the cottage residences of Messrs. O'Brien, Silas Bryan and Capt. Wright, who occupy portions of the Cullenswood Estate. Here are also the Post Office and the public school.

Soon after passing these, you enter the Londavra Estate, the property of Robert Cameron of Clairville, near Evandale. Here is a neat roadside inn, at which may be found ample accommodation to meet the requirements of the neighbourhood.

At about two miles further on, after passing the turn off to the left to the estate of Rose Garland with its mill, the property of Mr. H. G. Archdall, you reach the private road to Harefield, on the right,

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the estate of Francis Groom, J.P., whose hospitable residence stands at about three miles from the road.

The several estates of Killymoon, Millbrook, Cullenswood, Londavra, Storth and Harefield, occupy the fine rich marshland of the Break O'Day Plains, let out to a numerous tenantry, devoted chiefly to dairy purposes, now unfortunately in a very depressed condition, having to contend against the embarrassing combination of high rent with low prices.

The private road to Harefield is bounded by the township of St. Marys, where is seen the police office to the right. There are about half a dozen tenements on the township, including the house of Mr. Thos. Hardy, at the side of the rivulet. Crossing this log bridge, the road continues through forest for some few miles. Through the trees to the right may occasionally be seen glimpses of the rocky peak of St. Patricks Head, not far from the foot of which you pass on your way to St. Marys Pass, the head of which is soon reached.

Here the traveller stands at 1,050 feet above the level of the sea, the horizon of which is soon seen far in the distance as he begins to descend the Pass. The road winds round the steep mountain side of this romantic glen, on the right towering high above, while on the left is seen the precipitous descent to the chasm below, relieved from a forbidding aspect by the variety of the rich foliage opened to the view; the different species of gum trees, blue gum, peppermint, stringy bark, iron bark, also mimosa (or wattle), sassafras, myrtle, box, fern trees and grass trees, with their elegant and graceful fronds; these offer themselves to the view in the deep dark hollow far below, on which you look almost perpendicularly down.
