The Child Support Scheme

The Government will introduce a range of measures to improve the Scheme in response to the findings of the Child Support Evaluation Advisory Group (CSEAG), chaired by Justice Fogarty. CSEAG reported that the initial 8 week delay in making payments is the most frequent complaint about the system. We will introduce two measures to ensure the earlier distribution of child support payments from December 1992.

- **Earlier Distribution of Child Support Payments.** This will involve distributing payments on the third Wednesday of the month of payment, as well as the existing payment on the first Wednesday of the month following the month of payment. About 26,000 custodial parents will receive their payment averaging around \$300 per month between two and three weeks sooner than at present.

- **Allowing new Stage One Clients to collect maintenance privately.** At present, clients who fall under Stage One of the Child Support Scheme (applies to children born before 1 October 1989 whose parents separated before that date) who have court orders or registered agreements must apply to the Child Support Agency (CSA) for the collection of maintenance. This will bring them into line with Stage 2 clients who can now collect privately. The amount collected must be 100 per cent of the maintenance amount.

- **Formula assessment of Private Maintenance Cases.** Up to 1 July 1992, custodial parents required to take action for child support under Stage 2 of the Scheme (applies to children born on or after 1 October 1989 or whose parents had separated on or after that date) were permitted to make private arrangements for the collection of maintenance. However, the amount of maintenance they were required to collect was determined by a CSA estimate. These estimates tend to understate the non-custodian's liability and they are not updated annually.

This initiative will still allow people to collect maintenance privately but it will require custodial parents to apply for a formal assessment. Consequently there will be no difference in the level of child support obtained by Stage 2 people granted a social security payment before 1 July 1992 compared with those people granted on or after 1 July 1992.

From 1 January 1993 penalties will be imposed at a rate tied to the comparable income tax provisions (currently 20 per cent per annum) and determined on the accumulated balance of outstanding liabilities, excluding previous penalties raised. Information provided to liable parents will appear similar to common accounts such as Bankcard where charges are determined on the basis of the total amount of outstanding debt. (saving the Australian Taxation Office \$0.5m in 92-3 and \$1.5m for each of the following two years)

- **Costs of Access.** We recognise that there are significant costs incurred by the non-custodial parent if access is substantial and their capacity and need to pay should be reduced. From 1 July 1993, the child support formula currently used when care of children is shared equally (at least 40 per cent each) will apply in cases where non custodial parents have substantial access to their children (between 30 and 40 per cent).

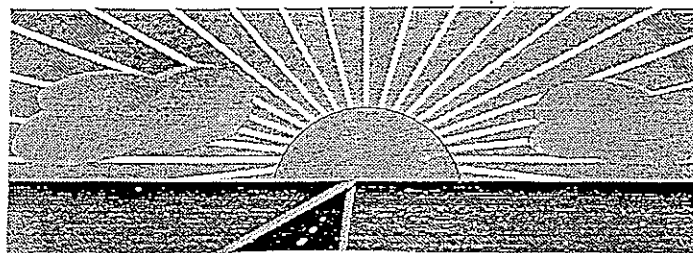

RECORDS OF ACHIEVEMENT



As a result of recent developments in education, students in all grades are encouraged to compile a record of their experiences and achievements whilst at school. It is now compulsory for each Grade 10 student to leave school with a folder which should give a comprehensive picture of such experiences and achievements.

There are two parts to a Record of Achievement. The first part is the Portfolio, which is a wide collection of documents and materials from past and recent times - certificates, awards, personal statements, resumes, references, photographs/samples of work produce, details of extra-curricular activities and hobbies, evidence of voluntary community services, competitions entered, newspaper clippings, and so on. The second part to the Record of Achievement is a special collection of documents selected from the Portfolio for a specific purpose (for example, a job interview, enrolment at College, an application for a scholarship).

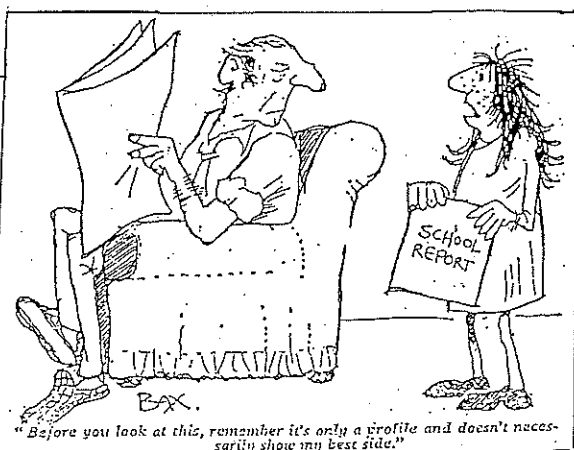
It should be stressed that the employment purpose of the Record of Achievement is just one aspect of the benefits of students having a collection of materials about themselves from both inside and outside the school. The process of compiling the Portfolio/Record of Achievement encourages students to reflect upon their strengths, identify what they could do better and set appropriate goals for themselves. The Portfolio should be an ongoing record which can be added to in later years so that students have all important personal documents about themselves up-to-date to use for whatever purpose.

Class teachers and a school Records of Achievement co-ordinator assist students with the collection of information for his/her portfolio.

Parents are able to assist by encouraging their son/daughter to collect and store relevant materials on significant experiences and achievements. The process is one which involves students, parents and teachers. It is also a lifelong process and one which many adults are becoming involved.

It is especially important in the current economic situation as people need tangible evidence of their strengths, skills and achievements in order to give them an edge in our highly competitive labour market.

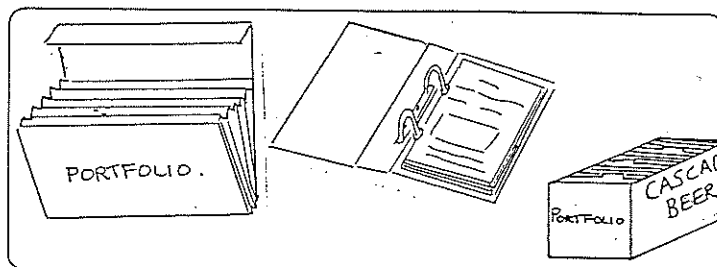

There are two parts to a Record of Achievement:

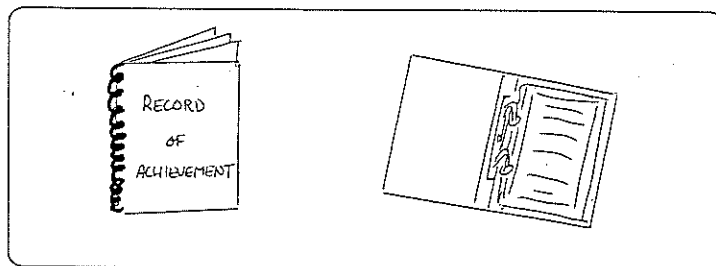
Part 1 PORTFOLIO:

- * from these documents are selected the pieces to put into a Record of Achievement.

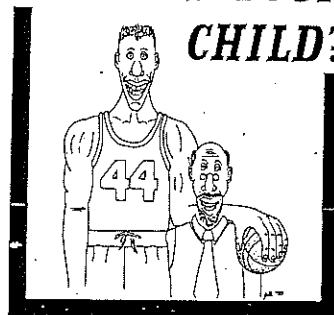


Part 2 RECORD OF ACHIEVEMENT:

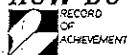
- * is a special collection of documents put together for a particular purpose.

TAX COMPUTER SOFTWARE WARNING

Individuals using commercially produced computer software programs designed to assist persons not using tax agents to complete their tax returns need to be aware that these programs have not been endorsed or checked for accuracy by the Tax Office.

The Tax Office does not check for commercial entrepreneurs the accuracy of their products.

Individuals using these computer programs also need to be aware that these packages will require updating each year, to reflect the changes in legislation and returns processing procedures.

Further, whilst some of these packages produce the final results in a format which resembles a tax return form, these forms have not been approved by the Tax Office.

Therefore, the information on these forms will need to be transferred onto a normal tax return form for lodgment with the Tax Office.

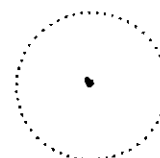
