ST.MARYS SWIMMING POOL

At the last meeting of the St. Mary's Swimming Pool Committee held on 28th September, 1992 it was decided by unanimous vote to finally commence preparations for the construction of a new St Marys School Pool.

After six years of consistent and methodical fundraising the Committee has found itself in a classic 'Catch 22' situation. To construct a 25 metre X 12 metre concrete pool (similar to the one found at Campbell Town) complete with solar/coal powered heating system, change rooms, pump shed, landscaping etc etc a sum of over \$130,000 is required. This amount would increase by 8% p.a. because of spiralling labour and material costs each year. Consequently the Pool Committee would have to raise approximately \$10,000 p.a. just to keep pace with inflation before making inroads into the initial capital construction cost.

A sum of \$33,000 has been raised over the past six years. During that time the Pool Committee has made every endeavour for the extra required funding from both Federal and State Governments with no results.

The Fingal Council whilst supporting the concept cannot commit the ratepayers of the Municipality to the required \$100,000 construction cost shortfall.

Consequently a less 'grandiose' pool will now be constructed on the existing school pool site.

The monies already raised will be given to the St Marys District High School to be used for the construction of a school pool approximately 20m x 8m. At the time of this report exact details and information as to the technical specifications are not complete but will be made public as soon as possible. The St. Marys School has agreed in principle to the concept and will meet with the Executive of the Pool Committee to finalize specifics later this week.

It is envisaged that the old 'key-system' will remain available to families on application and that the Swimming Pool Committee will be responsible for some administration and maintenance.

A special mention must be attributed to the many tireless fundraisers over the past six years, to Mary Targett and Anne Birrell in particular, and to all who have donated time and monies to this worthwhile fundraising project.

The \$33,000 'bank' has only been possible by way of a consistent and loyal band of fundraisers with the ultimate goal in mind - that of a recreational and competitive sized heated pool for the District. One must admire years of persistence with not even a hole in the ground.

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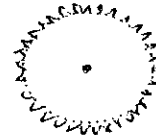
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with Chris Davern, Nearest Pin the 5th and Trevor Viney with his second shot on the 9th.

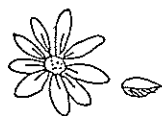

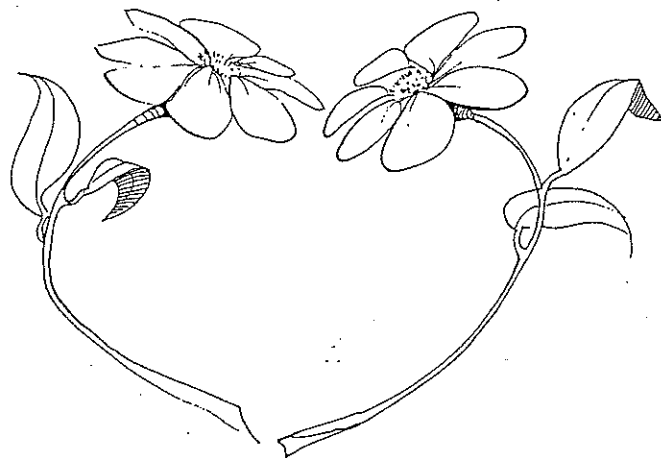

THE MIDDLE YEARS OF SCHOOLING (YEARS 6-10)

The following is an abridged extract from a national Schools Council discussion paper "Compulsory Years Of Schooling".

While the first ten years of a child's life can be characterised as an explosion of learning and information processing, the ages 11 to 15 represent the most momentous changes in the physical, and hence emotional and psychological aspects of the human experience. It is the period when young children begin the process of maturation to adulthood.

"Rather than being a way-station between childhood and adulthood, adolescence has its own characteristic elements and challenges. Adolescence is a construct defined by social, biological and other factors. This view that adolescence is in part socially defined implies a significant role for schools in shaping adolescence."
(Cormack, 1991, 5)

Schools generally seek to develop for today's youth a strongly academic approach to learning, based upon a particular organisation of knowledge. This does present problems for many young adolescents.

Consider, for example, the impact of youth culture, with its emphasis on music and ever changing fashions in clothing, food, demeanour, enthusiasms for friendships and peer group influences and so on.

There are some characteristics of this culture which need to be examined in terms of its relation to schooling. Youth culture, for example:

- * does not place a high premium on textual analysis
(eg. the close reading of books), which remains the chief means of transmitting information and shaping learning in our schools;
- * places a high premium on other, less literal forms of communication (eg television, video, films, music, magazines), and probably provides unprecedented opportunities for young people to develop skills in this area;
- * exalts energy and movement, unlike schools which often seek to channel energy and contain or restrict movement;
- * develops its own fashionable and changing idiom and expression, while schools seek to develop verbal communication based on standard Australian English; and
- * is national, even international in its scope and nature.

An understanding and analysis of this culture and its relationship to the school is an important path towards understanding some of the difficulties faced by both young people and the school (a social construct) in developing appropriate and congenial learning environments.

LAUNCESTON SHOW REPORT

CATTLE HANDLING

Preparations began as early as June when David Young once again loaned three heifers to the school. For the third year in a row, UMT Hopkins provided valuable sponsorship and their continued support for this activity is much appreciated. A group of 26 students began the task of preparing Jennifer, Adelphi and Chelsea White for the 1992 Royal Launceston Show. Daily feeding and lunchtime grooming, leading and washing sessions continued for many weeks, and eventually a team of 14 students was chosen to represent the school.

Preparations didn't finish there as some members of the group worked on the Sunday before the Show on final washing and clipping of the heifers. These students also travelled to Launceston on Wednesday to help ready the animals for judging the next day. The extensive preparation paid off as two of the heifers (Jennifer and Adelphi) were judged first and second in their class - drawing comments from the judge on the excellent preparation and presentation of the heifers. Jennifer went on to be judged Reserve Junior Champion Poll Shorthorn Female. Congratulations to Jane Lewis, Corinna Freeman, Claire Loane and Natalie Brown for their work during this part of the Show and especially to Annette Smylie who was not only a member of our team but was also acting as Stud Groom for Mr. Young as part of her Work Experience. Annette impressed Mr. Young with her initiative and responsibility and even beat the boss to work on a number of occasions (not bad when we're talking 6.30 am!).

Thursday contained its fair share of trauma as Natalie was injured and temporarily hospitalised when one of the heifers bolted.

Thursday finished with the girls leading in the Grand Parade.

Saturday dawned grey and overcast but this did not deter the group who arrived at 7.30 am for the Junior Handlers competition. It was great to see some of the new members of the group experiencing success with Andrea Gillies placing third in the 9-12 years Parading competition and Joanne Denney placing fourth in the 9-12 years Grooming competition.

The senior handlers did not have any success although they all performed well and showed the benefit of previous years experience. Natalie arrived Saturday morning on crutches but determined to compete. After a searching fitness test, the selectors reluctantly gave her the nod and she did a creditable job, leading her heifer well. Rumour has it that she has been nominated for the Rampaging Roy Slavin/H.G. Nelson Intestinal Fortitude Award.

Despite having what I considered our best prepared team so far, we were not successful as in past years. Still, how do we measure success?

To see students prepared to spend hours of their own time; to see the good humour, comradeship and team spirit displayed by all; to see students leading and handling heifers so well when only weeks before they had been terrified of them - that is success enough for me.

Many thanks to all students, parents for their help with transport and accommodation and particularly David and Vivienne Young.

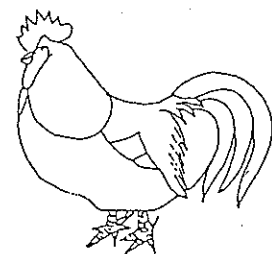

Article from Mr Alf Faulkner

This Story was brought home to me when I was about 17 years old while working at the mine. My job was to pull the skips of coal out to the surface with a poney four at a time and return with empty ones. It was a down hill grade for nearly 60 metres requiring every wheel to be spragged or skidded, the rails were always wet and slippery. One day they came out a bit faster than usual and went around a turn, the front one came off the rails and capsized emptying all the coal. The manager happened to be right on the spot and in a bad frame of mind. After rousing me he sent me to bring two men who were available for odd jobs like this one to replace it back and fill the coal back into it. They turned it back onto its wheels but it wasn't on the rails. "Fill it up, fill it up." he bellowed. We had better put it back on the rails first they said, and he could see his mistake but made them fill the skip first then lift it on full of coal. The Bible says, "He that knoweth to do good and doeth it not to that man, it is sin." These things originate from a bad temper. Let us try and avoid this kind of spirit dwelling in us. That is why we need the Spirit of the Lord dwelling in our mortal body or soul.

We were born without the spirit of holiness dwelling in us descendants of Adam. That is why Jesus said to Nicodemus you must be born again. That word must is a very positive word there is no substitute for it. In Hebrews eleven which is the great chapter of Faith, verse six says, "He that cometh to him must believe that he is and that he is a rewarder of them that diligently seek him."

He said without him we can do nothing, in plain speaking, he is all that we will ever need. Nicodemus couldn't understand how the Holy Spirit or the Spirit of Jesus could come into his body from Jesus. Jesus explained it by describing it to the wind. It is like the wind he said, you hear it, but you can't see it or what makes it. We can see the result of it, the trees swaying and other things moving, but we don't know where it comes from or where it goes to. So is every body that is born of the Spirit.

Kitchen stains easy to defeat

KITCHENWARE often becomes discoloured and stained with regular use but the Lever and Kitchen Advisory Service has some hints to restore it to its original sparkling state.

Stained china should be soaked in a solution of warm water with a few squirts of a household disinfectant cleaner, such as Domestos, and rinsed well.

However, avoid using this solution on items with silver or gold trims, or those which are chipped or cracked.

Chopping boards, jars and containers which have been filled with strong-smelling ingredients such as garlic frequently hold the offensive odour for long periods of time.

A solution of cold water and household disinfectant cleaner will also be effective in this situation if the items are soaked for a couple of hours.

An overnight soak in such a solution should remove all traces of tannin from tea cups, mugs and teapots.

One of the most dreaded kitchen chores, cleaning the oven, is made easier by pouring one cup of strong household cleaner containing ammonia, such as Handy Andy, into a tub with enough hot water to easily cover the grill trays and oven racks.

Soak these for several hours, then rub clean with a scouring pad and rinse well.

Clean the oven with a cream cleanser, such as Jif, and scrub with a scouring pad to remove baked-on grease, rinsing well with warm water before wiping clean.

It is advisable to wear rubber gloves when using cleaners containing ammonia and to cover your nose and mouth if you are particularly sensitive to strong fumes.
