DON'T COMPROMISE ON SAFETY

There is an increasing trend these days for many large, relatively heavy passenger vehicles like campervans, people-movers and four wheel drives to be fitted with passenger-types (as opposed to light truck or off-road tyres) as original equipment.

It's well known that passenger-type tyres provide a quieter, smoother ride and better handling than the stiffer-sidewalled, more robust, light truck tyres which require more pressure and therefore give a harder ride.

But if the decision is made to replace the tyres by either swapping tyres from light truck to passenger type, or vice versa, it is vital that tyres which have the appropriate speed and load ratings for the types of vehicle are fitted.

Australian Design Rules require that all new vehicles have a placard attached to the vehicle specifying the minimum load capacity tyre that can be fitted. This placard, usually located in the glovebox, or on the edge of the driver's door, also shows tyre/rim requirements, speed rating and recommended pressures.

Don't be tempted to buy tyres from a mate or from a newspaper ad or from a backyard tyre dealer, just because they'll fit your car and they're cheap.

Tyres with inappropriate load and speed ratings can flex dramatically in the sidewalls and build up excessive heat and therefore be prime candidates for a blowout, with potentially dire consequences.

Tyres are vital, primary safety items on your vehicle. Don't compromise on safety for the sake of expediency or a few dollars, especially when the lives of you and your family are at stake.

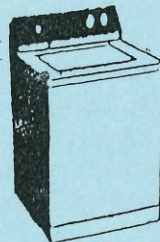

After months of speculation the Prime Minister has finally decided the Federal election will be held on March 13th.

The key issues in the election campaign will be unemployment and foreign debt. No doubt other issues will be raised, and also attempts will be made to distract public attention onto totally irrelevant matters, but the tragedy of unemployment must remain the central issue.

The Liberal Party's Fightback package will be judged by the people through the ballot box. While the package has come under some scrutiny over the past 18 months, at least John Hewson has had the vision to identify the country's needs, and the courage to make the tough decisions that are necessary to bring about improvement in the future.

On the other hand Mr. Keating is offering nothing new, and I can only presume that if he is re-elected the Australian economy will continue to deteriorate. Sadly the Labor Party has no idea how to solve the country's problems, and seems only to be engaging in manipulative politics simply to stay in power.

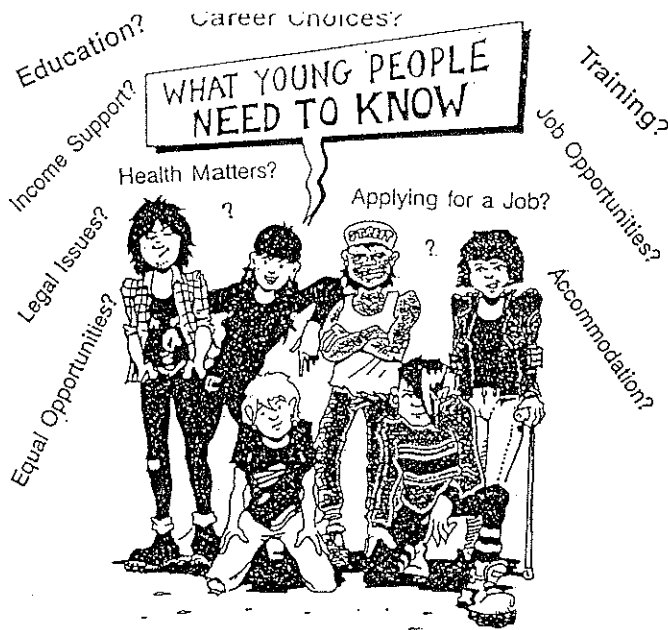
No one is pretending the task ahead of us is easy, or that quick and easy solutions are available. It will be a long hard haul to pay off the debts accumulated during the 80's, and to encourage wealth generating industries to establish in Australia. But the longer we allow the situation to drift the more difficult the correction process will be.

It is a sad reflection on the present generation that we will leave our kids with a lower standard of living than we inherited.

A start must be made somewhere and Fightback is the most comprehensive plan ever put to the Australian electorate. My ambition is to be part of the Hewson team that undertakes Australia's recovery. I feel embarrassed and annoyed that my kids will be forced to pay off the debts run up by my generation.

I believe Australia has a great future and I want to do my bit to develop the opportunities that I believe all young Australians are entitled to.

ST MARYS/FINGAL COMMUNITY SUPPORT GROUP

The group met again on Tuesday, 26th January to talk about ways in which unemployed people, of all ages, in the St Marys/Fingal area could help themselves, by sharing ideas and skills and by supporting each other in, perhaps, a community enterprise.

A few ideas were floated and we'd really like to know if other people would be interested in following them up too or have suggestions of their own that we could investigate. One of the ideas was along the lines of a project undertaken in Millicent in South Australia. A group of unemployed people obtained funding through a Skillshare organisation to make some street banners for their town - one banner depicted a local annual festival, another a regular sporting attraction and one other which advertised local tourist attractions. They had an artist, sponsored by the Arts Council, to work with them. Some people gained skills which they could develop further, perhaps in formal training or employment.

We also wondered how much interest there was in the Fingal/St Marys area for self-employment. If there is a fair amount of interest, it may be



possible to arrange for someone to help with ideas on setting-up an enterprise.

Councillor Steven Salter also joined the meeting to explain his new role as a Facilitator, which is partly to help local businesses, to provide information and advice on setting-up new ones and to explore avenues for funding for local initiatives.

Our group is interested in ways of encouraging recycling at the St Marys tip and had asked for help from the Council with the cost of providing some bins for people to separate their rubbish into. Councillor Salter has since said that the Council is keen for this idea to go ahead and has made a donation of \$200 towards the cost of provision of the bins. Again, we would really like other people who would like to be involved in a community project such as this to come and give us their ideas and, hopefully, their support.

Our next meeting will be at the St Marys Library at 11 a.m. on Tuesday 23rd February and we're having a sausage sizzle in the little park next to the library. Please come and share a sausage and an idea or two.

NO GST ON BASIC FOOD ITEMS

Under the revised Liberal Fightback plan, essential food items will NOT be taxed.

There will be no goods and services tax on basic food. This covers all food for home consumption not now covered by the present indirect sales tax.

There will be NO GST on poultry, eggs, fresh fruit, pure fruit juice, fresh fish, meat products, mild products, margarine, oils, flour, cereals, and bread. Fruit juice is presently taxed at 10%. Estimates based on an actual weekly grocery order show that the average price of the grocery order will drop by 2%.

With the other seven taxes that will be abolished under Fightback, it has been estimated that families will save nearly 7 cents in the dollar on poultry and eggs and nearly 5 cents in the dollar on fruit and vegetables.

In fact under the Fightback reforms the average family - Mum, Dad and two children on an income of under \$30 000 a year - \$48 a week better off when they take into account cheaper food, tax cuts, increases in family allowance and cheaper petrol.

The GST is a genuine substitute tax that replaces that present iniquitous, hidden wholesale tax and six other regressive taxes.

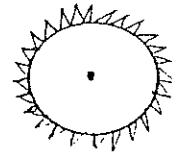

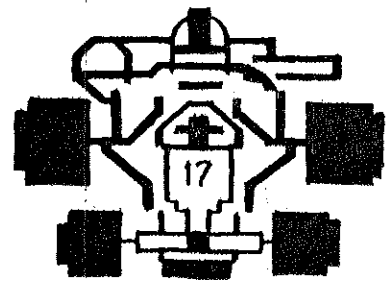
