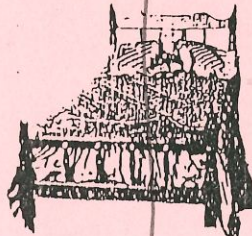

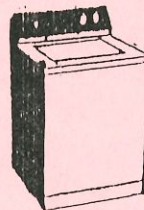

FINGAL VALLEY

1864
(part 6)

On the opposite of the glen the mountain side rises steeply and abruptly, towering far overhead, clothed with thick forest, the dark and sombre hue of the trees adding to the picturesque gloom of the romantic ravine.

Not far from the head of the Pass is "St. Marys Well", at which the traveller may refresh himself and horse with a draught of cool and delicious water, fresh from the spring on the mountain side, whose stream, never failing during the driest summer, after descending a steep rocky channel, is conveyed into a stone trough at the side of the road, placed there by the late Lieut.-James Arnold Wheeler, 71st Highlanders.

The features of the scene as you descend the Pass, cut in many places through rock, which now forms an abrupt wall, and inclines to the right, are ever changing in pleasing variety as the mountain road is descended, occasionally beautified by glimpses of the ocean in the far off distance, until near mid-way, apparently almost at the foot of the traveller, as he overlooks the forest before him, is seen the sea, sometimes in calm placid beauty, at others, heaving and breaking on the sandy beach, at others, the surf roaring, storming and thundering on the shore, stretching away to the north, towards George's Bay, near the entrance of which may be seen Paddy's Island and Rabbit Island, of the shelter of which latter, coasters are only too glad to avail themselves, when either at anchor off Falmouth, or at sea off the coast, they are caught in a heavy gale from the east, that is, on a lee shore.

DISTRICT HIGH SCHOOL

SCHOOL CROSS COUNTRY CHAMPIONSHIPS

164 runners took part in the 1992 St. Marys District High School Cross Country Championships, including 23 "old scholars" from Grade 11-12 and a solitary Staff-Parent runner (well done, Phil Walker!). In fairness, it should be pointed out that all other staff were acting as marshalls, recorders and all that sort of stuff, and anyway it looked like rain.

The rain held off, the afternoon was fine, the course was firm, and there was no wind.

78 girls lined up for the mass start of the Girls championship - Tony Pickett straightened them on the line - "they're off". ! and the first 300 metres around the school oval spread the field nicely before they started over the 3 km course of paddocks, hills and stiles. Negotiating 6 stiles, and fences twice over makes our school course a tougher test than provided by most of the 'car park' courses used in more prestigious events, and any student who completes an event can call themselves a cross-country runner, where ever they finish in the race!

At the end of the first circuit it was Duncan's Esme Atkinson (Girls' Open) who led the field into the school forest for the second time around.

At the end it was still Esme who ran through to win the Girls Individual Championship in 15 mins. 44, chased home by Dalmain's Amy Statham (under 13) in 15.22 and Blackwood's Angela Thompson (Under 13) only seconds behind in 15.29. Good front running by Esme, and a terrific performance by her young opponents. Individually, these three runners achieved times which would have beaten home 70 of the 86 runners in the Boys' Championship. Only two seconds off 3rd place came (4th) Karina Green (Under 15) in 15.31, (5th) Kate Rawnsley (Under 14) in 15.32 and (6th) Corinna Freeman (Under 14) 15.34, in an exciting finish for the minor placings. A steady flood, ebb and trickle of runners followed, until, after some 30 minutes, the whole field had returned. Individual age Champions were Amy Statham (Under 13), Kate Rawnsley (Under 14), Karina Green (Under 15) and Esme Atkinson (Open).

86 boys (one with a beard) set off at a fast pace for 600 metres around the oval, with Duncan's Giles Clement (Under 15) leading the field and onto the course, with Jeremy Youd (Under 15) breathing down his neck, followed further back by Allister Woods (Open), both Blackwood runners. Jeremy's strength took him to the front, and his longer legs gained him metres over his rivals at every fence.

Jeremy, Giles and Allister gradually drew away from the field, but neither the Duncan runner nor his Blackwood teammate could make any impact on Jeremy, who won convincingly in 14 mins 46, followed home by Giles (13.33) and Allister (13.45). A flurry of runners came in for the minor places, with only 3 seconds separating (4th) Gavin Barnes (Dalmain, Open) 14.03, (5th) Andrew Claridge (Dalmain, U15) 14.04, (6th) Andrew Fearman (Dalmain, U14) 14.06. While the older boys generally kept the youngsters more firmly in their places than did the older girls, Scott Mason (Under 13) was no respector of age and finished strongly in 8th place in an excellent 14.13. All the early place-getters faced difficulties with congestion at the fences as they started to lap slow runners on the second time round. After 30 minutes the full field was gathered in, mostly in remarkably good order. Individual age group Champions were Scott Mason (U13), Andrew Fearman (U14), Jeremy Youd (U15) and Allister Woods (Open).

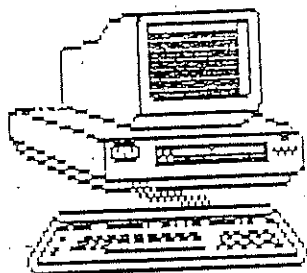

BENEFITS FROM FIGHTBACK

The need for people to be employed and meet household costs is met by the Coalition's Fightback.

There are many examples of specific improvements under Fightback. One example is that for a family travelling about 20 000 km each year, petrol costs will be reduced by nearly \$400 per year or \$11.20 per 60 litre tank. Another is that the Abolition of the Payroll Tax alone will create 176 000 new jobs.

Fightback will simplify the tax system and rationalise accounting practices, bringing benefits to ordinary Australians. Contrary to concerns that have been expressed, there will be only minimal extra accounting required, provided there is regular updating and that there are good accounting practices in place.

The simplicity of GST has been praised by the National Small Business Association and the NSW State Chamber of Commerce and many other organisations. Businesses will receive a \$20 billion benefit with the removal of 7 different taxes and this reduced cost structure will flow on to all Australians.

At the foot of the Pass are the estate of Michael Steel, J.P., (Thompson's Villa and Glencoe). The rich clover marshes of these valuable properties are devoted to pasture and dairy, and in the summer when all around is scorched and arid, these beautiful meadows exhibit a rich and refreshing verdure, studded with cattle enjoying their cool repast in the bright noon day sun.

Falmouth is a poor, lonely spot without a supply of water by river or rill. Here there is an inn, at which accommodation can be obtained for visitors during the summer, when a residence at this salubrious spot is most delightful.

Contiguous to the township is a store, standing near the wharf or jetty, a rude contrivance to enable goods to be shipped to or landed from the small trading vessels that visit the place. But this process is frequently interrupted by the swell of the sea, which renders it dangerous to the boats lying near the wharf, sometimes forbidding communication with the shore, and occasionally, during gales from the eastward, the vessels are, from the absence of any shelter in this open roadstead, compelled to leave and run for the shelter under Rabbit Island.

About 16 miles north from Falmouth is George's Bay, into which flows George's River. The road from Falmouth passes through a very poor heath grown country. After crossing a sandy bar-way at Falmouth, which is sometimes closed at its mouth by sand thrown up during easterly gales, at about 4 miles you reach the reserve township of Yarmouth, on the northern bank of the estuary of the Scamander River, commonly called Anson's Creek, which empties itself into the ocean at this spot.
