
Targa Tasmania will cater for 240 select cars including overseas competitors. Entries are selected from nominations by a panel of Targa Tasmania managers.

SENATE VITAL FOR TASMANIA

The opinion polls are showing a close outcome for the March 13 Election. Indeed no one can tell whether Dr. Hewson or Mr. Keating will be Prime Minister.

While attention is naturally focused on who will win Government there is a grave danger that the importance of Senate representation is being overlooked.

With only 5 seats out of 148 in the House of Representatives, (the House of Government) Tasmania can have little influence on Government especially when New South Wales has 50 seats and Victoria 38

However, in the Senate where each State has equal representation (12 Senators), Tasmania has the potential voting power to transform Tasmania by ensuring fair treatment from Canberra whoever is in Government.

This effective voting power is lost when we elect Party endorsed Senators to represent Tasmania. The Senate (constitutionally the States' House) was designed to protect the smaller States from the powers of central Government which may be exercised unfairly.

A Senator who "belongs" to either Government or Opposition is committed to put the Party first, which means that Tasmania is put second or last.

In the past the division of Tasmanian Senators on political party lines has enabled Canberra to take control of Tasmania through its external powers and unfair distribution of funds.


Federal intervention in domestic affairs now reaches into almost every community activity and includes regulation of mining, forestry, agriculture, fishing, tourism, industrial relations, traditional recreational pursuits and community and family values.

Unless this erosion of the States' rights is halted, Tasmania has no future.

The Tasmania Senate Team is the only Senate group committed to give voice and vote to restore the power of the people through its Senate representation.

Free of Party ties, the Tasmania Senate Team candidates will consult directly with the people, their representative organisations and the State Parliament.

WHAT MAKES A GOOD SCHOOL?

I was heartened to read an article in the Mercury (front page) with the headlines "Marks don't maketh the school". I pinned it up on the whiteboard but few of you probably had the opportunity to read it. I have therefore asked that it appear on the news sheet. The great thing about this article is that the research backs up what many of us have been saying and feeling for many years and the general community is obviously backing us. It is unfortunate that big mouthed politicians and some people who think they are experts get so much airplay on their views. Following the reading of this article I was bouyed up sufficiently to ask my 7/8 group what they thought made a food school. Their results follow the article.

MARKS DON'T MAKETH THE SCHOOL

THE best schools are those which give students a good grounding for adult life rather than top exam results, a national survey says.

Only 19 per cent said good marks made a better school. Sixty-five per cent said good-quality teachers produced the most effective school.

Ethos, or the school climate, was important to 58 per cent while 52 per cent rated school curriculum as the main factor, says the Effective Schools Project.

More than 7000 schools and community groups around the country were surveyed by the Australian Council of Educational Research.

Dr Kevin Piper, one of the authors of the report, said better schools gave each student the skills to deal with adult life.

"Schools are not to be exclusively concerned with cognitive activities," he said.

"They are also to be concerned with personal and social development of students and with the quality of their lives in schools as students."

The survey also revealed little support for a "back to basics" approach.

Less than 1 per cent said large-scale testing or other forms of assessment were important.

The most important characteristic of the curriculum in an effective school was its relevance to the needs and interests of the students, the local community and wider society.

Only 7 per cent rated rigour as an important aspect of school curriculum.

Nine per cent mentioned skills and just 8 per cent rated outcomes.

Dr Piper said the study highlighted the big gap between the views of the policy makers and those of the teachers, parents and the community about the future of schooling.



SPECIAL ELECTION

On Saturday 27 March 1993 a special election is to be held to elect 9 persons from the relevant parts of the Municipality of Portland and the Municipality of Fingal for appointment to the new Break O'Day Council. The relevant parts are the areas of the present Portland and Fingal Municipalities which are to amalgamate to form the new Break O'Day Council. This excludes Musselroe Bay/Poole areas (which are to become part of Dorset Municipality) and Avoca Rossarden and Royal George (which become part of Northern Midlands Municipality).

THE IMPORTANCE OF VOTING IN THIS ELECTION CANNOT BE TOO HIGHLY STRESSED

The Councillors elected are to hold office for a term of three years. There will be no wards or districts in the election:-that is each voter may select from the full field of candidates. The Hare-Clark system of preferential voting will be used. To record your vote under this system you must place the figures "1", "2", "3" and so on against the names of as many candidates as you wish to vote for, in your order of preference, but so that the same number does not appear more than

In order for you to vote, your name must appear on the confirmed Portland-Fingal Electoral Index and your property address, rental address or residential address must fall within the boundaries of the amalgamated Municipality.

A person whose name previously appeared on BOTH the Fingal and the Portland Electoral Indexes and is otherwise eligible will only have ONE VOTE in the Special Election for the amalgamated municipality. The only exception is the case of an elector who is also the deputy for a registered company.

POSTAL VOTES

An application for a postal vote may be made by a voter:

- (a) who has reason to believe that he will not, during the hours of polling on polling day, be within five miles by the nearest practicable route of a polling place at which he may vote in the special election;
- (b) who has reason to believe that he will throughout the hours of polling on polling day be travelling under conditions which will preclude him from voting at any polling place at which he is entitled to vote;
- (c) who is seriously sick or infirm and by reason of his sickness or infirmity will be precluded from attending at any polling place to vote or, in the case of a woman, will by maternity be precluded from attending at any polling place to vote; or
- (d) who by reason of conscientious or religious scruples do not wish to vote in person on polling day.

Applications can be obtained from EITHER the St Helens OR Fingal Council Chambers but must be RETURNED to the COUNCIL CLERK AT FINGAL Council Chambers (who is the Returning Officer for this particular election).



sometimes amazing to see how confidence grows when people see they definitely do have a contribution to make to their community.


