USING

SULLAGE

WATER

ON

THE

LAND

Water is one of our most precious commodities, so in these days of enlightened conservation, conserving our water supplies should be one of our first priorities, and using sullage water on the land is one example of recycling.

Several principles govern the best usage of the water for garden irri-

gation.

Distribute the sullage water to flat garden areas; avoid steep slopes where run-off may be a problem.

Disperse the waste water over a broad area; avoid concentrating it on a single site. Spraying is ideal

on large uncultivated areas.

When available, use fresh water for garden irrigation on a rotating basis with sullage water, to aid in leaching the soil of contaminants.

Sullage water is alkaline. Do not use it on acid loving plants such as rhododendrons, azaleas or citrus fruits. Lawns and deciduous fruit trees may receive sullage water in rotation with fresh water.

If you must use waste water for irrigating food plants, restrict the application to the soil around plants of which only the above ground part is eaten, such as corn, tomatoes or broccoli. Do not apply it to the soil around leafy vegetables or root crops. Best of all, use sullage water for ornamental foliage and use what fresh water is available for your vegetable garden.

Finally, use waste water on well-established plants. Seedlings and houseplants will not tolerate the impurities in household waste water. POSSIBLE PROBLEMS FROM USING SOAPS

AND DETERGENTS

As a general rule, soaps are less harmful than detergents, but sustained use of sullage water containing either one, presents potential problems.

The common problem of soaps and detergents is that they both contain sodium, an element which in excessive

amounts is harmful to soils (destroying soil aggregation) as well as to
plants (inducing tissue burn) The
best strategy is to minimize the use
of cleaning materials, and wherever
possible choose soap rather than
detergent.

Gentle soaps such as soap flakes are preferred to those heavily laden with lanolin, perfumes and other chemicals. Where detergents must be used, select those which do not advertise their softening powers, as softeners are rich in sodium-based

compounds.

If you plan on reusing washing machine water, bleach should be minimised or eliminated, and borax-detergents absolutely avoided. Phosphates in detergents are not as great a problem in soil application as they are in sewage discharge into water bodies. Amonia is acceptable in reasonable amounts.

High levels of sodium may be detected by conducting a ph test of the soil using litmus paper (obtained from a pharmacy or nursery) If the reading exceeds 7.5, the soil has become overloaded with sodium. Correct the problem by spreading gypsum (calcium sulphate) over the soil at a rate of two pounds per 100 square feet per month.

Waste water from the shower, bathtub and washing machine can conceivably contain disease causing
organisms. When the sullage water
is discharged into the soil, however, potentially harmful viruses
and bacteria are quickly destroyed
by the abundant soil organisms better
suited to the soil environment.

If the pathogens were to survive it is unlikely in any case that they would be assimilated by the plant roots. Nevertheless, do not apply sullage water to crops which are eaten uncooked.



INGREDIENTS:


Ten Earth Worms 2 slices of cheese Half an onion 1 tomato 1 bread roll





Over the June long weekend we have had players travelling both to St Helens for the Carnival and to Hobart on the North-West Bay trip.



EXTRACT FROM WALSH'S ALMANAC FINGAL VALLEY 1864

(Part 8)

On one occasion both machines were worked for a certain time to test their respective merits; an equal quantity of quartz (taken from one common heap) being crushed by each; the total produce was somewhat more than twenty ounces of gold, of which the mill produced more than fourteen ounces, and the stampers less than six - showing to almost a certainity that the failure was due to the different modes of operation by the two The auriferous character machines. of the quartz at this place cannot be said, with propriety and consistency, to have been positively tested as yet, so small has been the quantity operated upon.

One might as well presume to infer the contents of the ocean from an analysis of the produce of so many tons of sea water. Gold is found Gold is found dispersed almost everywhere in the soil of this locality, but, up to the present time, in such small quantities as not to pay for the labour of extraction. In the quartz, specks of gold are to be seen in plenty, and yet the extraction, by analysis from the crushed quartz, has not been rich, though remunerative; while im some instances in Victoria, quartz not exhibiting, to even microscopic observation, any visible indications of the precious metal is said to yield a rich return.

The total value of the gold obtained by the Midland quartz crushing and gold mining company was 1500 pounds and the quantity raised by diggers from July 1857 to the present time (1864) may be safely estimated at from 750ozs to 800ozs., or about 3000 pounds in value.

The average numbers of persons at work during this period has not exceeded from 16 to 20, and the area on which they have laboured is confined to the immediate vicinity of Mangana. DEAR SIR,

LOWER INCOME EARNERS WILL NOT BE DISADVANTAGED BY FIGHTBACK! Lower income to middle income earners will not be disadvantaged by the GST under the co-

alition's Fightback package.

* The cost of living will
not increase by 15%
