SOUTH ESK CATCHMENT PILOT STUDY

Recently a number of landowners in the Valley would have received a brief questionnaire on vegetation management on their properties. The questionnaire was put together by the Private Forestry Division of the Forestry Commission. The Division has been contacted by Greening Australia (Tas.) to undertake a Vegetation Management Pilot Study; and the study takes in that area of the South Esk Catchment from the headwaters of the South Esk River to its confluence with the Nile River.

Given the size of the study area, some 2,500 square kilometres, a diverse range of land management regimes are covered. These include agriculture, forestry, mining, community groups and public authorities.

The study is seen as stage one of a strategy toward a national approach to catchment management in relation to perennial vegetation. Similar pilot studies are being carried out in all states and territories.

The Private Forestry Division will be using a geographical information system to establish a base map of the catchment and then adding overlays for vegetation types, land tenure, slope, altitude and others to create a current 'state of the catchment' report.

HEALTH SERVICES DEVELOPMENT IN THE FINGAL VALLEY

A Community Consultation into the needs for Health Services in the Fingal Valley is currently underway.

Coordinated by two project officers, Rodger Ambrose and Philip Morris, who are employed by the Northern Regional Health Board, the consultation over the next couple of months is aimed at gathering information on the Community's health needs and matching these with services that are being provided at present. Gaps in services will be highlighted and improvements recommended to the board.

An initial report has just been released to a reference group of 20 community members who have been invited to advise on the progress of the project.

The report notes the concerns expressed by a wide range of people about any closure of St. Marys Hospital. However information in the report concerning aged care indicates that there is a continued role for the Hospital campus in the future.

In addition to information about population characteristics, the report notes where and why Fingal Valley residents use hospital and aged care services. Issues involved in the transfer of patients and access to emergency services are also documented.

It is hoped that the information will provide for effective long term provision of hospital and community health services. Copies of the report are available from St. Marys Hospital.

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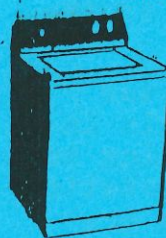
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WHAT'S ON

The teacher who performs his labour faithfully and without fault for five years be given an increase of two shillings and sixpence per week in his pay providing the Board of Education approved.

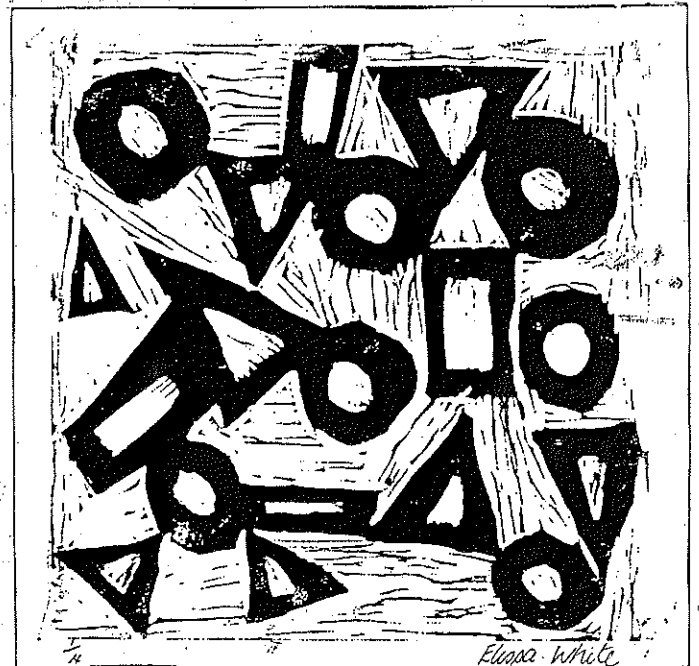

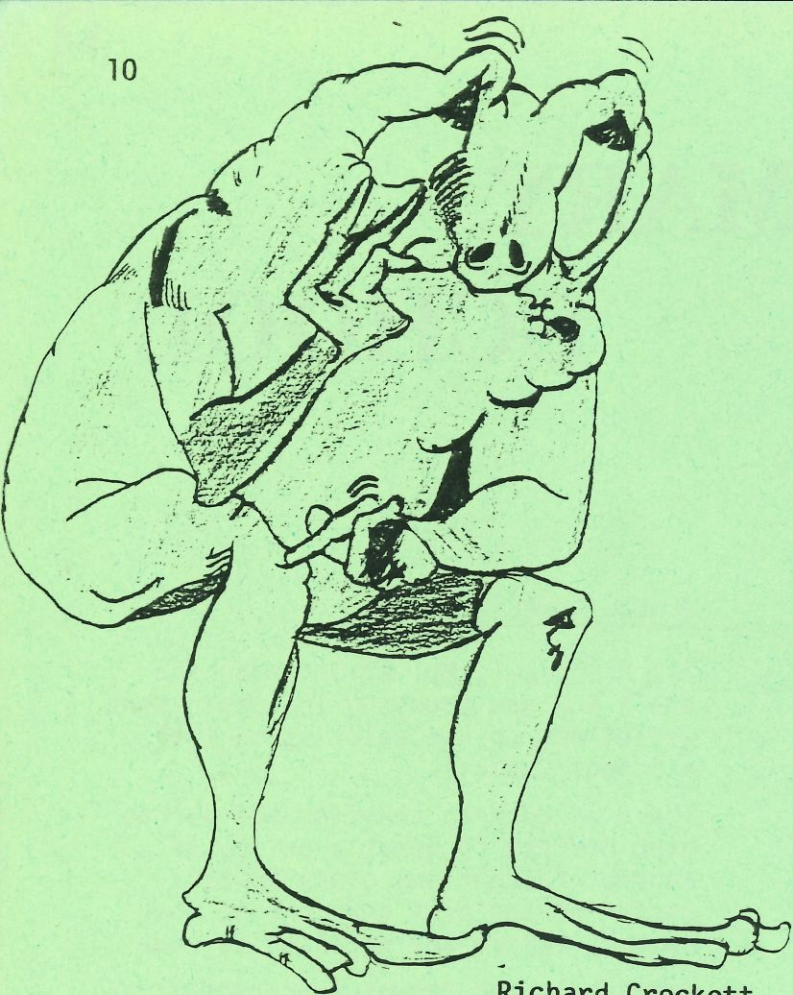
An intensive 3 days of music study which will benefit them enormously.

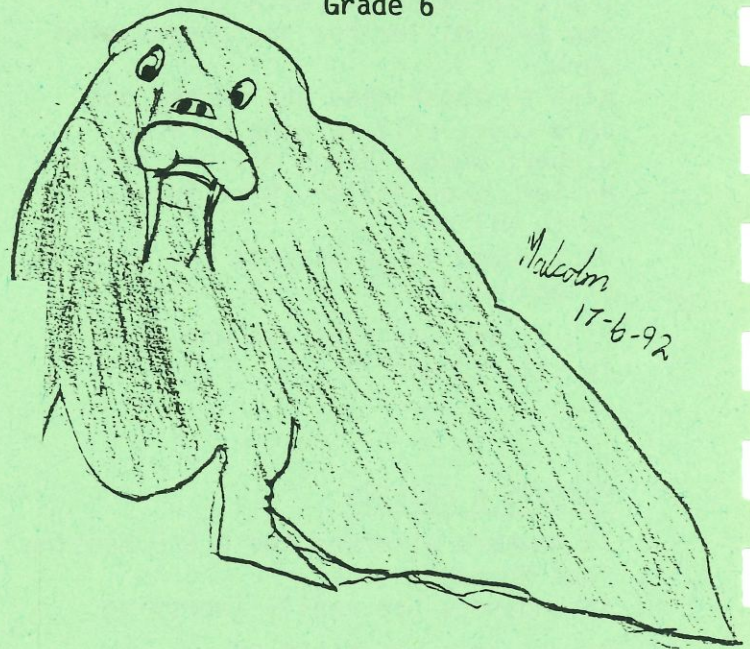

EXTRACT FROM WALSH'S ALMANAC

FINGAL VALLEY

Leaving the bridge at Fingal and bearing to the right, the road leads through part of the Malahide estate called the Black Boy Plains, to Evercreech and Fonthill, situated on the right bank of the South Esk River - between these Townships a tributary of the Esk empties itself into the river from the North; in one of its branches at about 4 or 5 miles from the confluence, the beautiful and romantic "Deverill Falls"-have recently been discovered by Mr. George Deverill of Malahide. The Fall is not very difficult of access, its beauty amply compensating for the amount of exertion necessary to reach it.

After pushing through the scrub and under wood on the steep side of the ravine in which it runs its course, the Fall bursts into view, tumbling headlong from the precipice above, 250 feet perpendicular, into a basin of rocks below, from which it emerges at once to take another headlong leap of nearly 100 feet, when rushing rapidly over a cataract of boulders, it falls again 150 feet into a rugged chasm and hurries along the channel to the river. The name of its discoverer "Deverill" is worthy of the Fall.

Son of the late Colonel Deverill, who commanded the 90th regiment before Sebastopol, where he was severely wounded during a sortie of the Russians on the trenches, and his son, the present Captain Deverill, then a youth, and a subaltern in his father's regiment was also severely wounded during the attack and capture of the celebrated Redan, having been one of the first, at the head of his gallant soldiers, to scale the works in that desperate conflict.

Near the boundary of the township of Fonthill is the Black Boy gold-field, where some parties have been occasionally at work; gold is everywhere to be found in the hollows and watercourses, but not yet in a sufficient quantity to repay the labour of extraction. Here also is situated the quartz vein, on which the works of the Launceston Quartz Crushing Company were conducted by Mr Charles Nevins.

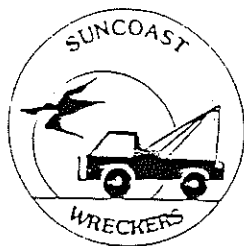

Dear Sir

PAY TV AND PORNOGRAPHY

The rules and regulations of what can be screened on the forthcoming Pay TV is soon to be decided by the Government.

As a result of my concern and contact with various constituents throughout Tasmania in the last month, I have tabled several petitions in the Senate on this topic.

Firstly, several hundred Tasmanians have so far urged the Minister for Communications to institute suitable safeguards into the legislation concerning Pay TV so that as a minimum the program standards that currently exist in relation to ordinary on-air transmissions should also apply to Pay TV.

Secondly, the Minister for Communications has also been urged to be aware that there should be some restrictions to the programs shown on Pay TV in the interests of community standards, the safety of people and in particular the protection of children.

Further copies of this petition may be obtained from my office.

It is my personal view, and it is Coalition policy, that X rated videos should be banned with no exceptions being made for Pay TV.

The St Marys - St Helens Country Education Committee invites submissions from any interested individuals or organisations for Country Areas Program funding in 1993.

The Country Areas Program is funded by the Commonwealth Government through the Department of Employment, Education and Training. The Program has been operating for the past thirteen years, supporting programs in both government and non government schools throughout Australia.

The Country Areas Program is designed to assist children in the Primary, Secondary and Senior age categories. The program aims to improve the educational participation and achievement of students disadvantaged by restricted access to social, cultural and educational activities and services as a result of geographical isolation. The program also provides a framework whereby schools and isolated communities can work co-operatively to improve the educational opportunities available to country children. The Country Areas Program encourages a high community participation and attempts to capitalise on the strengths of country communities.

The basic objectives of the Program are to find ways of overcoming isolation through sharing resources, broadening students' understanding of occupational horizons, building students' self esteem, making imaginative use of the expertise of local people, providing opportunities for teachers to interact with parents and their community.

It is important that the person responsible for the running of a program (Project Manager) is named in the project description section of the submission.

Submissions expenditure is to be itemised fully on a separate page if necessary.

Income tax and Social Security payments

Detailed information about a person's taxation position should be obtained from the Australian Taxation Office.

Taxable payments

All pensions, allowances and benefits are taxable except those listed below.

Only the 'basic' rate of a payment is taxable. Any additional payments, such as rent allowance or dependent add-on, are not taxable.

Family payments are not taxable.

If a person has income other than a pension, allowance or benefit then their total income may exceed the tax threshold, and so they would become liable to pay tax. Social Security can arrange for tax instalments to be deducted from the fortnightly payments.

The Australian Taxation Office can advise how much tax should be deducted.

Non taxable payments

- Disability support pension (except if the pensioner is over 65 male / 60 female);
- Wife pension (if the wife is less than 60 years and husband less than 65);
- Carer pension (if paid to a male less than 65 or a female less than 60 when caring for a male less than 65 or a female less than 60);
- Rehabilitation allowance;
- Sheltered employment allowance;
- Mobility allowance;
- Bereavement allowance; and
- Remote area allowance. The amount of the allowance is deducted from any zone income tax rebate otherwise available to the person.

Statement of earnings and group certificates

At the end of the financial year Social Security issues a group certificate to people who have had tax instalments deducted from their pension, allowance or benefit.

A statement of pension, allowance or benefit for the financial year is issued to all other clients.

Tax file numbers (data-matching)

Data-matching means that Social Security is requesting people claiming or receiving a payment from Social Security to provide a tax file number (and the tax file number of their partner, where applicable); and checking the information people give the department with information already held by the Australian Taxation Office and some other departments which pay benefits.

Those who are exempt from providing their tax file number include people who are: in a nursing home or psychiatric hospital; profoundly disabled; living in a remote area; or overseas.

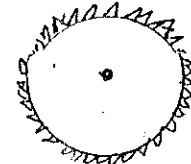
