CATHOLIC WOMEN'S LEAGUE CONFERENCE

The 49th Tasmanian Conference was held at the beautiful Cray Drop Inn, situated on the East Coast just south of Four Mile Creek.

This is the first time that such a conference has been held outside of a large city area and many of the delegates commented on the beauty of the locality.

Mrs K Pearce, State President, introduced the Archbishop of Hobart, The Most Rev Eric D'arcy who opened the conference. Among the many guests were: Mr Llewellyn MHA, Mr Rattray MLC and Mr & Mrs Legge, Warden of Break O Day Municipality.

Mr Legge addressed the Conference and welcomed all to the venue and the Municipality and gave praise to Marjorie and Barry Aulich mine host for the tremendous work they had done in making the conference a success.

The Conference also incorporated the State Handcraft Exhibition which was opened by Carole Furlow, local weaver, who commented on the high standard of work presented.

The Sir J Young award was won by Mrs Joy Lipscombe of Kingborough and was accepted by Mrs Pat Quinn, President of Kingborough.

There were 260 entries for the exhibition and approximately 120 people attended the Conference, which was concluded on Wednesday 8 September.

DON'T SHARE MEDICINES

Medicines are one of the few things in life you should not share with others. To do so can be dangerous.

Just because people have similar symptoms, eg high temperature, nausea, headache, etc., it does not mean they have the same illness. Your medication might not only not cure another person's illness it could well produce a toxic response.

There's another reason why you should not share your medicine. In most cases you will need it yourself. With most illnesses today, medical practitioners prescribe a course of treatment with the active drug content carefully calculated to kill the infection. Because of this, it is important to take the full course of treatment. If you begin to feel better do not decide you do not need to take your medication any longer.

This can create a serious problem because not enough medicine has been taken to kill the offending organism, but enough has been taken to allow the germ to build up some immunity.

This means that should the problem recur at a later time, this germ may have become resistant to further treatment with that particular drug.

Taking the full course eliminates another possible problem - taking old out of date drugs.

Many drugs decompose over time making them either ineffective or in some cases, dangerous.

The safest course is to immediately dispose of any unused prescription medicines by flushing them down the toilet.

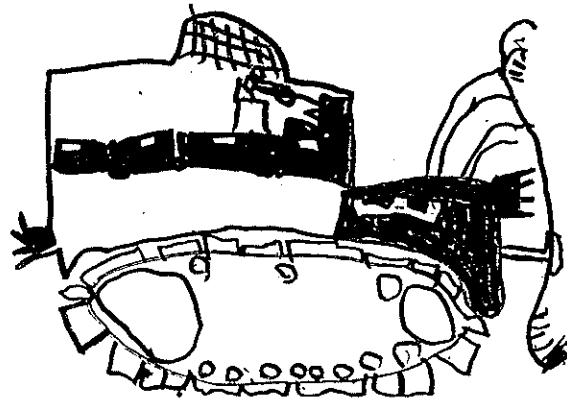
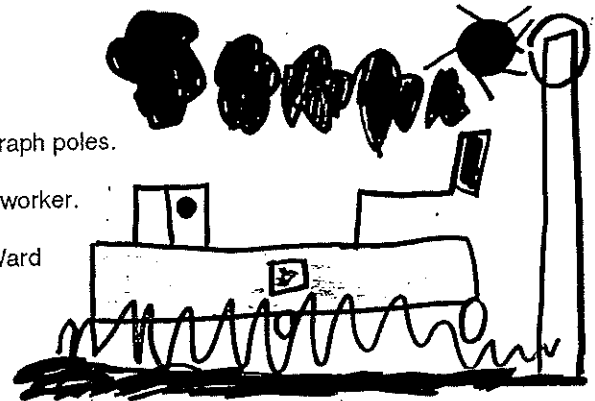

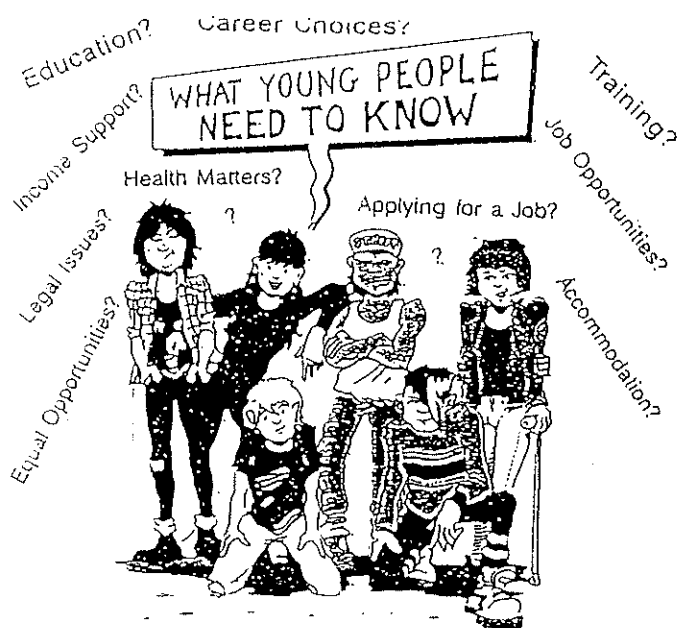

Frozen Food

Freezing food was one of man's first, and probably accidental, discoveries for long time preservation.

Food held at minus 18 degrees Celsius loses practically nothing of its quality. In fact, it can last for years.

Recommended times for storage given here tend to be conservative because the temperatures of home freezers can vary. Commercially frozen food is processed and packed at its peak and home freezing should also be used only when goods are of top quality, particularly meat.

Eliminate air when wrapping meat, pack small quantities and label clearly. Discard styrofoam trays. Packaged sliced bread freezes well and does not lose its nutritional value for up to six months.

Six Months: Beef, veal, lamb, turkey, chicken, fried potatoes, fruit, green vegetables.

Three Months: Fish, shellfish, pork, baked fruit pies, cakes.

Two Months: Ham, bacon smoked and unsmoked, ice cream.

FINGAL COUNCIL NOTES

The Council was represented at the last meeting which dealt with Flood Protection; present at this meeting were representatives from the Meteorological Bureau and the Hydro - Electric Commission, who said that a great percentage of run-off was from the Toombs Lake and Elizabeth River catchment area. Most councillors disagreed with this and pointed out that there was no census taken in the Fingal Valley above Avoca. Vandalism to ornamental trees lining the Main Road through Fingal was reported by Cr. Haas. Council was to request the Police Department to investigate this offence and it was also suggested that Mr. Robertson, the schoolmaster, be asked to help by instructing the children on care of young trees.

The Superintendent of Works has suggested a new scheme for allocation of grading on country roads. He had in mind a five year plan whereby all the roads would be properly re-surfaced in that time instead of just receiving basic maintenance. The proposition is to be brought up for consideration at the next Council meeting.

A new carpenter is to be appointed to Council works. There were two applications for the position, one of which is being considered.

FEPPER HILL. It is hoped that sealing will come under this year's allocation of work, meanwhile, Council will be carrying out any maintenance that needs immediate attention. There was a letter from Mr. McShane of Royal George complaining of the danger of the corner at Red Rock Bridge. He said that if Council would not erect an appropriate sign there, he would do so himself. It was moved that a sign be erected.

Still on the subject of signs, Council have asked for an estimate of the cost of street signs; the prices have arrived but no samples have yet been seen. The signs are similar to those in the Perth and Longford districts. It is intended to purchase them eventually.

Mr. McCarthy, the Health Inspector, reported poison had been laid at the Avoca Tip because of infestation of rats. There had also been a report that rats were seen at the Scamander Tip, but on inspection it was not considered necessary to lay poison.

The plans submitted by St. Marys Bakery for improvements to the present premises were considered inadequate by the Department of Health. The requirements are of a very high standard. Council moved that the proprietor be given thirty days to submit a satisfactory plan.

Notices are to be posted at Rossarden and Storeys Creek that any persons seen dumping rubbish other than at the tip, will be prosecuted. The press was asked to emphasise that this applies throughout the municipality, as the wayward dumping of rubbish is becoming an increasing eyesore throughout the countryside.

Plans were submitted for extensions to Tatlows Hotel, Fingal.... these plans received Council's approval.
