TOURISM - ST MARYS

At a public meeting held at the school on Tuesday night, it was agreed that St Marys has a future in Tourism and we as a community should be encouraging this.

It is realised that we must capitalise on what we already have in the area, so a group has been formed to further develop our natural attractions such as Paddys Head, South Sister and the Douglas Apsley.

Another group is very keen to have the town promote another annual event. This would be held during a busy time on the coast, enabling us to capitalise on the visitors already in the area.

Fundraising will be a major task. Our group is combining with the school to stage a community concert on the 12 November at the Town Hall. Mark this on your calendar **now**, as this should prove to be a very popular event if past school performances are anything to go on.

The coming together of the School Drama classes and our committee is the type of community spirit that we are attempting to develop. Hopefully other organisations will follow suit.

It has been recognised that our most obvious problem in attracting visitors to our town, is the lack of attractions in our main street.

The Steering Committee has come up with a plan that they feel would turn this problem around. They intend to create an **Historic** outdoor display, using old farming machinery. By placing these renovated pieces in landscaped gardens throughout our town, we see an inviting informative walk becoming a major attraction.

We do not intend to create a grave yard of rusty relics, this is to be done properly, with informative labelling combined with history about the machinery as well as history regarding the property from where it came.

We feel that combining both history as well as gardens, St Marys will become a place to **GO TO**, not a place to **GO THROUGH**.

All of the people in attendance came forward and offered their assistance in one way or another. This is what must happen if we as a community are seriously concerned about where our District is heading.

The Steering Committee has already obtained land in the Main Street and have farm machinery available to them. We have an organisation ready to assist with moving equipment and we have an area available for a work shop. What we now need is you, and you and you.

The Steering Committee realise that people have a great aversion to becoming involved in formal organisations so we are trying to arrange things so the workers in this exercise are not tied down to meetings, decision making etc.

Unfortunately, we do have to become incorporated and we must have a constitution. If we do not do this we cannot obtain funding through Government grants.

We feel that there are people in our community who would have the expertise in this area. Please if you feel about St Marys in the way that we do, give some thought in becoming involved in our Executive Committee so that the doers can start doing.

CORNWALL COAL

In 1879 Mr George Crisp of "Lewis-Hill" near Avoca was hunting on the Mt Nicholas Range when, so the story goes, his dog chased a wombat into a burrow. The dog scratched very vigorously and produced not soil, but black gravel, (coal). This mundane event became the forerunner to the foundation, in 1886, of the Cornwall Coal Co. and the birth of the town of Cornwall.

Initially coal was recovered by hand, in the flickering light of "tallow" lamps. It was loaded into skips, made of wood, and drawn to the minehead by pit ponies.

The original Cornwall shaft closed 10th April 1964, and was replaced by modern collieries, one at Fingal and the other at Mt Nicholas.

On Sunday 4th Sept. 1927, the foundation stone of the St Marys children's and maternity hospital was laid by Mr R W Legge in the presence of a large crowd of people. Prior to the ceremony the St Marys Brass Band, under the conductorship of Mr J Madden, rendered selections. They also played hymns during the ceremony. Mr C R Jackson, assistant secretary read the financial statement, showing £880-6-6d (Eight hundred pounds, six shillings and six-pence) had been received in donations, some 300 people had contributed this amount, varying from two shillings to £100.

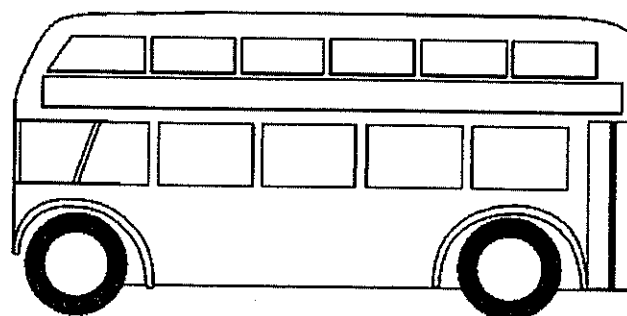

FINGAL COUNCIL

NOTES

At the September meeting of the Fingal Council, the Works Superintendent, Mr T. Yates reported, that the road gang had repaired culverts on the Germantown Dublin, Irishtown and Falmouth roads. He said the new utility, which has only done 300 miles,, was having trouble with crown wheel pinion, Council decided to send the utility back to the dealers until the necessary repairs were made and to ask for a substitute vehicle if necessary. The Warden, Cr A McKenzie reported the Commonwealth Aid for Roads Grant would be \$13,228 this year, which is an increase of 4% over last year. 35% would be spent on St. Pauls Ward, 15% on Tower Ward, 25% on St. Marys and 25% on Tower Hill. Cr. Johnston said the allocation should be delayed until Council had evaluated traffic density and rural mileage. It was decided to have the necessary information for the next meeting.

Rossarden: The Minister of Lands and Works advised that the sealing of Pepper Hill would take place as soon as practical. The Minister said he hoped to visit the area shortly.

Avoca: The Health Inspector, Mr H McCarthy, reported notice has been served on several people in the area to destroy cotton thistle. He hoped to make a house to house survey shortly and spraying would be arranged for October.

Scamander: Some discussion took place as to the grading and gravelling of a road for subdivision on the property of Mr. Wigram. Cr. Foot moved, seconded Cr. Hinds, that Council should only do this job on a 'do and charge' basis. The Council Clerk said a more detailed estimate would be prepared once it was decided to go ahead with the work.

Falmouth: The Health Inspector said that approval had been granted for the erection of a tip at Falmouth, subject to the usual regulations. It was agreed unanimously to go ahead with the project, if the owner of the land was agreeable.

Cornwall: The Superintendent reported the new pipes for Cornwall Water Supply were here and he was only awaiting orders from Council to proceed with the work. Cr. Davy moved, seconded Cr. Hinds moved that the reservoir be fenced immediately that the stock were polluting the water.

St Marys: Both Cr. Davis and Cr. Hinds were concerned at the lack of water to Mr. Neil Freeman's property on the Pass Road. The Superintendent said the pipes had been blown out but the result was still unsatisfactory. It was agreed to run a temporary line of polythene pipe from the old reservoir and see if the water supply improved.

Plans for the St. Marys Bakehouse were submitted, but Council were still awaiting specification for final approval. Once again, the controversial St. Marys Football Club Rooms came up for discussion. It was moved by Cr. Freeman that the two areas be inspected by the municipal engineer and a report on his findings be presented at the next meeting.

Fingal: Cr. Johnson said the public toilets at the Fingal Recreation Ground were a disgrace to Council and should have been repaired long before the close of the Football season. The Works Superintendent said that owing to Council having no carpenter on their staff, buildings of this nature, were of necessity, repaired but temporarily. It was hoped with the appointment of a carpenter, this matter could be rectified for the next Football season.
