# WHO WERE THEY?

The Syrian, The Chinaman and the lady who made clothes pegs. What did all these people have in common in relation to St Marys? The answer is that these people all traded their goods and wares in and around this township over seventy years ago.

Where did they come from, where did they go? Like so many stories and characters they have been almost lost in the mist of time, with nothing written down or recorded and only the fading memories of some of our older citizens to keep them alive.

But perhaps you can help! Documents, receipts, letters and photographs, anything that can piece together our history before it's lost forever.

Let us start with the Syrian. A tall man, presumably swarthy, his name was something like George La Toughe but perhaps that was not his real name. He carried a large bundle on his back comprising of material and clothes. He also carried a small suitcase full of jewellery and knick-knacks.

This remarkable man had no transport other than his feet and he walked from town to town till all his wares were sold. The Arabic peddler lived in Hunter St, Launceston but it's not known if he walked home or he caught a train or coach. I do know that he received accommodation in the various towns that he visited. It is also known that he had a daughter who was blessed with a beautiful singing voice and sang at parties and theatres in Launceston.

Why and when he stopped selling I do not know, maybe he bought a shop in Launceston or maybe he went back to his homeland, or maybe he just got too old to walk the long roads.

Of the Chinaman I know even less. He was around about the same time as the Syrian and must have had a market garden somewhere in the district and traded in fresh vegetables which he sold off his horse and cart.

He must have caused some amusement among his customers with his cry of "Turn-i-ups and lettuce-seas" but he also traded in rabbit skins and from all accounts he must have made a reasonable living.

But where was his market garden, and did he have a large family or did he live alone? Was he related to the early Chinese gold and tin miners that came out to this country so long ago.

Mrs Brown, the lady who made and sold clothes pegs. This incredible woman must have been a real battler. She lived somewhere in the Midlands, possibly near Campbell Town and travelled along the river banks working her way up the Fingal Valley. The reason she followed the river was because of the willow trees which grew on the banks and provided her with the wood from which she made the pegs.

Her method was simple but effective, she would cut the willow sticks to the required size and then bind one end with a strip of tin secured with a tack. She would then split the stick down to the tin and then whittle the wood till she had the required shape. Once she had a bag full of pegs she would then sell them at the towns along the way.

Mrs Brown had a horse and cart and camped in a tent near the river. One of the places she camped was Margison Creek near the Irish Town turnoff and another place was on Mr Garth Napier's property, not far from Cameron St. Her only companion was her very young daughter who's name I believe to be Betty. - CONT P 9



It was remarked that her pegs were very good as they would not come off the line, not even in the strongest wind.

What happened to that lady or her daughter, does anyone know?

In 1930 a fire at the Fingal Council Chambers destroyed almost all the council records which made the writing of the history of St Marys very difficult. It's like putting together a jigsaw puzzle with more than half the pieces missing. We cannot afford to employ a historian as that would prove to be very expensive so we rely on the general public.

Any official records of the early days of this district are held in Hobart or Launceston and to try to sift through masses of documents is incredibly time consuming and costly, so can you help us?

### **Early Days In Our District**

# School Life - As told by my aunties aged 57 and 59.

Our life at St Helens was made up of many interesting events, as being born in 1932 and 1934 we experienced many things like-

We can remember the war years 1939-1945. This was an era when the family went to St Helens State School (as it was called back then).

The trenches were dug where the High School now stands. The siren blew - the children had to run into the trenches wearing ear muffs, when we had air raid shelter practice.

The children travelled by foot and some from Parkside by horse back, as there were no buses and there were school at Pyengana, Priory, Goulds Country, Lottah and Scamander. It was not until 1948 that children travelled from Scamander to St Marys.

In the old days at St Helens State School there were no biro's. Slates were used by infants for writing, later the ink wells were introduced when students used pens and ink. A monitor filled the ink wells every week, it sometimes spilt everywhere leaving a stain on the wooden desks. This was removed by consistent rubbing with sand paper and a lot of elbow grease.

Open fires were lit in the class rooms and these were washed using white wash( made out of clay) and the boys were delegated to do this job.

Teeth, fingers nails and hands were checked for cleanliness and shoes for the best shine. Hair was still checked for nits. When it came to school inspection every pupil and teacher helped spring clean the class room.

It was an annual event in all Tasmanian Schools for reports to be written for every class from 1-6.

A ritual in every school at the beginning of the week was the raising of the flag and saying the pledge

"I love my country,
I honour the flag,
And will cheerfully,
Obey her laws"

This was then followed by the National Anthem-God save the Queen.

### **Early Days In Our District**

### **BACK IN 1920**

In early January 1918, Miss Valerie Thomas, one of eleven in her family of St Marys, was going to St Marys State School for the first time at the age of seven. The classes were, the baby class, lower prep, upper prep then Ist, 2nd, 3rd, 4th, 5th, 6th classes. The classes worked by depending on how smart each individual was. This school was where the St Marys Hall is now.

School as Valerie said was very strict, each morning they had to line up, girls together and boys together and they would be inspected by the principle Mr Barker. If your finger nails, shoes and hands were unclean you would get a nasty hit across the legs with the cane. After inspection a school band would play and every pupil would have to march. This went on every school day. But Valerie said it was a very good school.

Every morning Valerie had to walk to school one mile in thick frost. She would go home and back to school for dinner all in one hour. At the end on the school day Valerie had to walk back home once again.

Valerie left school after seven years. She was taught by a very good teacher named Mr A O Barker.

In Valerie's spare time she had to work very hard like pump water by hand up to the house from the creek which ran behind their house, and she had to collect wood, bark and sticks for the fire from the bush.

Valerie had her first job at the age of 14 years, it was waiting tables at Falmouth Boarding House, she got payed 10 shilling (bob) which was a good lot of money in those days. After that she worked at Scamander Hotel waitressing. Then Valerie decided to try her luck in Launceston. She didn't last long because she didn't like the crowds or the noise. She said she likes the open spaces.

Then coming back to the valley she worked at the Avoca Hotel. After a year at serving tables Valerie then went to Fingal to live. That's where she met Mervyn Bean, after going out with each other for a year. They then decided to get married in the Presbyterian Church of Fingal in 1932. Mr and Mrs Bean had a family of nine children, 25 grandchildren, 24 great grandchildren and one great, great grandchildren.

### **Early Days In Our District**

### Fingal Mine Blast, 1977

February 7th 1977 was a morning when many miners and their families wished that they'd never got out of bed to go to work.

The location was the Duncan colliery situated at Fingal, where three miners were killed, and two were very badly burnt and scarred.

At around 8:40 on the tragic Monday morning, a build up of methane gas was some how disturbed and erupted into a huge ball of fire instantly killing one miner and injuring his other four workmates who were all placed in intensive care in the Launceston General Hospital.

Later on in the same week another of the miners lives were taken and yet another around a month later, but the recovery of the only two remaining miners was very slowly, but surely nearing.

The question on the lips of the whole Fingal Valley during this fatal time, was 'what was the cause of this disasterous incident?' Many possibilities were explored but none of them were to be concluded. It may have been caused by rock to rock friction, an electrical fault, or a naked flame. Either one of these situations had started from methane gas built up above the ceiling of the mine to start a leak seeping through the cracks in the roof.

The deaths of three unlucky miners still may torture the minds of their friends and family. If only we could turn the clocks back and start all over again.



# EARLY DAYS IN OUR DISTRICT

### 1929 Flood

It all happened in the year of 1929 in the small, ancient town of Fingal. 64 years ago the South Esk river rose seven metres. It reached the main street called Talbot Street. As it washed down the main street of Fingal, it washed everyones big vegetable gardens out, and when it finally reached the rail way station at the other end of town, it clean swept it away, and all the tons of wood that they had at the station to run the steam trains was washed away.

One of the houses just below Talbot Street, owned now by Mr Wayne Miller, was flooded, the water reached the spouting of the house.

Seen as the flood washed the bridge away at Fingal, they had to use a punt, it would carry anything from bicycles to horse and cart, the punt was wound across by a winch. The winch was worked by a man named Mr Kelly.

There was a hay stack just down the road on a farm approximately 10 minutes from Fingal called Rosstrevor, was washed for miles towards Avoca way, and when it finally came to a place to settle, it was still in the shape, it was still in the shape it was when it was picked up at Rosstrevor. The farm is now owned by Mr Scott Marshall, but in 1929 it was owned by Mr Davies.

The water eventually reached Avoca, it washed away their railway station (the only thing left standing was the solid built safe) and where the Esk River and St Pauls River meet, there is a bridge, this also washed away.

At Avoca there is a railway bridge that the water damaged, when the flood had past, this bridge was left on a very steep slope and was very dangerous to cross.

### EARLY DAY IN OUR DISTRICT

In years gone by St.Marys had more businessess and Community services than today, such as 2 hotels, 2 butchers, cheese factory, swimming pool, bookmakers, 3 coal mines, 2 General Stores, Banks, Post Offices, dance hall and a picture theatre.

One of the hotels was situated opposite Casboults Takeaway where the new units are (there was also a dance hall there) and the other was where it is today.

There was even a swimming pool in St.Marys back then, it was near the creek at the park below the two garages.

There were two general stores, one at Brown's Garage and the other at Stan Graham's Electric Shop.

There was a bank at Newman's Takeaway and across the road from that was a Post Office.

There was a Butcher's and Bookmakers on the corner of Main and Storey Street, but that burnt down and the Bookmaker's was moved to next door to where the Newsagency is today. There was also another Butchers, where it still is today. There used to be a picture theatre in Todds Hall and a school in the Community Hall.

There was a cheese factory opposite the Hospital..

There was three coal mines in St.Marys, Mt Nicholas, Jubilee and Dalmain. At the Old Jubilee Mine there was a rope that carried buckets of coal to where the B.P. Depot is.

Cornwall coal mine, when at it's peak, was the largest coal mine in Tasmania.

St.Marys was known for it's coal mines, timber and farming.
