WOW, WHAT AN EXPERIENCE

The alarm went off at 6 am and a peep outside showed thick fog down the Valley. A quick shower, my usual breakfast of toast and coffee, then a quick check of my small carrybag - yes, towel, change of shoes and clothes, that's all I should need.


Daylight was struggling to get through the fog but it was time to leave as I had an exciting appointment at 8.20 am and had quite a long way to go. Due to the foggy morning, poor visibility made the driver concentrate on the road and it did not improve till well down the Valley. An early bird policeman was out with his radar gun booking a motorist for speeding, I guess, on the section of road being reconstructed past Avoca - and this was only about 7 am.

At last I've arrived at my destination the First Basin (The Gorge) Launceston. The day is still early, cool and crisp with very few people about. Parked the car where we're told to but the four hour ticket machine not working. Did not want to spoil the day by getting booked so left a note for the "Ticketman". Eight twenty a small bus towing a bright blue raft arrives. This is what I had got up so early and travelled so far for - to go white water rafting down the South Esk river between the Trevallyn First Dam and the Basin. Introductions all round, Noni (our hostess) Dave and John, the experienced rafters who have come up with the great idea of whitewater rafting in the heart of Launceston. The rest of the crew were four novices who like myself had never rafted and were not sure what to expect except the excitement of the unknown.

The little bus took us up to the base of the dam. After signing forms about consent etc., we were given wetsuits, lifejackets (bright pink) and helmets to put on. Luckily there were no mirrors or cameras about but I guess we all looked much the same and were surprised how comfortable the gear felt. Dave stressed the importance of tying our shoelaces and everything else very securely - he did not want us floating out of them if we fell overboard.

Our bright blue raft was winched down the steep bank of the river and the rest of us clambered down to join it. surprise was that we're to sit ON the edge of the raft not IN it, also the water was amazingly warm. We were all issued with a paddle and were given a crash course on "raft driving" instructions, the most important being the SURVIVAL FLOAT for if or when falling into the water. 'GO RIGHT', 'GO LEFT', 'RIGHT FORWARD', 'LEFT BACK', 'ON THE JOB' and 'GET DOWN'! These were the directions we were to respond to and when to dive for cover in the centre of the raft to survive the BIG rapids.

Drifting on the first smooth tranquil section of river, with the sun just starting to warm the day, there was little indication of the turmoil we would be thrown into as we passed through the twenty rapids before our $2\frac{1}{2} - 3$ hour trip was over



impossible to describe the It's exhilaration and the unbelievable feeling that "is it really you?" as you hurtle almost end to end down foaming rapids between the boulders. Despite your desperate efforts to paddle and lead the rafters shouted commands, it is virtually the power of the water that wins out. Even though being tossed through the rapids, with torrents of water pouring over you at times, we came out of each rapid with huge smiles and much laughter and the eager anticipation of the next big one.

We were by this time getting to know each other and were working as a team (I think) and so far no one had fallen out which was really surprising. On two occasions we came to sections of the river where it was too dangerous to raft through so we took to the rocks on foot, then back into the raft on the other side. The river looked so grand in the early morning with its steeply rising banks on either side, just us on the water and no sign of the hustle and bustle of city life just minutes away.

A little bit of drama came about when our bowline (rope) fell into the raging water and trailed behind to become wedged between the rocks. This meant that the flow of the water was carrying us forward but the caught rope was holding us back, as a result we were going nowhere but down - filling with water and sinking. The quick action of Dave and John averted what may have been a very "interesting" situation. They cut the rope to free the raft and because of the holes in the bottom, the raft soon emptied itself and we were on our way again. Yes, there really are holes down both sides of the floor of the raft but because these are lower than the inflated sections it work out OK. know this is not how the experts would explain it but it's something like that!!





A Kote to Rarents of Grade 1

Parents of Grade One children should note that a sample of students in that grade will be doing a special, small assessment task in writing next week. The children will be assessed individually and, in order to avoid having to take teachers away from their classrooms to perform the assessments, the school guidance officer will conduct them. Parents are assured that these assessments are in no way connected with the moreformal kinds of testing which Guidance officers may occasionally need to perform. Such testing is only done in consultation with and with the permission of parents. The special writing assessments to be made

They are being done to collect information about the general levels of proficiency in literacy skills of Grade One children, so that the success of a new Government program to boost the reading and writing skills of young children can be evaluated.

Principal's Report

As many of you are aware we last week had a number of students, eleven in all, involved in offences relating to marijuana. All the students were spoken to by the police and many face charges for either growing, selling or using the substance. Further, all students concerned were suspended from school with work to do at home. An assembly for all students from grades five to twelve was also held to discuss the matter.

I do not wish to debate in this newsletter whether marijuana is a safe drug or not, whether it should be legalised or not or any of the other questions which arise when this drug is discussed. The fact remains that marijuana is an illegal substance from which I believe, children should be protected.

I would like to assure you all that I will always do whatever I can to ensure that the school is not used as a place to buy, sell or use drugs. The matter is very serious and will be treated accordingly.

Punishment and the consequences of being caught is, however, only one side of the story. We all have an educative role in issues where our students are required to make choices and decisions which will have long term and significant consequences.

Each day all of us are required to make thousands of decisions. For example, What will I wear?, What will I have for breakfast?, Will I go to work?, Will I obey the speed limit? etc etc. These minor decisions we make almost automatically. They are made very quickly with little thought required.

On the other hand we are required

sometimes to make decisions which have long term consequences eg. Career choice, Do I get into a car with someone who has been drinking? Do I drink? Do I get married? Will I have children? I believe too often our students are not recognising the difference between these important decisions and the minor ones mentioned earlier.

They are making the important decisions which will effect them for many years without going through any process of decision making.

The first step in the process is to recognise when the important decision is required and to stop and think about it. Time must be spent finding out as much information as possible, looking at consequences and examining the various options. Only when this process has been gone through can informed decisions be made and mistakes minimised.

I have spoken to many students and staff about this concern and I hope that you will also speak with your children about making choices and decisions. I think that while we only deal with the consequences of poor decision making, for example, punishing kids involved in marijuana offences we will do little to overcome problems of this nature in the long term.

I intend to conduct a meeting for parents to discuss this and other issues and trends I have noticed in our students, soon. The date will be publicised in the next newsletter. I will also visit Fingal, Bicheno, and Mathinna to conduct similar meetings.

MATHEMATICS

Mathematics has always been an important part of our school experience. It influences all aspects of our lives - in our homes, in our workplaces and during our sporting and leisure activities. It is an important community issue. Children begin their mathematics experiences at home. These develop further at school and beyond school. It is our responsibility to ensure that students develop the competence, confidence and interest needed to become lifelong learners of Mathematics.

The school is attempting to provide an environment which is supportive and with teaching practices based on sound learning principles. To further enhance this learning the families of the students need to be interested and involved in their learning. This can be achieved by:

- i encouraging children to talk about what they are doing in Mathematics at school
- ii listening carefully with interest to the explanations of their children about Mathematics
- iii reassuring and encouraging their children when they face difficulties
- iv taking the opportunity to practice leisure Mathematics learning at home (eg playing games such as draughts, chess, cards)
- engaging children in discussions about the useful aspects of Mathematics at home (costs of painting, redecorating, calculating commission, discounts etc
- vi discussing with teachers their children's progress and recognising what is a reasonable expectation of their performance
- vii seeking information about the school's Mathematics curriculum
- viii talking about how Mathematics is used in their particular fields

The involvement of the community can greatly influence the students' attitudes towards Mathematics.

We had real top circuses and even a preview the night before of huge and terrifying animals who needed plastic dinosaurs and such. Midnight Mass, hot cocoa and lovely cake after we were happy kids and didn't need all mod cons. We received only one present each at Christmas. Growing up with War, blackouts, coupons for food and clothing, sadness when friends didn't come back (my better half to be, was lucky to survive five years in The Islands and Kakoda Trail, broken in health but not in spirit), Remembrance Days and the haunting Last Post executed most

ably by Mr Selby Targett for many years, good relatives to help smooth rough patches and friends. St Marys today is just as nice, your children's friends with families of their own but never too busy to chat, wave or smile as they hurry past. Nice people in all business places, eg has anyone ever seen a person with a long face come of the Post Office.

The people of St Marys, Fingal, Mathinna and Cornwall are really true blue - once they know you they always do. Thank goodness I can count on one hand the unfriendly ones. We are also sorry to be leaving our good neighbours.

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AUSTRALIAN COUNTRY INFORMATION SERVICE (ACIS) TO EXPAND TO ST HELENS AND FINGAL

The Australian Country Information Service (ACIS) which has been operating out of the St Marys Community Hall since August last year has so far assisted over 150 people with their enquiries, on subjects ranging from Social Security, Aged Services and Landcare to Youth Programmes. The service is funded by the Federal Government through the St Marys and St Helens Chambers of Commerce and has access to information on every Federal Government programme and service.

ACIS aims to provide a 'one stop shop' information and referral service on Government services and programmes to help people in rural and remote communities obtain access to any information and/or assistance they may need as easily as possible.

Although the service is funded by the Federal Government, there is also a welter of information at the office concerning State and Local Government services.

The service is proving to be extremely successful, and this, combined with budget savings has enabled the expansion of the service. In addition to the two days at St Marys, Barrie Rafter, the local ACIS Officer, will be visiting both St Helens and Fingal Neighbourhood Houses on alternate Wednesdays until at least the end of the financial year.

It will depend on Community interest and use of the service whether or not the ACIS office will be funded for the following year. This is a service which can save members of the community their hard earned cash. It can cost a small fortune trying to contact government departments by travelling to Launceston or Hobart, let alone trying to contact them by phone from a rural area, particularly by the time you establish exactly who it is you need to talk to, then get put on hold for 5 minutes and then find that they are out for lunch! Let Barrie do it for you - that's what the service is for.

So remember, if you need information or help—use the service! Call in to St Marys Community Hall on a Thursday or Friday between 10 am and 3 pm (or phone Barrie on 722 693) or from this week onwards if you live in the St Helens or Fingal areas you can see Barrie at your local Neighbourhood House on a Wednesday. You can phone either the Neighbourhood House or Barrie at St Marys to find out which week he will be in your area.
