## 300 New Jobs By The Year 2000!!

### SMACD INC REPORT

This may sound like an impossibility to some, however if the proposed plan of action put forward by the SMACD Committee is embraced by the entire Break O Day Municipality it can happen.

When SMACD was formed last July it was decided at a public meeting to look into the viability of Tourism being a way to encourage economic development in the region.

Since that meeting members of the committee have been attending workshops, consulting Government bodies and basically doing their homework in regards to Tourism. Today we release the first draft of the proposal that we have come up with. The entire document is available for the public to read and can be found at the Post office, both Banks and the Library. (do not remove)

SMACD has identified the area behind the Library as the most important feature within our Township. This area has great potential as becoming the focal point of our town. All members of the Council have looked at this area with SMACD and are willing to take into consideration any plans that we may come up with. There have been quite a few ideas put forward already, all have merit. However, SMACD is of the feeling that this land is so important to the future we are attempting to achieve for St Marys, that we would like to hear all of your suggestions. We must consider all aspects, benefits to the people of St Marys, attractability to Tourists and how the ideas fit into the entire Township.

We must get this right, it is no point in

spending money down there if we make a botch of it. Please come forward with your ideas no matter how small or fantastic, we want to know.

So how do we go about creating the 300 jobs???

Firstly we must get your support. We know that all those people who attended the public meetings last year were much in favour for us to pursue Tourism. Now we need you to become members of SMACD, not only to give the committee the encouragement to keep going but also to let Council, State and Federal Governments know that we the people of St Marys are serious in our endeavour. It costs just \$5.00 to become a member or \$10.00 per family. This can be paid at the Annual General Meeting on the 10 May, 7.30 pm in the School Staff room.

Secondly we must encourage all community groups to be working towards the same goals, with the focal point being St Marys first. If St Marys becomes a tourist attraction in its own right, the rest of the

Municipality benefits.

Finally, all the work cannot be left to a small group of people, they soon become very tired and lose direction or just give up.

We are not asking everyone to attend meetings every month, but we do need to include people in our plan of action. We need people to take on particular tasks. Don't think we are asking for volunteers to rebuild our town but we do require some volunteer manual labour as was required with the beautification of the Old Post office block but that is not what its all about. We need to lobby Government Departments for funding for some projects. This news sheet alone takes an amateur the best part of a day to put together. There's lots of ways and things you can do to help.

Please read the first draft proposal that's been released today. Remember this is not the be all and end all to the future of St Marys but it is a start. Come along to the Annual General Meeting on the 10 May and give the Committee the encouragement to go on with their task.

# Lions tackle Targa

Australian Lions should take a special interest in this year's Targa Tasmania International Rally, which gets underway on April 27. For "accepted" in the renowned motor sports event is T1 District Governor Bill Dyson and his navigator Lion Doug Duthoit, of the Lions Club of Penguin.

The Lions team, in DG Bill's 1953 Ford Customline sedan, will be competing with a high-profile field that includes Kerry Packer, Kevin Bartlett, Colin Bond, Sir Jack Brabham and Dick Johnstone.

While not expecting to be first across the finishing line, Bill and Doug do have two main aims - to promote Campaign SightFirst and the Button Day to be held throughout Tasmania immediately following the conclusion of Targa on Friday May 6.

Assisting them in their endeavours will be the national and international media coverage that Targa attracts, plus the fact that no less than two-thirds of Tasmania's population turns out to see the exotic cars, valued at some \$30 million, in action.

As participation in Targa Tasmania is by invitation only, DG Bill is justifiably elated that his team and the Customline were accepted as one of the 250 starters. With more than 330 applications, acceptance is an achievement in itself!

DG Bill's team is a self-sponsored private entry, but all funds raised will go to Campaign SightFirst.

And while the Customline has now nudged past 40, Bill is confident it will complete the rally. For not only is Lion Doug an experienced navigator, he also owns a motor vehicle servicing business and grew up working on, of course, Ford Customlines!

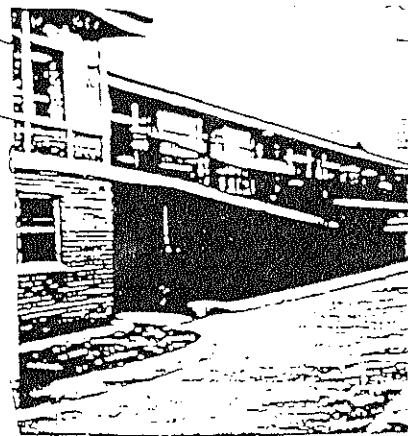

## Term Dates - 1995

**F**ollowing consultation with the Australian Education Union and principals, the Minister for Education and the Arts has approved school term dates for 1995 and arrangements for Easter in schools and colleges as follows:

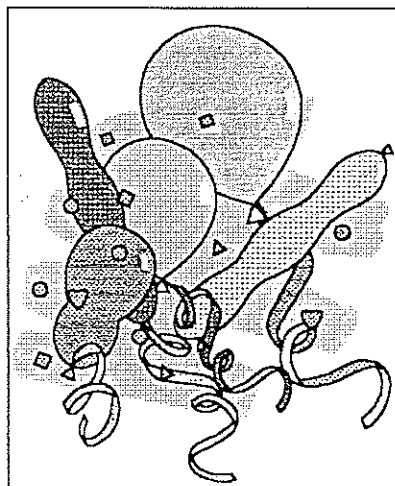
**Term 1 -  
16 February - 2 June 1995**

**Note:** In this period there will be an Easter break between 14 April and 23 April 1995.

**Term 2 -  
19 June - 1 September 1995**

**Term 3 -  
18 September - 20 December 1995**

It should be noted that students do not lose any school attendance time as a result of the extended Easter break. Students are required to commence Term 1 three days earlier than the normal school commencement date. However, students will not be required to attend school for the three days following the Easter break (ie. 19, 20, and 21 April 1995).

As the number of children using the service is a key issue with the Department it is important that these numbers be maintained.

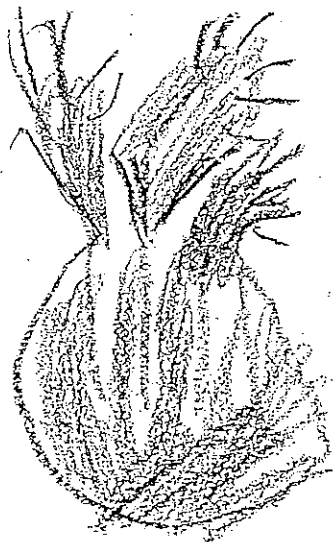
We would like to see as many parents of children using this service as possible at the May meeting. Both Leon and the P&F Association need to hear your ideas for improvements to this service.

After the meeting general business will be discussed. This includes topics for future meetings. If you have any suggestions then this is a good time to discuss them. See you all at the May meeting.

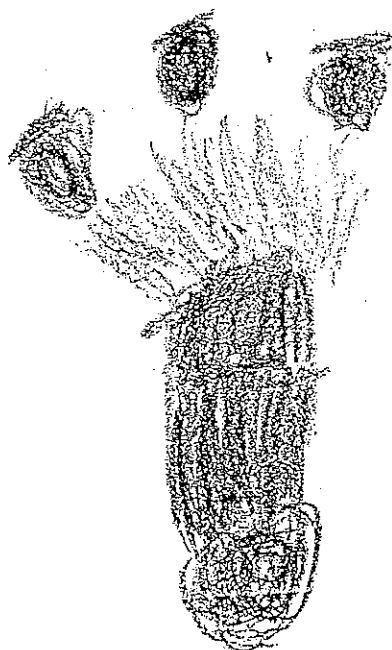
