Understanding the Disability Reform Package

The Disability Reform Package makes it easier for people who are disabled to get into work. It also gives you money to live on if you can't work because of sickness or an accident. You can get a Sickness Allowance or Disability Support Pension.

Sickness Allowance

Sickness Allowance replaced Sickness Benefit. You can get Sickness Allowance if you can't work for a short time because of a sickness or an accident. It is paid for up to three months at a time and usually stops after a year. You need a doctor's certificate to get Sickness Allowance.

Disability Support Pension

Disability Support Pension replaced Invalid Pension. You can get it if you are disabled, can do only a little work and can't work for most of the week.

Help with getting a job

There is now something new called a Disability Panel. People on the Panel could help you get a job. There is one person from Social Security, the CES and the Commonwealth Rehabilitation Service on the Panel.

The Panel will help you if you get Sickness Allowance or Disability Support Pension and might be able to work, even part-time. They find out what work you can do and what you want to do.

If there are courses in your area that could help you get a job, the Panel will tell you how to get on them and still get paid. They can also give you help after you start work.

The Disability Support Officer at Social Security can tell you more.

You don't have to meet the Panel or go on a course if you don't want to — you will still get paid. But you might miss out on some important help.

If you want to talk to a Disability Panel, tell the Disability Support Officer at Social Security.

The talks with the Panel are casual. You can bring someone else if it will help you. The Panel can also get you an interpreter if you want one.

Where is the Panel?

Panels meet in Social Security Offices.
If you can't get there, the
Disability Support Officer can
help you.

If you get a job .

If you get a Disability Support Pension
you can get \$200 when you get a job.
This will help with clothes and
other things. You can also keep
your concession cards for a year after
you start work. If you can't
use public transport because
of your sickness, you can get
Mobility Allowance to help
with costs.
If you have to stop work in
the first two years, you can get
the pension again straight away.
Just fill in another form at
Social Security.
You don't have to see the
doctor again.

Ask the Aboriginal and Torres
Strait Islander Liaison Officer
(ALO), SNAP Officer or
Disability Support Officer at
Social Security if you want
to know more.

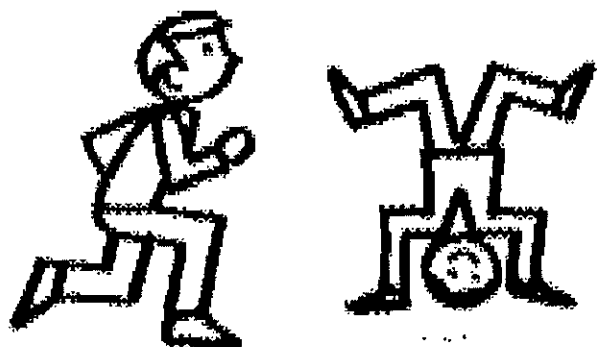

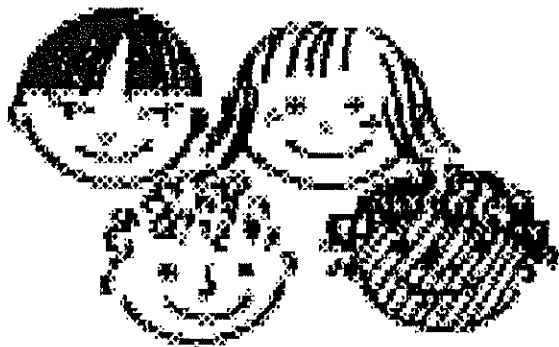

ANNUAL REPORT-192/93

It is again my pleasure to submit the Annual Report for Meals on Wheels - Fingal Valley Group which has now been in operation for twenty-three years.

This past year 5,372 meals were delivered by our Group being a daily average of 22 The yearly total being 752 less than last year. The cost of meals to recipients is \$2.50 which is the minimum charge set by the Health Department. Meals have continued to be delivered at St. Marys, Fingal, Cornwall and Mathinna.

The fact that the Meals on Wheels service has continued for such a long period shows that there are a sufficient number of residents who are prepared to give their time and interest to provide for the delivery of meals on a regular basis, to these people we extend our very sincere thanks for making the service possible.

I wish to thank the Staff at the St. Marys District Hospital for preparing meals of such good quality which are appreciated by all who receive them.

Our thanks are also extended to the St. Marys Lions Club for their contribution of Christmas cakes for delivery to all recipients.

May I also thank Jack Miller and Les Rubenagh for very efficient work as Secretary and Treasurer. The fact that the Meals on Wheels service operates so smoothly is largely due to these two. Also I thank Margaret Bullock for attending to birthday card distribution.

Finally I wish to thank all members of the Committee for their support and regular attendance at our meetings.

I would wish to add a final comment concerning the uncertainty of the future role of the St. Marys District Hospital, and that to give the assurance that the interest of the Meals on Wheels are being carefully watched and the value of the service is promoted at every opportunity.

Cheese and Thyme Damper

What you need:

1½ cups wholemeal SR flour, ½ cup SR flour, ½ tspn paprika, ¼ tspn pepper, ½ tspn chopped fresh thyme or 1 tspn chopped fresh thyme leaves, ½ cup grated tasty cheddar cheese, 40g butter or margarine, 1 cup evaporated milk (skim if desired).

Topping

2 tblspns milk, 1 tblspn grated parmesan cheese, 1 tblspn poppy seeds or sesame seeds.

What you do:

Gently melt butter and combine milk. Sift flours, spices and herbs.

Stir in cheese then add milk and butter mixture, mix to a soft dough.

Knead lightly on a floured surface and shape into a 20cm round tin. Using a sharp knife, cut almost through the dough into eight wedges. Brush with milk and sprinkle with parmesan and seeds.

Cook at 200C for about 25 minutes.

Serve warm, cut into wedges.

IMPROVE YOUR SURROUNDINGS
