TOURISM PUSH FOR THE VALLEY

At the public meeting held at the school last week, in excess of 85 people were concerned enough as to the direction our Valley is headed, that they voted unanimously to support a steering committee which was formed to look into possibilities of a tourism push in the Valley.

Andrew Keddie, the Liaison Officer from the Kentish Council gave an informative talk on how Sheffield had achieved what it has today. There have been close to 20 new businesses opened since the first mural. Many new jobs have been created.

He also talked about Sheffield's recycling system. All things in Sheffield are recycled. Last year they made \$16 000, all of this has gone back into the community or their recycling business "The Hub".

The input from the floor was varied and all very positive. It was quite obvious that all people in attendance believe we do have a future in the Valley.

Fiona Hope, the co-ordinator of Fingal Neighbourhood House told us that the people of Fingal are keen to be involved. Fiona has been involved in the department of Tourism for 7 years and has volunteered her knowledge.

Break O' Day Warden Robert Legge was quite positive and invited people to make contact with councillors if they have any suggestions for the LEAP program.

Volunteers were called to form a steering committee. Sixteen people offered their services instantly. This must be a record. I have never seen people so keen to be on any committee before. Thank you all.

It will be the committee's job to look into all suggestions that the community can come up with. They will then form a plan of action. Through another public meeting, so the greater public will be given the chance to say "yay or nay" to what ever they come up with. The committee is very

keen to have all people in the community involved and will consider putting a suggestion box in the post office. This way they will be accessible to you all.

There will be regular articles in the Valley Voice and other publications.




The whole evening was recorded on video by Mr Bain with good quality pictures and sounds. A copy of this video can be purchased at a mere \$6.00.

The round trip over the two days of 690 km. was worth it, he reckoned!!.



SISTER SCHOOLS

St Marys District High School has recently become a sister school to Muludga Remote Community School in North Western Australia.

Students from grades 2/3 and the grade 4 classes are corresponding with Muludga School. Several students from grade 9 are making a video of our school and community; a copy will be sent to Muludga.

A one-off Government grant of \$100.00 to cover the initial cost of the exchange has been received by the school.

Why Sister Schools?

The Sister Schools project is a new idea aimed at breaking down the barriers between young Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people in schools throughout Australia.

Based on the old hobby of making pen-friends, Sister Schools will forge social and educational links between schools with high Aboriginal enrolments and those with few or no Aboriginal children attending.

In that way, young Aboriginal and non-Aboriginal people will be encouraged to interact and understand each other much more than their parents or grandparents were able to do.

For example, young non-Aboriginals can learn about Aboriginal cultural values such as the kinship system, and the sharing that has been part of Aboriginal culture for at least 40,000 years. They can learn in a person-to-person way about the rich cultural heritage of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander people.

At the same time, Sister Schools will allow Aboriginal school children to learn more about the values and feelings of children who may have had little or no previous contact with Aboriginal or Torres Strait Islander people. All participants stand to benefit from a friendly exchange of views across cultural backgrounds, and Australia stands to gain from the greater understanding that Sister Schools will promote in our new generation.

LANDSCAPING AROUND ST.MARYS

The work being carried out on the railway side of St.Marys is funded by a Landcare and Environment Action Program (LEAP). Council applied for this funding.

Fifteen registered unemployed young people between the ages of 15 and 20 have been lucky enough to be involved in this particular program for six months.

There is a training component built into the scheme. Murray Johns, who has been transferred from his normal council duties to oversee this young group of workers, is doing an excellent job. The work includes landscaping and tree planting, uncovering and restoration of the locomotive turntable, repainting of the railway station in Federation colours and even the old locomative will get a new paint job.

Special mention must go to the Break O' Day Council for their efforts to find this type of opportunity for young people to gain some employment with training in this area.

LETTER TO THE EDITOR

Dear Sir,

The numerous Tasmanian pensioners who are of Dutch birth and have worked in The Netherlands before settling in Tasmania need to be aware that they may now be eligible for a Dutch aged pension. This pension is paid at a higher rate than the Australian pension.

The annual income of the pensioner concerned may increase by \$5,500 depending on the period of time he/she has worked in The Netherlands. Their dependence on the Australian pension is subsequently reduced.

This ability to claim the Dutch pension has come about by the recent social security agreement signed between the Netherlands and Australia. This agreement allows people to move freely between the countries while protecting their social security entitlements.

The agreement only applies however to Dutchborn Australian residents over 65 years of age who migrated from the Netherland after January 1957.

Anyone who thinks they may be entitled to a Netherland pension can get a claim form from their local Department of Social Security Office or by contacting the DSS on 008 030 707.

LIBERAL TASMANIAN SENATOR TO CHAIR SENATE COMMITTEE

Liberal Senator John Watson (Tas) has been appointed the Chairman of the Senate Select Committee on Superannuation. This move has few precedents in the recent history of the Senate.

For the first time in ten years of Senate sittings, an opposition member of the Senate has been recognised in this way. The last opposition Parliamentary member to chair a committee was fellow Liberal Tasmanian Senator Peter Rae in 1983.

Senator Watson replaces another fellow Tasmanian, the Government appointed chair, Labor Senator Nick Sherry who has ably led the committee over the past 2 years.

As Chairman, Senator Watson has the responsibility of representing the views of the whole committee in the media and at a range of public forums.

The committee is expected to hold hearings on such issues as increasing the Superannuation Guarantee from nine to 12 per cent, the role of employee contributions in this process and on the legislation to implement the recommendations of the Committee's second report, Safeguarding Super, on the prudential control and supervision of superannuation funds.

The Committee will also investigate the interaction between the allocated pensions and social security system and the use of superannuation funds to finance housing.

Senator Watson has been a member of the committee since it's inception and is Parliamentary Secretary to the Shadow Treasurer, Alexander Downer, MP assisting him in tax and superannuation matters.



LETTER TO THE EDITOR

SAVE OUR HOSPITAL!!!!

The Fingal Valley residents are concerned with the closing of services that could occur at the hospital. We feel that there is no need for the closing of St. Mary's Hospital. With better public relations, services could be increased and the hospital utilized for the full benefit of the community.

Residents in the Fingal Valley will be greatly disadvantaged if they have to travel to St. Helens for medical admissions. Given the low socio-economic situation in the area residents can not afford to travel long distances for hospital treatment. The Fingal Valley Residents will be expected to travel to St. Helens for hospitalisation, for non-acute cases, can you travel to St Helens every day to see your family? Would you like to see another doctor, other than your own?

The Fingal Valley residents have limited resources, if the hospital closes, a much needed resource will be further depleted from the valley. Doctors in the area will be disadvantaged if they have no hospital for backup. A lot of people seek medical aid from the hospital after hours. Will our Doctors stay if the Hospital closes? As the population of St Helens increases in St. Helens for 3 months during the summer period, the St. Helen's Hospital is unlikely to meet the needs of the Fingal Valley Residents as well as their own.

As there is high percentage of elderly people in this area, due to lack of funding Community Health Care Services are not likely, to be increased. What are the services going to be for these people? The elderly, who have supported the St. Mary's Hospital, should have the right to the security of being able to use this facility.

The Fingal Valley Residents are concerned if there is an emergency. Two Ambulances cover the area, no hospital beds, what will be the backup plan? If there is a mine disaster, school bus accident etc. and the St. Mary's Hospital is closed, there will be no nursing staff, to attend the scene in the Ambulance, no Hospital Backup, (locally) and it takes approx 45mins to reach the nearest Hospital (These things could happen)

The Fingal Valley Residents are concerned that all the resources and financial assistance are being taken away from our area for no reason at all. Health Care should not come down to money, it should be need, and should be available for everyone.

The Fingal Valley Residents feel that because the councils have now amalgamated, the WHOLE EAST COAST HEALTH CARE should be reviewed not just St. Mary's Hospital. People in the Fingal Valley are entitled to Medical facilities under the Medicare program. WE PAY OUR TAXES TOO!
