### SOUTH OF THE MOUNTAIN NETBALL REPORT


On the 5th of August the E.N.E. netballers had to go to Scottsdale, we all had to be billeted out by Scottsdale E.N.E. representatives.

### AUSTRALIAN SCHOOLS SCIENCE COMPETITION

St. Marys District High School entered over eighty students in the Australian Schools Science Competition this year. Of these, sixteen were primary students, all of whom will receive a participation certificate. Outstanding students in the primary section included: Russell Smith, Ben Lewis, Sarah Mitchell, Joshua Bretag, Carlie Davies and Sari Oosterloo,

A total of 37,000 primary students in Australia, New Zealand, Papua New Guinea, Singapore, Fiji and Vanuatu participated in the quiz. In the secondary section 283,000 students entered.

The aim of the competition is to provide students with a stimulating challenge and comprehensive feedback on their performance. Students are required to answer questions which cover a range of science processes and skills.

All students in the secondary section receive an individual letter telling them which questions they got right.

Students who perform well receive certificates.

The certificates are awarded as follows:

High Distinction - top 1% in the state Distinction - next 10% in the state

Credit - next 20% in the state

Students in the top 20% of their school who have not qualified for one of the above certificates receive a Certificate of Achievement.

St. Marys secondary students gained thirteen credits this year which is considerably better than last year's performance. The results are also very pleasing in that we were very close to the state average score in years 7 and 8 and above it in year 10. Considering that all students at St. Marys have the opportunity to participate, this achievement in itself is quite outstanding.





### ST.MARYS NEWS

extract from Cyclopedia of Tas (1900-1902)

St.Marys a township in the county of Cornwall, municipal and electoral district of Fingal, is the terminus of the Fingal railway line, which branches from the main line at Conara Junction. In the centre of the extensive mining district known as Fingal, in which are the most valuable accumulations of pure carbon yet discovered in the island, are Fingal, Mount Nicholas, Durham, Cornwall and Jubilee Mines. It was for the development of these mines that the Government constructed the Fingal line.

Coaches leave the town daily for St.Helens, Goulds Country and Thomas Plains districts. The fares by train to Hobart and Launceston are respectively 51s and 29s. On the township are two good hotels, (The St.Marys and Criterion) a branch of the National Bank, a Savings Bank, Anglican, Roman Catholic and Wesleyan Churches, and the Wesley Social Hall, a building with commodious seating and staging capacity.

There is a local racing club, and Oddfellows Lodge. The population of the district is 3800, that of the township 290.

### PENSIONERS WILL BE FORCED TO SELL SHARES

Pensioners who own shares in publicly listed companies will have any increase in the value of those shares assessed as income by the Department of Social Security as from September.

While there will be a reduction in pension entitlement, there will be no other corresponding cash inflow. Many pensioners will have no other alternative but to sell their shares.

This is contrary to the Government's plan to lift the level of national savings through such strategies as the Superannuation Guarantee Charge. Australia's present saving rate at 16% of GDP is the lowest since the Great War and the Depression.

The present Government seems to have little concern for the financial and mental well being of the pensioner who has attempted to help this country grow economically by investing in shares.
