## NEW SERVICE OPEN IN ST.MARYS

The St.Marys and St.Helens Chamber of Commerce are pleased to announce that the Australian Country Information Service (A.C.I.S.) Office is NOW OPEN in St.Marys.

This is the first (A.C.I.S.) office to open in Tasmania.

The site is one of twenty A.C.I.S. offices now operating throughout rural Australia, with twelve of those twenty becoming operational this week.

The Service is funded by the Commonwealth Department of Primary Industry and Energy under the Rural Access Programme to provide a confidential information and referral service on the over 200 different Commonwealth Government programmes.

Mr Barrie Rafter of St.Marys who's background includes experience in the public service and in private enterprise, has been appointed as the ACIS Officer. He has recently returned from Canberra after a weeks intensive training.

"The service is free of charge and available to everyone" Mr Rafter said today. "If you have any queries from filling in a form to wanting to know what services may be available please drop in and see me."

Services will include community information stands for the display of brochures, copies of the Rural Book and access to the Commonwealth video lending library.

The office, situated in the St.Marys Community Hall will be open from 10am to 3pm each Thursday and Friday. The phone number is 722693 Fax 722694..

## AUSTRALIAN SCIENCE COMPETITION REVISITED

After receiving some concerns at the last Parents and Friends Meeting about my article in our last newsletter about our performance in the Australian Science Competition, I feel that I should reply in order to make the position clear to all parents. In this article I stated that, "St. Marys secondary students gained thirteen credits this year which is considerably better than last year's performance".

This is in fact quite true. In 1992 our school gained only nine credit awards. This in itself is a 44% increase in awards gained.

Something to be proud of and a clear indication of sound teaching in the area. I also made the statement that,

"The results are also very pleasing in that we were very close to the state average score in years 7 and 8 and above it in year 10. Considering that all students at St. Marys have the opportunity to participate, this achievement in itself is quite outstanding".

This is the point which raised most concern. The question asked at the meeting was,

"Why aren't we above the state average in all year groups?"

The key to the answer is in my previous article where I stated,

"Considering that all students at St. Marys have the opportunity to participate".

In many schools only those students studying the higher level science course are given the opportunity to enter this competition. A school adopting such a policy will inevitably raise their average score in such a competition. In fact, if St. Marys had such a policy we would be above the state average for grades 7 and 8, right on the average in grade 9 and well above the state average for grade 10. Clearly we have done very well.

The fact is that if we are going to give the opportunity for all students to enter and thereby encourage all in the area of science, it will be very difficult to gain average results equal to schools who only enter their top students. I believe that our policy is the correct one and I would be very disappointed if only a select few were given the chance.

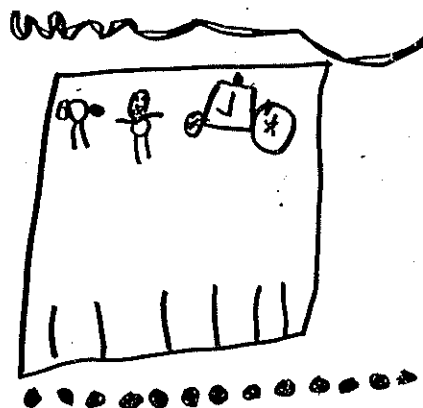

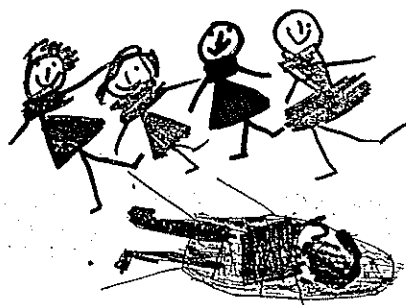

### NATIONAL MEALS ON WHEELS DAY

On Wednesday September 1 1993 Tasmanian recipients of the Meals on Wheels service will be eating the same meal as the 55,000 other recipients of Meals on Wheels around Australia.

The meal will consist of: Cream of Tomato Soup, Roast Lamb and gravy with Mint Sauce, Roast Potato, Pumpkin and Beans, with Apple Pie and Custard, with or without Cream to follow.

It has been estimated that on National Meals on Wheels Day the frail, aged and/or disabled recipients of Meals on Wheels will eat:

- 5,500 litres of Tomato Soup
- 8,250 kilos of boned and rolled Legs and Lamb
- 5,170 kilos of peeled and eyed Potatoes
- 6,875 kilos of Pumpkin
- 4,950 kilos of sliced Beans
- 100 litres of Mint Sauce
- 1,100 litres of Gravy
- 8,250 kilos of Apple Pie, and
- 2,750 litres of Custard.

National Meals on Wheels Day is being held this year for the first time to publicise the important role of Meals on Wheels and Delivered Food Services which operate in every State and Territory of Australia; to educate the community on the important role of the service; to acknowledge the importance of the recipient's well-being; to express appreciation to those involved in the service; and to highlight the on-going need for recruiting volunteers to deliver the service.

The day also coincides with National Wattle Day so most of the deliverers of Meals on Wheels will be wearing a sprig of wattle on the first day of Spring.

Meals on Wheels is a vital service organised to help the frail, aged and/or disabled or all ages, who cannot reasonably get a meal for themselves, to remain in their own homes with dignity and independence. The service is partly subsidised under the Home and Community Care (HACC) Programme, a joint Commonwealth and State government programme. There is a small charge made for Meals on Wheels which is delivered and organised by volunteers five days a week, including all public holidays. In Tasmania 355,990 meals were delivered in 1992 by 2,900 volunteers and the demand for meals is increasing.

# Down Memory Lane

**T**his is rather a sad but truthful story of the 1930s

The Great Depression of the 1930s was at its worst. There were virtually no jobs and very little money to be had during these years. As a young man in my early twenties I wandered down this way, looking for work and I was fortunate enough to secure a job. Our only means of transport was per boot or bicycle if you were lucky enough to own one.

There was in Campbell Town a Mr Jack Flanagan who had a business where the local newsagency is now situated and with a keen eye to business he and several locals started a series of bike races.

If you didn't own a bike he would lend you one from his second hand stock. They were road races, starting from where the Saxon Heaters business is situated and riding up to Wanstead gate and back. The races proved very popular, so Mr Flanagan began to stock really good racing bikes which you could buy almost on your own terms.

Other districts also started the sport, and Mr Flanagan had a bus on which he could strap five of the bikes, upside down on top.

So, one Saturday there were sports at Fingal and some of the local riders, with the new bikes, decided to take part in the day's activities. To Mr Flanagan's joy the Campbell Town boys won all the races. This was a bit too good for him so he went to celebrate at the local hotel and stayed a little longer than he should have for the safety of us all.

**COMPUTER GAMES TO BE CLASSIFIED**

Computer/video games will now eventually receive similar  
classifications as films. This proposal was recently  
announced by the Commonwealth's Chief Censor whilst attending  
a Senate Hearing investigating violence and sexually explicit  
material in video games.

The Hearing was informed that the classifications would be  
designed to stop the importing of violent and sexually  
explicit material into video games. The Chief censor also  
stressed that the scheme was only in its preparatory stage.

However, the aim of the scheme would to ensure that all  
material being sold, hired or available in games arcades would  
be classified and labelled with appropriate consumer advice  
and age recommendations, such as now apply to the sale of  
videos.

Stiff penalties would then be used nationally to stop the non-  
compliance with the new regulations. After consultation with  
community groups it is hoped that the four classifications  
will be up to 8 years, 9-14, 15-17 and 18 plus.
