PROPER USE OF MEDICATIONS

- * A patient is prescribed a new drug for heart disease but fails to tell the doctor that he already takes several other medications
- * A mother stops giving her child an antibiotic after a few days, even though the doctor prescribed the medication for 10 days
- A woman who experiences anxiety attacks hopes to relieve the symptoms with tranquilizer pills given to her by a friend
- * Before attending a cocktail party, a man takes an over-the-counter cold remedy, but fails to notice that the directions warn not to combine with alcohol

Situations such as these occur every day often without consequence. Yet, these same situations can be dangerous. For they are examples of what is sometimes called "the other drug problem" - the abuse and misuse of prescriptions and over-the-counter (OTC) drugs. This is a widespread problem that could affect us all, but one that can be avoided through education and prevention.

ertainly, the benefits of modern medicines are indisputable. Drugs can increase life expectancy, relieve aches and pains, cure deadly diseases, and improve the overall quality of life. However, when carelessly or improperly used these same life-saving, life-enhancing drugs can lead in addiction, serious physical problems and even death

TYPES OF MISUSE:

The potential for abuse and misuse of medications is enormous because of the large variety and quantity of prescription and OTC drugs taken every day by adults and children.

Medications, however, are rarely abused intentionally. Most people are not even aware that they are doing something that may be hazardous to their health.

An estimated half of the prescription drugs are taken incorrectly. Types of misues include failing to take

medications as directed, consuming alcohol while taking medications, inadvertently taking the same medication in two forms, stopping use too soon or continuing too long, combining drugs that adversely interact, using outdated medicines, and sharing prescriptions.

Physical or psychological addiction is a danger if medication use is not carefully monitored. Depressants (tranquillizers, barbiturates, sedatives), stimulants (amphetamines, diet pills) and narcotics (painkillers containing codeine and morphine) are prescription drugs that can put a patient at risk of addiction. Some over-the-counter drugs can also lead to dependence. These include nasal sprays, laxatives, eye drops, stay-awake pills and sleeping pills.

Avoidable side effects from drug misuse range from the annoying (a rash or fatigue) to the life threatening (irregular heart beat or loss of consciousness). Drug misuse also results in uncured health problems. An infection may linger or return, and avoidable long-term problems can develop. Such neglect is not only painful, it is also expensive, adding unnecessary costs to health care.

FACTORS LEADING TO MISUSE:

The abuse and misuse of prescription and over-the-counter drugs is a serious problem that could happen to anyone. However, patients can avoid problems by becoming educated consumers and taking responsibility for their own health care. Here are some guidlines to help patients become active participants in their own safe medication program:

* Talk with doctors, nurses,

pharmacists, dentists, ophthalmologists and other health care professionals. Tell them about the medicines you now take, including OTC drugs. Also report any problems with your medications and any allergies you have. Prepare for your appointment by making a written list of this information. If you take several medications, bring them with you to your appointment, so the doctor can see exactly what you are taking.

- * Don't be afraid to ask questions. What is the medication supposed to do? Should I avoid any foods, beverages, other medicines or activities? Are there possible side effects? Is there any written information about the drug? Pharmacists can be very helpful in providing this information.
- * Have a system to help you remember to take medications. This is especially important when taking more than one drug. Make a chart, or use daily or weekly pill containers. If necessary ask someone to help manage your medications.
- * Follow safe practices when taking and storing medicines. Refer to the Safe Medication Practices chart for specific "do's and don'ts".

SAFE MEDICATION PRACTICES: DO:

- Tell health care professionals the names of all medications you take; report any drug side effects or allergies
- Ask questions about how to take prescribed drugs and what to expect
- Take medications exactly as prescribed, following instructions for quantity, time of day, food and drink recommendations or restrictions etc
- Store medications in airtight containers
