CORNWALL - THE WAY IT WAS

I first arrived at Cullenswood Railway Station in April 1934 to teach at the Cornwall School. Little did I know then that the first people I spoke to would play a major part in my life on Cornwall - my husband and a very dear brother-in-law.

I was very nervous for my first day at school, especially when told I had three classes to teach with 45 pupils and two of the classes had two grades, depending on the time they began school, whether at the beginning of the year or half way through the year. I wonder how they'd go today. I was helped greatly by my headmaster, whom I am pleased to say had taught me at Beaconsfield. The school had two rooms, and had an enrolment of amount the 100 mark. I can't quite remember. The school building was also used as a meeting place because there was no Cornwall Hall at that time.

I soon realised that the mine, apart from providing the wages, ruled our time. We began the day at seven o'clock in the morning with a whistle, and the arrival of two bus loads from St Marys and one from Fingal-Mt Nicholas. Work began at 7.30 am - another whistle. The day finished at 3.30 pm with a whistle. If a whistle was heard out of the regular time slot we knew a serious accident had occurred.

In 1934 the miners were lucky if they worked five days in the fortnight and the average pay for the five days would be about £8 to £10 (pounds). I was greatly taken by the miners with their black faces and very white teeth and white rimmed eyes.

In 1934 onwards coal was mined by the men with pick and shovel, loaded

onto skips and drawn by pit ponies. Joy loaders came later in about the 1960's. The skips were drawn by an endless cable to the Screens which were at the bottom of the hill. Power for the screens was by thermal power using our coal.

The pit ponies were really well looked after and a great joy to the kids was to be able to ride or lead the ponies to their paddocks when holidays or a strike was on. Unfortunately 1937-38 were troubled by strikes. In two years, there were 18 months of strikes for better wages and conditions. The Tasmanian mines received the thanks of the Government during the war years for continuous work while the New South Wales mines were on strike.

Cornwall at one time boasted about 140 houses. These homes, some only two rooms, were always warm, clean, homely places always with a bright coal fire, always white ochred hobs, never allowed to get dirty, lino covered floors with a rag pegged mat at the hearth. Cooking was by a wood stove which was always blacklead everyday. You could see your face in them.

There were four general stores, plus baker and a butcher. In those days our groceries were delivered to the door, also our bread and meat. Now we haven't any. The post office was also a great meeting place.

In the early days, the community spirit was great. Everybody worked together whether for the churches (we had two) or the school, for Red Cross or Comfort funds. The musical talent of the Cornwall people was outstanding. We had the Cornwall orchestra for our dances, plus the mouthorgan band and

the band under Mr Jack Madden. It is hard to put in words the spirit which was Cornwall's. When one considers that the men worked so very hard with pick and shovel and they would have marvellous gardens usually grown in coal ash, go to meetings, go hunting in the bush and still be willing to work on committees.

In the early years, the hunting for possums was very strong with the high price that was paid for the skins. What a pity they cannot find something to use the skins for nowadays and so keep them out of our gardens.

I have often been asked why I still stay at Cornwall, the reason is I love the place, the view, the room, I can breath, I love my space. I also love my church, and I feel very sad that because of lack of people, the building that was built by the people with great hopes, must be sold. We have a very successful Senior Citizens and Indoor Bowls Club but half of our members come from St Marys, what is wrong with the Cornwall people - we don't bite.

What I don't like is the fact that we have lost so many houses - usually by fire. We now have about 45 remaining.

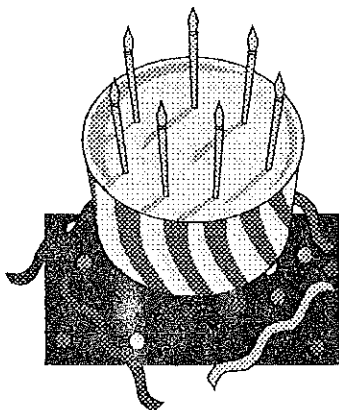

SMACD REPORT

FUNDING: Over the last few months the committee have been busy looking for ways to obtain funding for several projects that were identified at the "Mainstreet" workshop earlier in the year. Two submissions have been completed.

Community, Environment, Art & Design - This is a Grant which is designed to encourage communities to participate creatively in planning and designing public environments which express their cultural identity. If we should manage to secure this funding it would enable us to plan our Street Theme using professional designers to guide us. Successful applicants will be notified in December.

Forest Ecotourism Programme - We have been working with Helen Preston the Economic Development Officer from Bicheno on this submission. The aim is to develop a plan for a walking track which will give access to the northern end of the Leeaberra Track, Douglas Apsley National Park. The northern end of the Park is little used and it is felt that a more accessible track would benefit St Marys with the user-flow going on to Freycinet.

Sport and Recreation - We are presently working with Local Council and the Local Government Association in an endeavour to obtain funding for a Playground. If successful SMACD will be putting additional funding forward along with the Council.

TIDY TOWNS: Judging takes place on 30 September. Please help us out on this one. Do you have an obvious fence needing repair or an overgrown verge. It would be great if you could attend to these in the next couple of weeks. The Committee have embarked on a rubbish bin spruce-up with the assistance of Council and in the next few weeks the town will be sporting freshly painted bins. This will improve on what we presently have until Council can supply the Town with the new rubbish bin holders.

GOLF FAMILY FUN DAY: Sunday 16 October - two person Ambrose - 11 am start. BBQ and live music. None players welcome. Great prizes and grocery hamper raffle. \$6.00 per head. Money raised will go towards playground equipment.

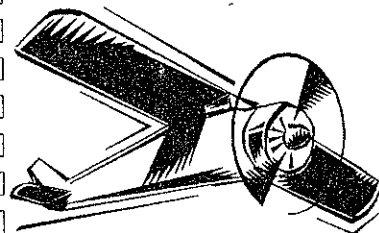
Christmas Eve is on Saturday this year, what night should the parade be held? Who is prepared to do some fund raising to enable the Clown to be hired and to cover insurance?
