Heart disease - sorting out facts from fads

Lower blood cholesterol by lowering intake of goods high in saturated fats:

Use low fat lite milks and diary products instead of the full-cream varieties to get your calcium without the fat.

Advertisements have been claiming that full-cream milk should be considered as a low fat product because it only contains 4 grams of fat per 100 ml.

However, when you consider the quantity of milk consumed, this could amount to a lot of fat. For example, drinking 2 glasses of milk (500 ml) a day would provide 20 grams of fat.

Eat only lean meat and skinless poultry and trim off any excess fat before cooking. There are many varieties of lean meat such as trim lamb, lean beef, new fashioned pork, veal and kangaroo which have the National Heart Foundation's tick of approval.

Have less takeaways (especially the deep-fried varieties), snack foods (like potato chips) and confectionery.

There are better choices of takeaway such as kebabs, vegetarian pizzas, breadrolls and sandwiches with low fat fillings, salads, pasta with tomatobased sauces, stir-fried rice and snacks such as fruit buns, low fat yoghurt, fruit, dried fruit and nuts, scones, crumpets and muffins.

Eat more of the foods that are low in saturated fat such as bread, breakfast, cereals, pasta, rice fruit, vegetables, legumes (baked beans, kidney beans etc) and fish.

Use only poly or monounsaturated margarines and oils.

Which type of fat is best? Saturated fat is only one of a range of different types of fat found in foods. Polyunsaturated and monounstaturated fats will help to

lower blood cholesterol. There has been some debate lately over which is the best type of fat - polyunsaturated or monounsaturated?

In Australia over the past 20 years, polyunsaturated fat consumption has increased substantially. This change has been welcomed by many who see it as partially responsible for the dramatic reduction in deaths from coronary heart disease over the same period.

In many ways this change in the type of fat eaten in Australia has been a natural experiment as no traditional diet has contained this level and amount of polyunsaturated fat.

Some nutritionists say that diets high in monounsaturated fats, such as the traditional Greek diet, would be a better option.

At least this diet has been tried and tested over centuries and is known to be healthy.

If we look at the effects of each type of fat we find that both poly and monounsaturated fats willpower blood cholesterol. Polyunsaturated fats have an anti-arrhythmia effect ie it prevents the distortion of heart rhythm which can cause sudden death.

On the other hand, monounsaturated fats appear to be more resistant to oxidation which is thought to play a role in the development of atherosclerosis.

In practical terms, this probably means that it would be best to use a variety of both types of fats to receive a variety of health benefits and taste sensations.

The real problem fat in the Australian diet is saturated fat. Replacing saturated fat with polyunsaturated fat or carbohydrate will generate more health benefits than any trade-off between polys and monos.

What about fish oils? Another type of fat receiving much media attention of late is omega-3 polyunsaturated fats or fish oils. Omega-3 polyunsaturated fats are also found in small amounts in canola, soya bean and linseed oils. Studies show that populations eating lots of fish are less likely to die from heart disease. Although omega-3 polyunsaturated fats do not lower blood cholesterol, they do prevent blood from clotting, lower triglycerides and blood pressure.

As yet there is not enough work done on the side effects of consuming large doses of fish oil.

Some research does suggest that the side effects for diabetics is not favourable.

Furthermore, fish oils like cod liver oil are high in dietary cholesterol. The National Heart Foundation therefore recommends consumption of more fish (fresh, canned or frozen) - at least twice a week.

Cholesterol free? Dietary cholesterol has grabbed the attention of the food industry to such an extent that the food claim "cholesterol-free" can be found on many food products. Dietary cholesterol is found in all animal foods. It may rise blood cholesterol in certain individuals, especially if eaten with foods high in saturated fats.

Most foods high in dietary cholesterol are not eaten regularly with the exception of eggs. The National Heart Foundation recommends no more than 2-3 eggs a week for those with high blood cholesterol.





WHAT TO DO IF THERE IS A FIRE IN YOUR HOME

If you have made a family escape plan and practiced it with your family, you have increased their chances of escaping safely. Go over the following rules with your children each time you have fire drills. This will help everyone remember them in case of a real fire emergency.

- 1. Don't panic. Stay calm. Your safe escape may depend on thinking clearly and remembering what you have practised.
- 2. Get out of the house as quickly as possible. Follow a planned escape route. Do not stop to collect anything or get dressed.
- 3. Feel the doors to see if they are hot. If they are not, open them carefully. Do not open a door if it is hot. Use an alternate escape route.
- 4. Stay close to the floor. Smoke and hot gasses rise.
- 5. Cover your nose and mouth with a cloth (wet it possible). Take short shallow breaths.
- 6. Keep doors and windows closed. Open them only if you have to in order to escape.
- 7. Meet at your planned meeting place after leaving the house.
- 8. Call the Fire Department as soon as possible from outside you house. Give the address and your name.,
- 9. Never go back inside a burning building. Contact your local Fire Brigade. They will give you more ideas about how to make your home safer from fires and how to plan your family's escape.



2. THE GRADE 10 LEAVERS DINNER



LANDCARE NEWS

St Marys Pass Landcare Project in conjunction with Parks and Wildlife Service at Gray Mares Tail. Unfortunately this 'beautiful waterfall reserve' became infested with gorse and broom and was turned into a local rubbish dump!

After contact was established between Parks and Wildlife, The General Manager and Works Manager of Break O Day Municipality and St Marys Landcare Group to see what could be done about the area, the first job to be tackled was to clear away rubbish and the gorse, broom and blackberry infestation. What then followed is here quoted from a letter written by Mr Murray Luttrell, St Helens District Officer, Parks and Wildlife Service to St Marys Landcare Group and I hope this answers some of the questions that have been raised.

"Parks and Wildlife surveyed the boundary between the reserve and Spilsbury which roughly halved the carpark area and left the start of the walking track on private land. The next step was to ascertain if an entrance onto Esk Main Road was legally available. Mr L T Henry Middleton from Transport & Works and Mr B Quillerate from Transport & Works have inspected the access and I understand a licence is to be issued shortly.

The boundary through the old carpark has been fenced, the new entrance and carpark have been defined. The part of the walking track requiring realignment has been done, an earth mound vehicle barrier has been built from material previously dumped on site. Works still required:-

- 1 Surfacing of carpark and entrance
- 2. Sign posting
- 3. Widening of the walking track to Falls lookout
- 4. Weed control
- Restoration and planting out of the area where construction materials for St Marys Pass roadworks are currently stock piled.

I intend to carry out 1 and 2 over the next six months and would be interested to know if your group would like to be further involved in any of the remaining jobs. You have previously mentioned an interest in raising the seedlings and I wonder if your group would be able to raise, plant and caretake the trees required to rehabilitate the materials dump area when store is removed?

I visualise a mass planting of Blackwood, Silver Wattle, Black Peppermint, Mountain White Gum and White Top Stringy Bark being required and thus restrict light and the spread of the gorse and canary broom."

Since then we have received some 200 seedlings from Parks and Wildlife in St Helens and approximately 150 have been planted in the area by Grade 5/6 from St Marys District High continued page 12


